Time for Action Is Now, Say World Federalists

"Why Wait for Another War?" Is the Question Posed at Panel Discussion on Peace Here

Some people say this is not yet the time for action. We should wait for what? Another world war? We World Federalists believe now is the time for action in the greatest cause ever offered mankind—that of peace.

This statement by Raymond Cooper, member of the Manchester Board of Directors, highlighted the discussion presented by Manchester World Federalists at Hollister School last night.

Other members of the panel included Attorney Jay Robinson, an moderator, Miss Helen Estes, Rep. John LaBelle, and Mrs. Helen Halterway, a Manchester resident who is assistant treasurer of the state Federalist organization.

In Morally Justified Cooper, leading off the discussion, said that there had always been moral justification for a world government with power to prevent war, but that today the world had an even more compelling reason to be found in the nature of what atomic war would be.

Citing the predictions of various atomic scientists as to what another world war would be like, and detailing the statistics of the casualties in Hiroshima, Mr. Cooper noted:

"But people say that can't happen to us. We have the atomic bomb."

In answer to this he cited the testimony of scientists that any industrial nation can produce the bomb eventually, meanwhile, he charged, the "Little Nations" term he said he chose deliberately, was being ignored even now, and would itself be destroyed if it continued to be ignored in cases like Indonesia.

He quoted Bernard Baruch: "A choice between the quick and the dead, that is our business."

Needs World Law The will of mankind for world peace, he said, could only be realized in world law, and the question is whether this country should be a leader in the initiation of such a regime of world law. His answer was that should not only because it might fear the terror of a third world war, but because it would be the correct moral position for this country to take.

"There is no moral justification for the proposed western alliance which is a true United Nations," he said.

Martin Hatheway opened by saying that there are many people who favor world federation, just as there have always been many people "in favor of virtue and against sin." The latter, he said, had specific problems which had to be considered if this sentiment were to be translated into action.

Must Include Russia He felt personally, he said, that Russia must be included in any true world government. "If the world is divided," he said, "it doesn't make much difference what you call one half, world government or not."

As for the problem of persuading Russia to come in, he said he thought Russia must be suspicious of us in the present world situation, as we certainly have reason to be suspicious of Russia, and he recommended that the first thing to be sought should be a State Department policy of considered and consistent approach toward some kind of agreement with Russia.

Another difficulty in the path of world government, Mr. Hatheway discussed economic problems involved, citing the fact that the state of New York originally didn't want to come into the United States for fear it would "lower the standard of living" of that colony. There was a difference, however, he said, between that situation and the situation today, and he admitted that the coming of world government would mean some economic readjustment at first, of the type sometimes now decreed by tariffs, before it attained economic stability.

In his third point, Mr. Hatheway doubted that the United States was actually the proper nation to "initiate" the movement toward world government. Considering Russian suspicion of us, and the isolationist instability of our own Congress, he said, it might be better if some other nation took leadership in the movement.

World Clarity Apparent Helen Estes, speaking on the question "Is World Federation Apparent?" suggested that perhaps the world ought to define the word "apparent" more accurately. "To appear," she said, "means to be visible and it seems to me that that is just what we need to do, to conciliate Russia and pacify the fears of the small nations, to conciliate and pacify conditions in the plague spots of the world where conditions give Communism its most alarming opportunities."

to share atomic knowledge under a "degree of world government." World government would, she said, mean some economic readjustment, just as every invention of the whole industrial revolution has meant readjustment.

"But," she concluded, "it is a question of losing something or everything. A world government is preferable to a world war."

Miss Estes had been pressed into service on the panel in the unavoidable absence of Mrs. Katherine Bourne, who was originally scheduled to participate.

Another impromptu member, Atty. John LaBelle, concluded the formal discussion. It was his role, as it had been that of Mr. Hatheway, to "cast some doubts" on the cause of world government.

An hour of questioning from the audience, which included members of the High School Debating Club, followed the speeches from the members of the panel. George Holt, Connecticut president of the World Federalists, attended the meeting, which was opened by Winston Sharp, treasurer of the Manchester branch.

Refreshments were served following the program. About 75 attended.
