Captain Wolcott Seeking Recruits

Capt. Lester H. Wolcott of this town, is now on temporary active duty with the Organized Reserve Headquarters and is recruiting for the local truck unit of the U. S. Army Organized Reserve Corps. Colonel John H. Keating announced the number issued before the deadline last year, and 59,490 above the 1947 deadline total.

Captain Wolcott is attached to 325th Transportation Highway Transport Group of which the 18th Truck Company is a component part. Lt. John J. McLaughlin, of 14 O'Leary Drive, town, is in command of the local truck company.

The local truck company and other units of the group are sponsored in this state by The Motor Transport Association of Connecticut.

There are officer and enlisted vacancies in the company for men with experience in planning, supervising and instruction, pertaining to preventative maintenance, repair and replacement, stock record, salvage, reconditioning, re-assembly of motor vehicles, scheduling and dispatch of vehicles, training of drivers and loading, distributing and delivery of cargo. Members of the Organized Reserve Corps are now eligible to receive compensation for time spent in training, and also may earn credit toward eventual retirement pay. Participation and training in a highway transport reserve unit can be carried on while remaining on a civilian job, and training will be conducted in the locality in which members reside.

Claim All Exemptions Possible Filing Return

Dependent Close Relative of Any Age Who Got More Than Half Support During 1948

(Editor's Note: This is the ninth of 12 stories on who has to do what about his 1948 income tax return. For the deadline is March 15.)

Washington, March 2 — (AP) — Claim all the exemptions you can in filing your 1948 income tax return. You'll save money.

You can get \$500 for each exemption from your total income before what's left is taxed. You get a \$500 exemption for:

1. Yourself, always, whether single or married, when you file a return.
2. Your wife, if she had no income or file a return jointly with you.
3. Each dependent.

A word on exemptions for husbands and wives:

When a wife has any income of her own, no matter how small, an exemption can be claimed for her unless she files her own return, separately or jointly with her husband.

Not Classified as Dependent

Remember: A wife is not classified as a dependent. That's why the rules covering exemptions for dependents are a little different.

A dependent is any close relative of any age—age doesn't matter—who got more than half his support from you in 1948 and had less than \$500 income. \$2,000 included are offered to you in 1948 and had less than \$500 income. You don't have to report that income.

But—you can't claim as a dependent anyone who had \$500 or more income even though he had more than half his support from you.

Silly Spot in Law

And note this, because it's a silly spot in the law:

A person who had \$500 or more income, must file his own return and claim his own \$500 exemption. If he had less than \$500 exemption he doesn't have to file a return. But—a person who had \$500 or more income, even though less than \$500 can't be claimed as a dependent. He's in a kind of no-man's land.

Besides the usual \$500 exemption you get for a wife, you get an extra \$500 off for her if she is blind, plus another \$500 if she reached 65 or before (but not after) Dec. 31, 1948.

But you get only the usual \$500 exemption for a dependent and nothing extra if he is blind or over 65.

Close Relative Dependents

These are the close relatives you can claim as dependents:

Your child or grandchild; a stepchild but not the child of a legally adopted child; a brother, sister, step-brother, step-sister; your parents, grandparents or other ancestors; your step-father, step-mother, aunt, uncle, nephew, all related by blood; and your in-laws; father-mother-in-law; brother-sister-in-law.

You can claim as a dependent for the full year a child born to you as late as Dec. 31, 1948.

And—you can claim as a dependent for the full year a child born to you anytime in 1948 even though it died a moment after birth. If it was born alive, you can claim it as a dependent. You can't claim an unborn child or one born dead.

Can Claim Full Exemption

What of some other dependent who died during 1948; you can claim a full exemption for him, even though he died on Jan. 1, 1948, so long as he was truly a dependent during the part of the year he was alive.

You don't have to do any arithmetic with \$500 exemptions if you use Form 1040A or the 1040 Short-form. They're all figured in the tax table used with those forms. You simply note in the proper place that you're claiming as many exemptions.

In using the long-form, you subtract your total exemptions from your income before applying the tax to what's left of the income.

New Haven, March 2 — (AP) — Three arrests have been announced by police in an investigation into the circulation of counterfeit \$10 and \$20 bills in this city.

All residents of this city, they were identified as Andrew Miel, 51 1/2 Washington street, charged with selling counterfeit money; Nicholas Abate, 55, charged with passing and keeping counterfeit bills; and Anthony Conso, 38, who was held on a technical idleness charge.

Miel's bail was set at \$20,000, while the other two had bonds fixed at \$5,000 each.

Naming of Bridge Given Approval

Hartford, March 2 — (AP) — A proposal to name the new Derby-Shelton highway bridge over the Housatonic river after Commodore Isaac Hull has been approved by a legislative committee.

The General Assembly's Roads, Rivers and Bridges committee voted yesterday to recommend passage of a bill naming the bridge after Hull, one-time captain of the U. S. Commodore, the immortal "Old Ironsides." Hull was a native of Derby.

The committee also approved a bill appropriating \$339,000 for construction of a state highway department garage and service station near the Wilbur Cross parkway in Woodbridge. The measure must next win the support of the Appropriations committee before it can be brought to a vote.

Bull-Dozer Kills Torrington Boy

Torrington, March 2 — (AP) — The death of a Torrington boy beneath a bull-dozer being used to plow snow brought to six the number of lives lost in Connecticut as a result of the big storm that ushered in March.

Raymond Gibbons, 14-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Gibbons, was the victim of the Torrington accident. He was struck down by a bull-dozer being used to plow out the yard of the Migeon school in that town yesterday.

