Washington, Va., to join other speakers in praise of Vaughan.

Mr. Gen. Edward Whitehall, adjutant general of the Army, said the military aide's job was "difficult and not all parade and hallo, Drew Pearson and decorations."

Pearson, radio commentator and columnist, has criticized Vaughan for accepting a decoration from the President of Argentina.

He stood outside the Argentine embassy the night the medal was presented, taking down the names of those attending.

Afterward, Pearson said that while this country is spending billions of dollars to help democracy, and while President Truman has spoken thousands of words about saving democracy, his military aide party nifted this talk.

Mr. Truman made no reference to Pearson in his brief talk.

The columnist had this comment: "If Mr. Truman is trying to discourage the right of fair comment, then he, too, has another thing coming. The men he has on his staff are his business—even though the taxpayers have to foot the bill."

"But when his staff members accept medals from a military dictator whose principles this government has ridiculed all the things Truman's."

The president addressed the hushed gathering of Reservists without benefit of a loud speaker.

After reviewing Vaughan's career, and praising the general and his other aides, Mr. Truman said:

"What I am leading up to is this—that there have been some very vicious attacks on my military aide, unjustified, and—I say advisedly—vicious."

"They are not intended to smear our customers as one, at least, our oil is the very best!"

See Number Cut in Half

Washington, Feb. 23.—(AP)—Some lawmakers predicted today that perhaps no more than 10,000,000 persons will be added to the social security rolls, instead of the 20,000,000 predicted by some officials.

Due to administrative cutbacks, they said, about 10,000,000 farmers, farm laborers and household workers may not be blanketed under old age and survivors insurance as the president asked.

About 30,000,000 workers are covered now.

"There is a sharp split—in the House as well as in Congress—over both that program and Mr. Truman's broad 'home relief' plan to give federal financial aid to all who need it."

The chief executive next praised General George C. Marshall, Dwight Eisenhower and Omar Bradley.

He told again the story of how he asked Marshall in 1940 to give him an artillery group. He said when he told Marshall he was 60, Marshall replied:

"You are too damned old; you have no business going out to work in the Senate."

The praise of the general preceded Mr. Truman's remark that he was "just as fond and just as loyal" to his military aide as he was to the "big boys."

After his challenge to the commentators and columnists, he went on:

Russians placed flowers at their war memorial.

The Yugoslav military mission placed a wreath on the memorial, causing some surprise in view of the split between Premier Marshall and the Moscow-led communists.

The mission also has been attacked by the Soviet press here on black market charges. Its tribute was "to the Soviet heroes" and the Yugoslav military mission.

The Yugoslavs were the only foreigners mingling with the hundreds of Russian troops, many of them looking no older than 16, who marched in relays through the Brandenburg gate to the old and marble monument just inside the British sector.

British soldiers, who were watching, said the anti-Communist press has complained repeatedly that the monument is an eyesore.

Poles praise Russia.

Polish leaders in Warsaw praised Russia in celebrating Red Army day. Politicians and generalists predicted "catastrophe" for what they called American and British imperialists and war venturers.

The lead editorial of Pravda in Moscow said Soviet fighters must use in battle training "the newest attainments of Soviet military science and techniques which have been developed by our scientists and socialist industry in postwar years."

All Moscow newspapers printed large portraits of Premier Stalin and Bulgarian.

Romania, an Iron Curtain country, celebrated Red Army day with meetings and lectures and newspapers full of articles about the Russian Army.

One writer asserted that during the war only an offensive saved General Eisenhower's invasion forces in western Europe. The writer charged that all elite German divisions were opposing the Russians and that only reserves were in the west.

They Russian Army Different.

The Red Army newspaper Oesterreichische Zeitung in Vienna said the Russian Army is different from those of the west in that it "has never been used for aggressive purposes as was fully demonstrated during the Second World War."

The paper went on:

"Today, when the Anglo-American imperialists form anti-Soviet blocs and prepare for a new war, the Soviet Army is the only guardian of peace and the security of all peoples."

