Continue to Pledge Greeting of Russians

Paris, March 3.—(AP)—French Communist leaders are continuing to pledge their followers to greet Russian troops as liberators. The Communist newspaper Voproska, last night brought a thunderous ovation from 15,000 pro-Communists here. They repeated in a dozen different forms their current slogan: "France will never fight the Soviet Union."
Earlier, the Communist publication France Nouvelle published a month-old speech by Thorez in which he quoted the following statement made by Lenin in 1907: "In case war should break out, Socialists have the duty of interfering to end it promptly and to take advantage with all their strength of the economic and political crises created by the war to stir up a many party and to bring to the end of capitalist domination."
Thorez charged the leaders of the French government "on American orders" are "preparing an im-

perialist war against the Soviet Union."
"We must," he added, "break with all the treaties and agreements that have alienated the independence of our country."
The government meanwhile continued its roundup of spies. Interior Minister Jules Moch, target of bitter attacks by Russian agents, told the cabinet 20 persons have been or are being questioned and eight have been arrested.
Hesla Paul Moret, an employee of the Ministry of Industry and Commerce, was arrested yesterday and charged with conspiracy to conceal spying.
Police said he had been in contact with Communist French Army Maj. Louis Teulery, under arrest on a charge of giving military information to a foreign power.
Moret was brought into the ministry in 1946 while it was headed by a Communist, Marcel Paul.

Says Austrians Will Support Soviet Union

Vienna, Austria, March 3.—(AP)—The Austrian people will support the Soviet Union in case of a Communist invasion, the Communist newspaper Voproska said today.
The announcement in an unsigned editorial followed the pattern of the French Communist newspaper Thorez and Communist leaders in Italy, Germany, Britain, and the United States.
"The people of Austria will not stand behind the dollar," they will not raise their hands against the land of socialism," the paper declared.
Concentrating a bitter attack against the United States, Voproska alleged that the United States was spending half its budget for armaments, spending millions of dollars to arm Greece, Turkey, and other countries, and spending billions to build up military bases in France, Spain, Iceland and Greenland.
Charges Not Elaborated
Voproska itself did not elaborate on the charges concerning France and Spain.
The budget submitted to Congress by President Truman last year asked for \$41,588,000,000, of which \$14,000,000,000 is for national defense.
"It is not a fact," the paper continued, "that in Alaska roads leading to Siberia are being feverishly constructed? But the United States has forgotten one little thing—these roads also lead from Siberia to Alaska."
The Austrian Communist party will be one of the smallest in western Europe. It has four seats out of 163 in Parliament.

Red 'Stronghold'

The Republic of San Marino—38 square miles of it—has voted to keep its Communist-control free zone. The tiny state voted Red in 1945, becoming the only Communist government outside the Iron Curtain. At the recent election, 2,815 voted for the Communist-Socialist bloc, and 5,010 favored the anti-Communist party. San Marino claims to be the oldest state in the world.

ed at five committal services during the morning and consoled the bereaved. The caskets were placed in a trench with others and covered with tarpaulin pending preparation of permanent graves.
The pickets made no effort to interfere with the volunteer gravediggers but several made bitter comments about the cardinal and his helpers. One tipped his hat as the buses drove past him.
Called "strikebreakers" hat, Ed Ruggeri, chairman of the union's negotiating committee, termed the priests and spellman "strikebreakers."
"We think he (Cardinal Spellman) is being unfair to Catholic people and the people who support the seminarians," the union official said. "The seminarians are taking care of their parents, not of our mouths."
Ruggeri said the 300 strikers, members of the CIO United-Cannery Workers, are all Catholics. He said the number of pickets had not been increased and that no demonstration would be made against the cardinal.
The strikers want a five day week at the slow \$30.40 they now get for six days.

