Dividend From Tito?

The rift between Russia and Marshal Tito's Yugoslavia need not fill us with any love for Marshal Tito. He is quite an undemocratic as Stalin; the difference between them is that one is a Russian and the other is a Yugoslav. But Tito's reluctance to become just another Russian, in the name of Communism, has caused the split between Russia and Yugoslavia, and for that split there are certain dividends.

Perhaps the most important of these dividends has been the realization, for those who are reasonable about world affairs today, that Soviet Communism is not an all-conquering, all-permeating tide our fears have built it up to be.

But lately there have been some more tangible dividends that begin to look as if Marshal Tito may be changing the course of history in Greece.

Recently General Markos, the Greek guerrilla leader, was liquidated in one way or another. The reason seems to have been that he had leaned toward Marshal Tito. At any rate, he has been replaced with a leader whose allegiance to the Moscow party line is unquestioned.

The new leader, who is named Zachariades, has done the Greek Army the service of choosing to wage at Philomena a battle which was ill-advised from the point of view of the guerrillas. In this battle, the guerrillas suffered heavy losses and the Greek Army gained its first significant victory since last spring.

Finally, whatever truth there was to reports that the Greek guerrillas used to have the privilege of refreshing themselves behind the Yugoslav border, these reports have now been successfully refuted to the effect that Tito is putting barred wire along his Greek frontier.

So, for the first time since the United States began arming and financing Greece, there seems a chance that the guerrillas may be wanting rather than waning in strength. And Tito, the Yugoslav Communist dictator, seems to deserve most of the credit for this fact.

This is a token dividend from one split on the fringe of the Russian sphere of influence. It shows what a little split can do.

Noting this, one might also note that Anna Louise Strong, the American newspaperwoman who had been welcome in the arms of Moscow for many years, was expelled from Russia after she had begun writing that the Chinese Communists had a destiny all their own.

Russia In Or Out?

Dr. Philip C. Jessup, special United States diplomatic representative to the United Nations, gave his views on the other night on the relationship between the movement for world government and the present condition of the world's relationship with Russia. Speaking in New Haven, Dr. Jessup said:

"At the present time, one can proceed to consider such a world government either as including the Soviet Union or as excluding it. The Soviet Union today is the most recent advocate of old-fashioned complete sovereignty. It has attacked and denounced many rather modest steps toward more effective international organization as infringements on sovereignty."

"Even if there were complete agreement in this country, which there is not, and agreement in other countries outside the Soviet bloc, which there is not, it is far-fetched to conclude that a world government formed today would of necessity exclude the Soviet Union."

"If the Soviet Union were excluded, we would not have a world government. We would have perhaps an extensive international union, a greatly enlarged Benelux plus. Outside of that group would be the Soviet bloc. The international union, if it attempted to set up an international police force, face the ultimate necessity of having to go to war with the Soviet Union."

In these remarks, Dr. Jessup was dealing with a problem which splits even those who are united in the movement for world government, and which crops up in every discussion of the world government movement.

The last national convention of the United World Federalists, however, resolved this question by adopting a resolution which said, in effect, that the promotion of world government and the solution of our difficulties with Russia are actually part of the same problem, which admitted, in effect, that true world government can only come within the context of an improvement of Russia's attitude toward questions of sovereignty and international cooperation.

"This, we think, is the only sound view. We tend to share Dr. Jessup's prediction that any attempt to form a world government without Russia would merely lead to war."

That is, however, no reason for thinking that world government is something that has no chance in our time. And our own prediction of what Russia is willing to do today is no excuse for evading our own answer to the question of what we ourselves are willing to do tomorrow.

The present world situation is one of a cold war showdown between Russia and the United States. Eventually there must be one of two results to that showdown. Either we and Russia fight. Or we and Russia make a settlement.

If we fight, nothing makes too much difference.

But if we come to the time when we are going to make a world settlement, then that is the time for America itself to be ready to lay its own very best cards on the table. That will be the moment for the United States to try to make the cornerstone of its peace with Russia an agreement on that strengthening of the United Nations which can put that organization near the status of a true, limited, world government.

If that moment for agreement arrives, there is no one who can now predict, with any claim of ac-

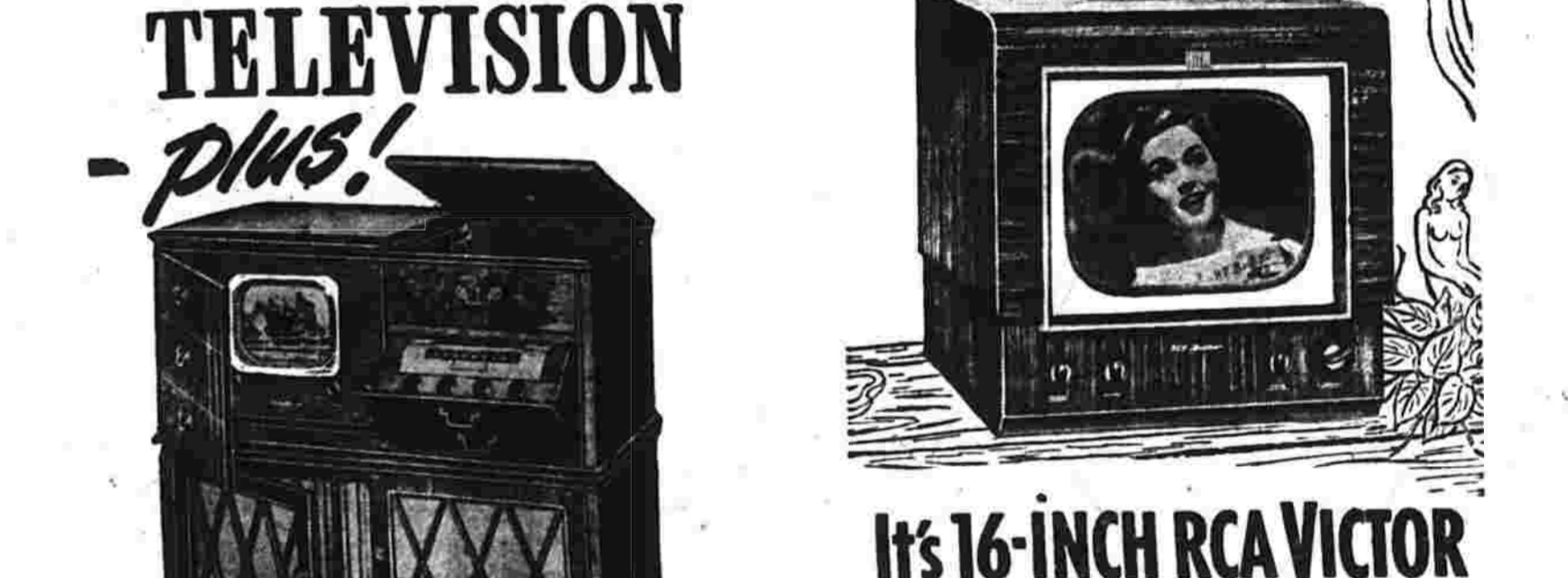

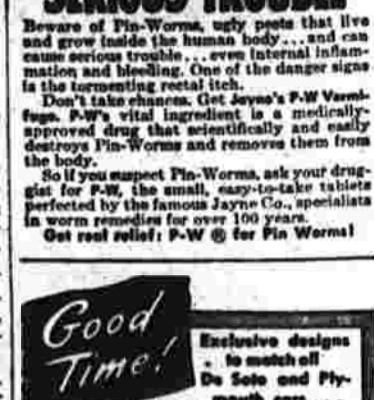