The Soviet Army newspaper in Berlin, Tagliche Rundschau, said the Soviet Army do not use their presence in occupied countries "to exert pressure on the people" but that American and British troops do.

Rundschau repeated the old theme that Russia won the war alone.

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Form 1040A Is Most Simple Form to Use

Can Be Used Only by Those Persons Who Are Under \$5,000 Income Class

(Editor's Note: This is the third of 13 stories on who must do what about the 1949 income tax return, for the deadline is March 15).

Washington, Feb. 23.—(AP)—This tells you who can use Form 1040A, and how, in filing your 1948 income tax return.

Your income was \$5,000 or more? You can't use it. You must use the 1040 long form.

Only those with under \$5,000 income can use Form 1040A and not all of them can. Those who can't can use the 1040 short-form.

Form 1040A is meant mostly for workers who had full tax withheld from them during 1948.

The 1040 short-form is meant mostly for other under \$5,000 income people like landlords and so on.

If your income was under \$5,000, you can use Form 1040A if:

1. That income was entirely from wages or salary from which Federal income tax was withheld.

2. Any other income—provided it was no more than \$100—came from wages or salary from which Federal income tax was withheld.

Example: Your income was \$4,500, almost all of it in wages from which tax was withheld. But a little of it came from rent. You couldn't use Form 1040A. You'd use the 1040 short-form.

Form 1040A Easiest to Use.

Form 1040A is easiest to use. No figuring. Answer questions. Send it to the internal revenue collector. He'll figure your tax for you.

You're due a refund? He'll send you a check. You still owe tax? He'll tell you. You have 90 days to pay after the due date.

If you use Form 1040A, attach all the Form W-2's that show statements given you in 1948 by your boss or employer.

Form W-2 is the small, check-size receipt given a worker by an employer for taxes withheld from his pay during the year.

Last year Form W-2, itself, was used as an income tax return. Not this year. Form 1040 A takes its place.

Congress made other changes in the law to cut taxes, particularly on married couples. How?

Now for the first time everywhere, you can split your income, and get a lower tax rate on each.

In most cases this gives them a lower tax. Married couples who can do so won't lose money by filing jointly on Form 1040 A. Why?

The collector, in deciding what tax will figure which would give them lower tax: A separate joint return.

Then he'll give them the benefit of whichever way is cheaper for them. But—

Not every couple can use Form 1040 A. It depends on their income. They can use it as a joint return if their combined income was under \$5,000 and if they came within the rules of No. 1 and No. 2 outlined above.

Suppose, individually, their income was under \$5,000 but combined was over \$5,000. Example: Jones had \$4,000, his wife had \$4,000.

They can't file jointly on Form 1040A. They can file separately on Form 1040 A, as long as they come under Rule No. 1 and No. 2 outlined above.

They can file jointly on the 1040 long-form, where they must figure their own tax but on the annual income to get a lower tax.

On community property states if husband and wife want to file separate returns, they can't use Form 1040A at all.

Community property states: Arizona, California, Idaho, Louisiana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Oregon, Texas, Washington.

Get Automatic Deduction.

Remember: In using Form 1040 you automatically get, without asking or itemizing, a deduction of about 10 per cent for expenses like hospital bills or charity. Most people's deductions don't amount to 10 per cent.

If yours are more, you'll lose money filing on Form 1040A. Use the 1040 long-form. There you'll have to itemize deductions, but claim the full amount.

If husband or wife wants to itemize deductions, neither can use Form 1040A. Both must use Form 1040. And both must itemize.

In using Form 1040A, be sure you list your exemptions and dependents. For each you get \$600 knocked off your income before it's taxable.

Husbands and wives must both sign Form 1040A when they use it as a joint return.

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Third Senator Plan Opposed

McGrath to Keep Plugging on Proposal He Opposed in Speech

Hartford, Feb. 23.—(P)—A proposal to give each state three U. S. senators took a verbal thrashing today from both Republican and Democratic leaders.

But Senator J. Howard McGrath (D-R-I) who suggested the plan, said the opposition didn't frighten him. He's going to keep plugging the proposal.

