New Haven, March S.—(P)—A human skeleton was found yesterday in a pile of debris in a burned out tenement house on East street here.

A workman poking through the fruins of the tenement, scene of a three clarm fire Jan. 18, 1948, found a skull and called police. The rest of the skeleton then was probable that the person died in the fire, which claimed another life. "There is absolutely no question of foul play," he said.