Of the five other deaths attributed directly or indirectly to the storm, four resulted from heart attacks while shoveling snow, and the other two from heart attacks while trudging through the heavy snow.

Navy Training For Emergency

San Francisco, March 2 — (AP) — A two-year-old school at the Navy's Treasure Island base here is turning out graduates trained to tell people what to do in event of an atom bomb emergency.

The school's first graduates were officers and men who have since set up similar schools at Keesler Field, Biloxi, Miss., and at Holmgren armament in Maryland. Navy Capt. Roy D. Williams, 76, is in charge.

The course, Captain Williams said, includes lectures on crowd psychology and other anti-panic techniques, and instructions for handling gas mask and other emergency protective equipment. The graduates will be sent to various parts of the country to instruct the public in the use of gas masks and other protective equipment.

Experiments May Lead to Suit

New Haven, March 2 — (AP) — Weather experiments may make themselves liable to law suits in their zeal to produce man-made storms, a writer in the Yale Law Journal says.

Vaugh C. Ball, Ohio State law professor, said that although scientists now know how to produce artificial storms they can't control them, and this lack of knowledge may result in their "reaping a legal harvest."

Ball suggests that individual rain-making research be prohibited, and that the Federal government be given the power to control experiments to modify or control weather conditions.

Mail Deliveries Suspended

Meriden, March 2 — (AP) — Mail deliveries in Meriden were suspended yesterday because of the snow storm. It was the first time since the 1934 blizzard that there had been a general suspension of deliveries because of a storm.

Postmaster John J. Scanlon said 70 per cent of the city was impassable yesterday morning.

At this juncture the state police were called and Trooper Joseph D. Palm managed to reach the house in a patrol car. He took Mrs. Faulkner to Hartford hospital where it was said later that she was "waiting comfortably."

Labor Bills Bring Split

Republicans and Democrats Agree to Disagree

Hartford, March 2.—(P)—Republicans and Democrats on the General Assembly's Labor committee have agreed to disagree on two of Governor Bowler's labor bills.

The Democratic-controlled Senate committee voted, 3-1, to recommend passage of measures which would set a 75-cent an hour minimum wage and require employers to pay women the same wages as men for equal work.

The House committee, dominated by Republicans, voted 8-2 against the minimum wage bill, and by the same vote tabled the equal pay proposal.

The separate committee votes came after the Senate committee had walked out yesterday on a joint meeting with the House.

There was no bitterness in the split. "It was just a case of agreeing to disagree when it came apparent that neither side was going to yield," said one committee member.

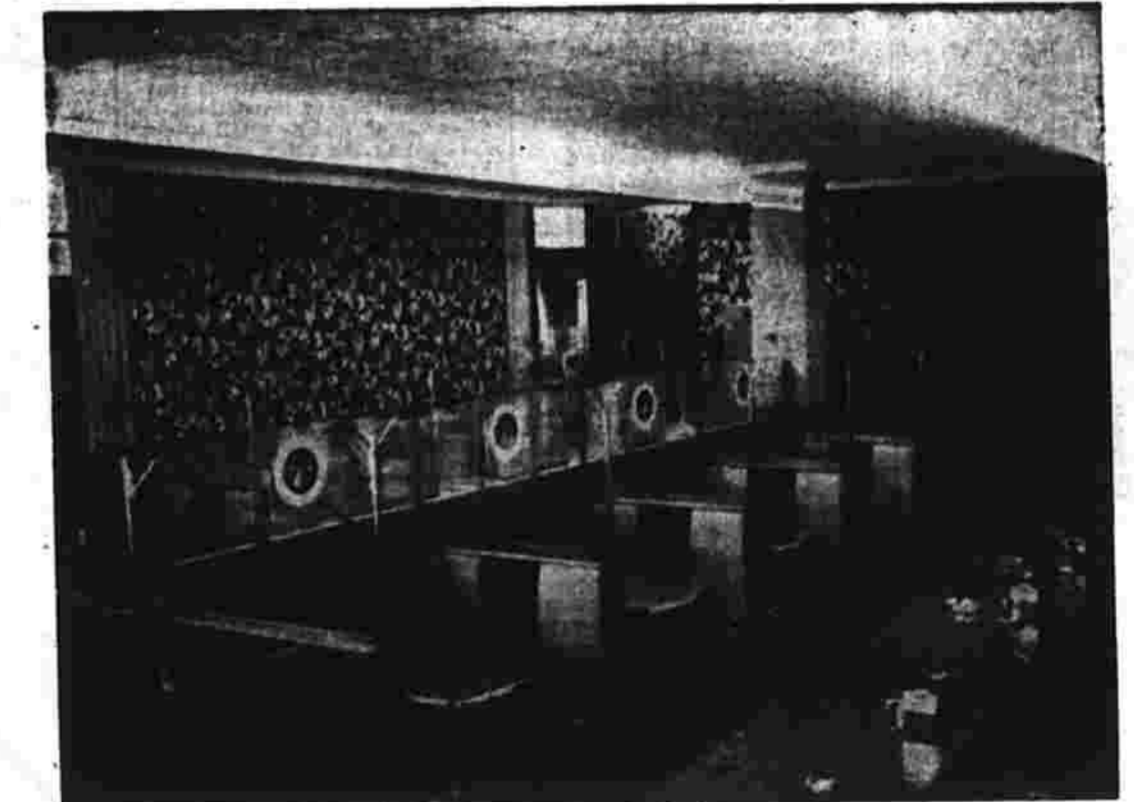