McGrath, chairman of the Democratic National committee, said in a Washington day address to the Massachusetts Democrats he would present his proposal to Congress this session.

He said three senators instead of two would create a more efficient organization and speed legislative process.

Opposition led in almost immediate comments from Washington included Senator James H. Eastland (D-Miss.) "It is obviously a suggestion without merit."

Senator McKelvin (D-Tenn.) dean and president pro tem of the Senate, "I am one of those old-fashioned people who believe our form of government is the best in the world. I have confidence in the Senate and House of Representatives as they stand."

Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) "I would be more in favor of cutting it down to one senator per state."

Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) "I don't see how increasing the size of the Senate would increase efficiency."

Wood Distribute Lead McGrath also defended his proposal would distribute the lead now being handled by senatorial committees. He said he placed on two few committees under the present setup, slowing progress, he said.

He also said two senators from the same state often take opposite views, but three senators would enable each side to be recorded on important issues.

Another factor would be a senatorial election every two years. McGrath said this would create a "healthy situation" and make political organizations more alert to the nation's wishes.

One senator, told of the proposal, said: "Don't give me that stuff. You must be joking."

When informed the reporter was serious, he declined further comment.

A few of the comments were read to McGrath during a brief stop in Kansas City on his way back to Washington.

The proposal doesn't bother me a bit," he said. "I think it's a plan that has merit and is worth looking into."

"I'd be more interested in coming from persons who have a detached view of the situation rather than from my colleagues," he said.

A bellhop found the nude body of James A. Mahoney, 55, of Bristol, on the Virginia-Tennessee border, after a request that he be awakened early yesterday morning.

The wealthy victim had been brutally beaten on the face and head. A blood-soaked towel was knotted tightly around his broken neck.

The slaying "must have been done by a strong man," said Assistant Coroner Philip Monteleone. "No woman could have done it."

Acting Detective Chief John J. Jacobson said police are seeking for questioning a man described by an informant as about six feet, with gray hair, ruddy complexion, and unusually broad shoulders.

He said the informant told of seeing Mahoney and the sticky stranger drinking together in the Monteleone hotel cocktail lounge.

Housing Foes To Be Heard

Opponents of Program Offered by Bowles to Have Hearings Today

Hartford, Feb. 23.—(P)—Opponents of Gov. Charles Bowles' housing program have their innings today.

The General Assembly's Judiciary committee heard supporters of the governor's program for two hours yesterday, and decided to continue its hearing today to give opponents an equal chance to speak their piece.

The governor has proposed a \$100,000,000 bond issue to finance construction of 10,000 dwelling units, 4,000 of them to be rented at an average of \$35 a month through the payment of state subsidies.

Would Pay Additional Amounts "The bonded units would be rented only to families with incomes under \$2,000 annually. Each pay a rent 20 per cent of its of these families would agree to monthly income estimated at average \$35, and the state would pay the additional amount necessary to bring the total rent to \$55.

The \$55 monthly rent was estimated as the figure needed to pay the cost of management, interest and amortization of the bond issue. That rental will be charged families above the \$2,000 level.

Because only a part of the program could be put into effect in the immediate future, the cost of the program at \$1,000,000 for the first two years and about \$3,000,000 a year when all 10,000 units are in operation.

20 Solid Support Program About 20 Democratic senators and representatives were among witnesses yesterday who supported the governor's program.

The committee also heard from representatives of labor organizations, veterans groups, the People's Party, Americans for Democratic Action, local housing authorities, the Connecticut Conference of Social Work and individuals who described themselves as urban citizens.

All agreed that low-rental housing could become a reality only through some form of governmental subsidize.

West Republicans Silent Republicans, who have expressed vigorous opposition to the form of state subsidy, were silent during yesterday's hearing with the exception of Rep. Louis R. Shapiro (R-Farmington), who spoke briefly in support of a rival plan of his own.

Shapiro proposed that the State Housing authority be given the power, for two years only, to purchase land and building materials and construct 10,000 houses through private contractors.

