Ink Would Mark Ill-Behaved Reds

Berlin, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Ink as a weapon against ill-behaved Russian soldiers was recently proposed by the Russian commandant of small eastern German towns, the British-licensed Telegraph reported today.

Some women had come to see the commandant, the newspaper's story says, to complain about increasing mistreatment of German women by Russian soldiers.

When the Russian officer asked the women what he should do about it, they didn't know. So he came up with an idea.

"Always carry some ink with you," he said. "In case of distress, pour it over the soldier's clothes. Since every soldier has but one uniform, I can easily find out the culprits from the ink-blot."

Doctor May Go On Bowles' Staff

Hartford, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Dr. William B. Smith, Hartford physician, may soon find himself on Governor Bowles' military staff.

He was mistakenly cut from the governor's military staff through a bill passed by the 1947 Legislature. In rewriting the law to add three Naval members to the staff, the post of surgeon general was unintentionally left out.

As a result, Chester Bowles became the first governor to serve without a surgeon general on his staff.

Legislation will soon be introduced, according to state military officials, to correct the situation. His passage is considered certain.

This would assure the return of Dr. Smith, a colonel, to the staff since the medical officer of the state military department automatically becomes surgeon general.

Hartford, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The legislative committee of the Connecticut Education Association today commended Governor Bowles for his stand on education, but said it was concerned whether the program went far enough.

Following a dinner meeting Thursday night at the University club, attended by CEA officers, educational leaders and legislative commission personnel from throughout the state, Henry W. Farrington, of New Haven, commission chairman, lauded the governor for "a significant beginning in education."

Mr. Farrington said however, "we are very much concerned that the program does not go far enough. The additional appropriation to towns will do little more than cover current expenditures and will not leave room for increased school enrollment and the need for more teachers."

Mr. Farrington said that the CEA has worked for during many years. We are particularly gratified to see him stressing the quality of education."

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Facility Seeks New College

Offers Itself for Hire And Promises Own Student Body, Alumni

Lansing, Mich., Jan. 28.—(AP)—A college "facility" offered itself for hire today and promised to provide its own student body and alumni.

Apparently all that is lacking is a campus.

The unique offer came from a group of Olivet (Mich.) college faculty members in a classified "situation." Wanted advertisement in the Lansing State Journal.

Latest climax to dispute was the latest climax to a faculty dispute that began last fall with the firing of an Olivet professor and his wife for what certain sources called their "ultra liberal" views. The college never discussed its reasons publicly.

Olivet is a small college in central Michigan with a student body of about 300 and some 28 faculty members and administrators.

It has a former radio executive, paid \$25 to have the ad inserted for one day under the heading "College Faculty for Hire as a Unit."

"Prepared to offer balanced and advanced curriculum for small, liberal arts college," the advertisement read in part. "Substantial upper class student body and alumni group with accounting (to) aid in transplanting unique educational traditions."

For Smith said a prospective employer would get the following:

At least a dozen veteran Olivet college instructors.

From 175 to 200 ready-made students of Olivet who are ready to transfer their allegiance and support to a new college.

No immediate failures.

The various groups are said to be composed of the policies of Olivet's new president, Aubrey L. Wils, a former radio executive. He fired Sociology Prof. T. Barton Akeley and his wife, a librarian, last fall.

Despite a strike by a group of students, Dr. Akeley refused to resign the Akeley's. Last December he refused to retire five other faculty members on financial grounds, Smith among them.

Smith, president of the Olivet College A.P.T. Teachers' union and Socialist party candidate for vice president last year, said Akeley was trying to "revamp" Olivet by choosing "his own faculty."
