Retired City Official Dies

William J. Hardie Assessor in Hartford For 24 Years

Hartford, Feb. 22.—(AP)—William J. Hardie, 68, of 200 Lynde street, retired city assessor, died this morning at his home.

Mr. Hardie had been assessor for 24 years when he retired June 20, 1948, completing the longest consecutive term of any of his colleagues.

His tenure of office included the boom of the twenties and the depression of the thirties. A Republican, he saw seven changes in the city administration during his city service.

Mr. Hardie also was directly responsible for the sale of national savings stamps to the Federal Government to raise revenue for national defense. He suggested such a plan to former U. S. Senator John A. Danaher in 1940 who took the matter up with the postmaster general.

Well known as speaker in his earlier days, Mr. Hardie conducted a radio show on WJHM, and was active in numerous fraternal organizations of which he was well known as speaker.

Mr. Hardie was elected assessor of Hartford October 2, 1919, son of the late Thomas C. and Mary A. Malloy Hardie. He was educated at the Lawrence Street school and the Hartford Business College, graduating from all three with honors.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Cora R. Hardie, his daughter, Mrs. Raymond W. Harlow of Glastonbury; three daughters, Miss Mary A. Harlow, Mrs. Leo M. Jones and Mrs. Leo G. Flummer; six grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held from Oliver's Funeral Home, 222 W. Main street, at 8:15 a. m., with national requiem mass at St. Justin's church at 9. Burial will be in Mt. St. Benedict cemetery.

#### Washington's Standard

Any one of George Washington's great services to his country seems, in retrospect, undeniable. The creation of Valley Forge, his ability to pass personal dictatorial as one of the fruits of victory, the high temper of his service as the nation's first President—the lack of any one of these could have changed history. There was no one else to whom the nation looked for leadership, and which George Washington seems to have changed history. That was a moment between the successful ending of the war and the successful establishment of the first federal government.

The separate states living under the Articles of Confederation and sent delegates to a Federal Convention at Philadelphia, and this Federal Convention had inevitably, considering the problems of its times, come to a realization that if it were to do anything worth while, it must tackle the problem of trying to create a strong federal form of government for the former thirteen colonies.

The fact that this step was logical, that it was common sense, made it no less daring a thing. Even as they began trying with it, the delegates to the convention were full of fears as to what the people might say, certain that they must temper every decision to the prejudices they were sure were blowing through the thirteen jealous colonies, certain that they must not dare to be too frank about their aim of a strong federal government, certain that the only way they could ever accomplish anything would be to yield to every outside fear and prejudice they themselves could imagine.

If they had proceeded in such a spirit, all they could have produced would have been something still weaker than the Articles of Confederation, whose weaknesses they were trying to cure.

That they did not proceed in such a spirit was primarily due to one of the most telling and timely bits of courageous wisdom in all history.

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#### Leaders Mum On Dixie Deal

Talk Arises of Possible Compromise to Scuttle Civil Rights

Washington, Feb. 22.—Talk arose in the House today of a possible compromise which would scuttle most of President Truman's civil rights program in return for repeal of about one-fourth of the Taft-Hartley labor law.

While party leaders remained silent, both northern and southern Democrats gave that version of an agreement as tentatively accepted by Dixie lawmakers, who hold the balance of voting power in the House.

Republicans told of offering—unsuccessfully this counterproposal: The G. O. P. House members would vote against the entire civil rights program if the southerners would vote against the entire Taft-Hartley labor law.

Under the Democratic agreement, only an anti-lynch bill would get through the House. There would be no action on President Truman's request for anti-lynch tax and anti-lynch discrimination measures in exchange, the southerners would vote for a Taft-Hartley repealer which actually would keep "about three-fourths" of the law.

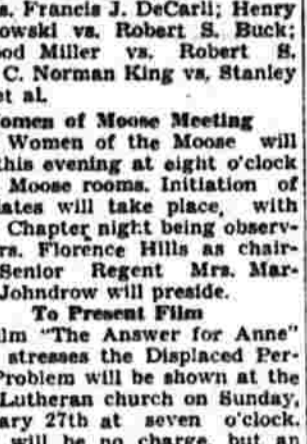

#### Approval Given For Canonization

Vatican City, Feb. 22.—The Congregation of Rites of the Roman Catholic church today read before Pope Pius XII its final approval for canonization of two saints, both of Italian origin.

One was the Blessed Bartolomeo Capitanio, founder of the Sisters of Charity, who died in 1853. The church beatified her May 20, 1928.

The other was Giuseppa Rosello, founder of the Daughters of Our Lady of Mercy. She died in 1880. Her beatification was proclaimed Nov. 1, 1938.