Hartford, March 3.—(AP)—Connecticut's state policemen are overworked and underpaid, says their boss, Commissioner Edward J. Hickey.
Hickey appeared before the General Assembly's Appropriations committee yesterday to urge that cuts made in his department's budget by Gov. Chester Bowles be restored.
He asked the committee to give "sincere consideration" to the department's request for increased salary schedules.
No Requests for Additions
Hickey pointed out that no requests for additions to the force had been made. This means, he said, that officers will continue on a 60-hour week, in contrast with the 48-hour week of most municipal police departments.
"Under the present salary brackets, a top grade patrolman who would have served at least eight years, receives an hourly rate of 91 cents. The average hourly rate for all patrolmen is about 82 cents."
The average pay for the whole police force is \$2,400 a year, or less than that for comparable work in other fields. Unlike municipal officers, police are prohibited from engaging in outside business to supplement their incomes, nor do they have the opportunity to obtain extra pay for working at theaters, private parties, and so forth.

500 Hours of Driving On Errands of Mercy Here

Manchester volunteer drivers for the Red Cross Motor Corps have more community service during 1948 than in any other year since its inception. The twenty-one tested drivers put in more than 500 hours of voluntary service in driving almost 8,000 miles on their errands of mercy.

Salary Brackets

The increases asked by Hickey in his department are: \$1,440-\$1,620; patrolman, \$1,980-\$2,160; sergeant, \$2,160-\$2,340; driver, \$2,340-\$2,520; inspector, \$2,700-\$2,880; sergeant, \$2,880-\$3,060; captain, \$3,240-\$3,420; major, \$3,420-\$3,600; lieutenant, \$3,600-\$3,780; and major, \$3,780-\$3,960.
The governor recommended that the state police department's payroll requests be cut by \$46,410. His budget for the department also slashed \$60,900 from funds for equipment and \$36,420 from its food, gas, oil and motor vehicles supplies.
Hickey was asked if his department could operate efficiently on the amount recommended by the governor.
"We can't operate efficiently on the recommended budget," he replied. "We can't do all that is expected of us unless we have the money to do it. The men are entitled to it."

Treason Trial Recess Today

Former Foreign Minister Tries to Win Alleviation for Ziapkov
Sofia, Bulgaria, March 3.—(AP)—A court recess for Bulgaria's independence day interrupted the trial of 15 Protestant pastors on treason charges today.
Prosecution and defense summations began tomorrow after the conclusion yesterday of defense testimony, highlighted by an effort of a former foreign minister to win alleviation of the possible penalty for the Rev. Vassil Ziapkov, chief defendant.
George Kulchev, the former minister testified that contrary to previous evidence Ziapkov was not an official member of the Bulgarian delegation to the Paris Peace conference in 1946. The prosecution alleged that Ziapkov gave information to western delegates at the conference.
Might Light Sentence
Bulgarian law provides the death penalty for divulging official secret information. Ziapkov's defense attorney said Ziapkov was only a private member of the delegation he upheld by the court in 1949.
The court's decision in the case may be reached Monday.
The prosecution abruptly terminated the case yesterday when it announced it was not calling the remaining 43 of its 53 witnesses because the evidence already was "abundant and clear."

Insurance Act Change Urged

Legislation for Revision Introduced by Patterson Today

Washington, March 3.—(AP)—Legislation revising the national service life insurance act of 1946 was introduced today by Representative Patterson (R-Conn.).

In a statement, the congressman said that national service life insurance has become the largest insurer in the world.

Congress should from time to time examine "this vast operation," he said, and make revisions which would result in greater efficiency and extended service.

May Reinstatement Lapsed Policies

His bill provides that lapsed policies may be reinstated at any time upon presentation of medical evidence (that the applicant's health is as good as when the policy was allowed to lapse).

"Normal deterioration of health because of disparity in age would be determined administratively," he said.

"This section would encourage the reinstatement of large numbers of policies which have been discontinued because of either financial difficulties on the part of the insured, or ignorance of benefits which accrue through NLI."

A provision would permit retention or increasing the insurance to maximum coverage upon conversion or reinstatement.

Another section would provide for a change in issuance of policies. The commissioner's standard ordinary table of mortality would be substituted for the American experience table now in use, and Patterson said this would result in savings to applicants.