"The houses would be sold to persons with incomes under a certain maximum, tentatively set at \$6 a week, for a \$700 down payment and a three per cent mortgage financed by the state for the balance."

Shapiro estimated that "elimination of the profit motive" the houses could be built for \$7,000 each. He contended no action would be taken against the strikers. The strike has been declared illegal by the government.

Death Takes Navy Veteran

Greenwich, Feb. 23.—(P)—Thomas Robert Chute, 21, a Navy veteran, died last night at Greenwich hospital where he was admitted three weeks ago for "treatment and observation of a sinus condition."

Chute, who spent two years in the South Pacific with the Navy, was placed in an iron lung after he suddenly developed complete respiratory failure and coma.

The mechanical lung and a volunteer worker were rushed from the New York headquarters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis under police escort, while hospital attendants administered artificial respiration.

Eating Places Plan Opposed

Much Opposition Shown to Building Restaurants on Parkways

Hartford, Feb. 23.—(P)—A proposal that the state build restaurants on the Merritt and Wilbur L. Cross parkways attracted little support and much opposition at a legislative hearing yesterday.

The State Highway department sought authority to build the restaurants for which, Highway Commissioner C. Albert Hill said, "we feel there is a real need."

Restaurant owners from all parts of the state contended in opposition that there are many restaurants within a short drive of the parkways. Approval of the proposal, they declared, would put the state in a monopolistic position in competition with private business.

Only three persons spoke in favor of the plan at the hearing, conducted by the legislative committee. More than 30 spoke in opposition.

One of the proponents, L. I. Graham of Wilton, who said he spoke as a restaurant man, noted that 10,000,000 cars use the parkway system annually, with 60 per cent of the cars on the road at noon.

"A hungry driver is a fatigued driver," he said, adding that many drivers do not wish to take the time to leave the parkway in search of a place to eat.

"Several legislators were among those appearing in opposition. One of them, Rep. Simon S. Cohen (R., Ellington), said: "If the state has \$500,000 to spend for these restaurants, let them build underpasses and overpasses in the town of Vernon instead."

Red Army Day
 The Red Army Day proclamation of Marshal Bogdanov, Soviet Minister of the Armed Forces, is routine stuff. It said Russian fighting men must "maintain constant readiness for any emergency."
 That is a normal Army Day speech in Russia or any other country. If there is a war, and Russia wins it, and with it wins the privilege of fighting world history, that will be history's interpretation of the war.
 Similarly, our own military men are constantly advising complete preparedness for war coming from Russian aggression. And if there is a war, and we win it and the privilege of writing world history, that will be history's interpretation of the war.
 What the history books say, unfortunately, won't make much difference to the millions of innocents who would die in such a war.
 The world could stand a lot less of this business in both Russia and the United States, this business in which the spokesmen of each side draw drastic and frightening pictures of the aggressive intentions of the other side.
 If there are any two facts in the world today which can really be accepted as facts, they are these:
 1. We do not intend to attack Russia.
 2. Russia does not intend to attack us.
 But these two facts are lost almost completely in the crowd fire of "defensive" speeches from each side.
 Each side is so busy "defending" itself against the expected aggression of the other that each side is moving closer to war and to acceptance of war, each side using the alibi that it is the other side which really intends war.
 Neither side intends war. But war will come long as the only treatment of the present world situation is the negative treatment of war preparations and counter war preparations. Unless this defensive bombast on both sides is subordinated to some positive effort to build peace rather than war, unless at least one of these two nations offers a positive rather than a merely negative approach to our danger, then the world will have war without having had even one intelligent chance to avoid it.
 We can and will answer Marshal Bogdanov. What else can and will we do?

