"I am glad to say that the U. S. government have indicated that they intend to recognize the government of Trans-Jordan and that is a very material factor."

 "Americans," says this correspondent, "are rapidly losing face in the Orient. A reservoir of U. S. good will built up during World War II, is about drained dry. In a vast expanse that is home for a billion people, affection for America, amounting to hero worship a few years ago, is turning into deep resentment now...  
 "Thoughtful people in Asia are fearful of a U. S. policy intended to build up Japan. They resent American's role in China, and are suspicious of U. S. motives in Indonesia, Indo-China and other territories where native leaders are struggling for independence.  
 "There is a feeling that U. S. policy—or the lack of a consistent, over-all policy for Asia—not only is alienating a billion friends and potential allies, but has gratified millions of backward people to turn to the Communists for leadership."  
 Here are some of the reasons the correspondent cites:  
 "Chinese of all factions fear Japan is being restored to war-making strength... The Chinese are not alone. The people of the Philippines, also, if anything, even more bitter about American policy in Japan... Most Asiatics appreciate America's concern regarding Russia. What worries them is a growing suspicion that the U. S. is in a desire to convert Japan into a subversive against Russia, in neglecting the demoralization of the former enemy. They are convinced that Japan, while it may emerge strong, quite probably will not be democratic...  
 "The people of Indonesia and Indo-China are almost fanatical in their desire to break away from the Dutch and French. Because U. S. propaganda during the war put so much stress on the Four Freedoms and the right of all peoples to self-government, related leaders confidently expected America to help their fight for liberty. Now they are disillusioned and bitter... Many people insist that the U. S. is giving lip service to the Indonesian Republic while aiding the Dutch military in the latter's effort to hold the East Indies... For months the Communists have been telling the Indonesians that they were being betrayed by America, that the U. S. had sold out to the Dutch...

The survey shows a definite drop in living costs generally during the past year. But there is no common pattern.

Just as the price of a dozen eggs or a pound of butter may vary a few cents between stores in the same city, so the price of the commodities vary widely between communities.

In some areas specific food items cost more than they did a year ago. In other communities the same items cost a lot less.

Some of the price changes come as a surprise to the consumer.

For instance, in Chicago, the national meat packing center, retail prices of a leg of lamb and chopped steak are above a year ago. In cities far from the packing centers those items have declined.

Declines in some commodities in the coastal cities of San Francisco, Seattle and Boston an overall decline has been less noticeable.

The largest single drop in a single article is in New York, where chopped steak (U. S. No. 1) variety) fell from an average 85 cents a pound last January to 49 cents this month—a decline of 36 cents.

But a New York butcher commented: "It was meat from better-fed cattle that was being chopped up a year ago."

### Over 90 Non Public Ways Located in Manchester

Faced with responsibility for enforcement of local traffic and snow removal ordinances, Chief of Police Herman Schenkel has compiled a list of 91 non-public ways on which he does not believe police have enforcement authority.

Of course there are disadvantages with the list, and have been instructed not to seek to enforce the traffic and snow rules on any except public highways.

This morning General Manager George H. Woodall said he is inclined to agree that except in public emergency police efforts should not be directed to those places over which the town has no authority.

The question of authority and liability is complicated by the fact that some roads, never accepted, are in fairly heavy use.

Interpreting the situation technically and without reference to the informal accommodations by which users of these streets generally obey the laws and by which the town itself sometimes assumes informal responsibility for the maintenance of safe passage, the picture of life on these streets is as follows:

On 91 of Manchester's streets you can park your car any old way you please. You can park without lights, on the wrong side of the street, or you needn't bother to park at all. Just leave your car in the middle of the road. It's all right—if you want to be that kind of citizen. The police can't do a thing about it unless they find that you are threatening some general health and safety.