 Norway has made its dynamic decision to join with the nations of the West in the North Atlantic Defense Pact, and the question now is whether Russia will prove capable of accepting this fact as a purely defensive arrangement on the part of the West or will regard it as encirclement of Russia itself.
 Two factors, perhaps, take some of the dynamite out of the decision, and increase the possibility that Russia may be able to take it, in which case the present very live threat of real war may be diminished.
 One factor is that it is, so far, Norway alone which is coming into the North Atlantic Defense Pact. Sweden has accompanied Norway's decision with its own clear decision not to come in. That decision on the part of Sweden still leaves a neutral state between Russia and the northern part of the West's military arrangement against Russia.
 The other factor is that apparently, according to information from Swedish sources, Norway's adherence to the North Atlantic Defense Pact is not going to mean any peacetime maintenance of military bases on Norwegian soil by the United States.
 It is to be hoped that these two factors are of some reassurance to Russia. We say that not because we love Russia's tender feelings, but because we do not in any case want to see Russia take the action which would make a third World War a matter of days or weeks.
 Reports from Washington indicate that our own military authorities are perfectly well aware of the risk they are running with their creation of the military alliance against Russia. They know that Russia may find the creation of this alliance such an intolerable threat from its own nationalistic and military point of view that Russia may decide to move now, without waiting for this prospective ally to build up all the actual military strength it has in view. They are well aware of the fact that the promotion of this alliance is the most dangerous device strategy this country has yet undertaken. Rieve Advocates Curb On 'Economic Pirates'

Says Tobey's Proposals To Place Check on Tax-Exempt Trust Do Not Go Far Enough

New York, Feb. 23.—(AP)—Eugene Rieve, president of the CIO Textile Workers union of America today demanded a curb on what he described as "economic pirates" in industry.

He said that proposals by Senator Charles W. Tobey (R-NH) to place a check on tax-exempt charitable trusts were important but did not go far enough.

In a recent report to the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce committee on his investigation of trusts created by foreign interests, Tobey urged Congress to plug loopholes in tax laws.

He said that the laws, as they now exist, allow charitable trusts to retain tax-exempt status while "milking" bona fide operations of their assets.

Corporate Responsibility Issue

Rieve said in a statement: "The real issue, as FWIA sees it, is corporate responsibility. A responsible corporation must take steps to avoid its obligations to government in the form of taxes. But what is more vital, neither does a responsible corporation utterly ignore its obligations to its communities where it operates and workers who serve it."

He said that Texton "has been found guilty on both counts. Un-derlying its corporate policy is an added 'we stand in ever-increasing danger of losing the benefits of a free society.'"

The Texton investigation began last September under Tobey's direction after Royal Lobb, corporation president, announced the closing of two textile plants in Nashua, N. H., employing 3,500 workers.

Leave Back to Texton

A group of Nashua citizens later purchased the mills and leased them back to Texton. Proceeds of the trust created by the group were earmarked for a new Hampshire charitable institution.

Testimony was introduced during the hearings that Texton realized millions of dollars in tax exempt funds by creating the trusts.

Little could not be reached immediately for comment on Rieve's statement.

Freeze Needed To Curb Pests

Japanese Beetle Infestation Likely To Be As Bad as Last Year

Derby, Feb. 23.—Unless the weather can come up soon with at least a couple of days of near-free weather while the ground is frozen, this year's Japanese beetle infestation in Connecticut will be just as bad as last year's, according to Dr. John C. Schread, entomologist, who has returned to his home in Derby from Los Angeles where he held the 20th annual turf conference of the Greenkeeping Superintendents of America what to do when these pests invade their greens and fairways.

Affected by drought last September, Connecticut beetles had hard going last September because of the drought, but that grub and egg which escaped desiccation at that time have flourished during the most ideal conditions during the mildest winter in years.

Normally, Dr. Schread said, Connecticut has five inches of rain during September. Last year it had only one and three tenths inches and beetle eggs and grubs that died during the winter are being destroyed by the millions. If there had been during this open winter any extended period of zero temperature with no snow cover, Connecticut would not be worrying much about a Jap beetle infestation this spring and summer.

But as yet the weather man has delivered no lasting zero weather.

Staff of Meriden Record Surprises Warnock On 86th Birthday

Meriden, Feb. 23.—(AP)—A special edition of The Meriden Record was published yesterday—much to the surprise of the newspaper's editor, Thomas H. Warnock.

Editor Warnock usually keeps pretty close tabs on what his newspaper is publishing. But yesterday was a special occasion—his 86th birthday—and the special edition was one of his surprise birthday gifts.

Original presented as gift

Plans for publication had been made for weeks. But The Record staff was careful to keep Warnock in the dark about them. The special edition included four pages of material devoted to the editor, including sketches of his career and letters of greeting from notables in many fields of life. It was illustrated with a four-column reproduction of a portrait of the editor. The original was presented to him as a gift from The Record staff.

Among greetings received was one from Justice William O. Douglas of the U. S. Supreme court. A friend of Warnock's for many years, Justice Douglas wrote of him as a "warm-hearted man, a man as genuine and wholesome as New England itself... at the age of 86, a young man by many standards that are important."

Books Sends Greetings

Gov. Charles J. Hughes sent his greetings to "one of the best and certainly the most durable newspapermen in the state of Connecticut," and U. S. Senator Raymond E. Baldwin hailed Warnock as a great American who, like George Washington, was born on Feb. 23.

Others who sent greetings included Frank J. Starnel, general manager of The Associated Press, and James L. McGovern, associate editor of the Bridgeport Post-Telegram and president of the Connecticut AP circuit.

The Record was founded in 1866 by Warnock and the late E. E. Smith. The association of the two men continued until 1924, when Smith died and was succeeded by his son, Wayne C. Smith, as publisher of The Record and, in 1948, as president of The Meriden Record company.

Open House Held

Warnock's special edition was run off in the afternoon—the Record normally publishes as a morning paper—during an open house in the editor's honor. Guests included leaders in the state's political and business world, as well as newspapermen.

Warnock was assisted in receiving the guests by his wife, who, as Julia Lanning Hill, served as the Record's associate editor for many years. They were married in 1942, several years after the death of Warnock's first wife, the late Mary Harris Warnock.

Naval Power Seen Needed

Sullivan Says Nation Never Could Have Won War Without Aid

North Hollywood, Calif., Feb. 23.—(AP)—The United States never could have won a foreign war without sea power, Navy Secretary Sullivan says, but one branch of the nation's armed services should not be made supreme at the expense of the others.

"If ever we become so foolish as to make one branch supreme," Sullivan told a civic gathering yesterday on the occasion of commissioning a new Naval Reserve training center here, "we shall do ourselves more harm than good by the other services, but at the expense of our national security and at the extreme risk and peril to our own survival."

Initial Advantage Overcome

"In the case of the Japanese, it was only because we were able to bring superior Naval and amphibious forces against them that we overcame the initial advantage they had of a relatively powerful modern Navy and their infamous surprise attack on Pearl Harbor," he said.

The Navy is agreed he added, "that strategic mass air bombardment is the primary responsibility of our splendid Air Force. The Navy neither could nor would attempt to assume that function."

India Trades Tea, Jute for Wheat

New Delhi.—(AP)—India is trading tea and jute for badly needed wheat.

A food ministry spokesman says India is negotiating with Russia for 100,000 tons of wheat, for which it would give 10,000 tons of tea. Last year India and Russia agreed to exchange 50,000 tons of wheat for 5,000 tons of tea. India hopes to get 700,000 tons of wheat from Australia, in exchange for jute and cash.

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Layoff Faces Railroad Men

More Than 1,300 to Be Dropped Temporarily By New Haven Road

Boston, Feb. 23.—(AP)—More than 1,300 employees of the New Haven railroad shops in Massachusetts and New York will be laid off temporarily tonight.

President Laurence F. Whittemore attributed the reduction in working forces to "a drop in volume of our business."

Whittemore said 987 workers will be dropped at the Readville, Mass. shop, 343 at the Van Ness shops in New York, and 24 at the Harlem River Marine shop in New York.

"I have every hope that conditions will improve," Whittemore said, "and that by the first of next month the business barometer will show signs of fairer weather."
