Sherwood A. Cheney
 The opening and the closing years of Brigadier General Sherwood A. Cheney's life were spent in Manchester. The 40 year span between was one of consistently military, commercial, and administrative service to his country.
 He served the American flag in many posts, in many countries. Always his service was marked by increased rank and responsibility for him.
 After his retirement, he made no special claim to prestige for his service. He regarded it as his duty done, and except on rare occasions, maintained a soldier's reticence with regard to his experiences. He was a good soldier, and a good citizen, and Manchester was proud to claim him.

Greenland and the Pact
 For Denmark, and for us, the prospect that Denmark may enter the North Atlantic Defense Pact raises what is now an old and unpleasant question between our two nations.
 Would Denmark's decision to join in the Pact mean that we would finally surrender back to Denmark our bases in Denmark's western hemisphere possession, Greenland? Or would it mean that Denmark would be called upon to give us that legal right to permanent occupation of Greenland, which is what we have been trying to get from Denmark ever since the war?

This question was obviously on the top of Danish Foreign Minister Rasmussen's mind, as he was engaged in his talks with State Department officials in Washington Saturday. There is as yet no indication of the answer he got.
 So far, all that is visible, on the surface, is the difference between the reception and the publicity given Foreign Minister Rasmussen on his present visit and the reception and the publicity he received on a previous visit. That previous visit was a year ago, when Foreign Minister Rasmussen came on a special mission to Washington for one specific purpose. That was to ask that this great country honor Danish sovereignty in Greenland and surrender back to Denmark the bases it was still holding there. On this occasion, Foreign Minister Rasmussen got the cold shoulder. He got Secretary of State Marshall's negative answer. And the American press had no enthusiasm for reporting the spectacle of a friendly nation's foreign minister coming over here to claim his country's own and getting no answer from the world's greatest democracy.

This time his reception is more cordial, but the problem still survives. For if his country comes within the North Atlantic Defense Pact, what do we do with regard to our bases in Greenland? It is important not only between us and Denmark, but it will also be important as a revelation of the character of the Pact itself. Norway, for instance, says it will join the pact, but never grant us bases in peacetime. But what the pact really means with regard to our possession of bases in the countries who sign it will depend upon what requirement we make of Denmark with regard to Greenland. In that decision we will reveal what we really mean by the Pact, and on that decision will depend at least part of the answer to the question of whether or not the Pact is to be something which stops short of compelling Russia to war.

Was This Sanity?
 Was it wise or sanity which governed the vote in the executive board of the United Nations International Children's Agency Fund the other day?

Every one knows there is a cold war on, which threatens momentarily to become hot and final. Every one knows that the United Nations, in all its more important agencies, has become a mere sounding board for claims and propaganda strategy from both sides of the cold war.
 Yet, in the face of such normal standards for the conduct of nations and the United Nations, the Children's Emergency Fund executive board voted the other day, against a British proposal to make a drastic reduction in the United Nations program for providing milk and food for the children of Poland, Czechoslovakia, Rumania, Bulgaria and Hungary.
 The British proposal was in the present state of the world, legitimate enough. Why should the United Nations provide milk and food to the children of these Communist satellite countries, thus helping the Communist soldiers of the future? Why not, as the British proposal specified, take this milk and food away from our enemies, and give it to the more friendly children of India, Pakistan, Southeast Asia, and Latin America?

Yet there was, as the Children's Fund executive board voted, a surprising unanimity against the British proposal. Not only Russia and Yugoslavia opposed it, but the United States and Canada also opposed it, and it was voted down by a wide margin. The United Nations will continue feeding children in the so-called Iron Curtain countries.
 Thus survives, temporarily at least, some vestige of the original theory that the United Nations is an organization for all the world, dedicated to serving the world's needs regardless of geography or politics or creed.
 Thus has been missed, temporarily at least, an opportunity for the western world to unite on the theory that children deserve to starve, if they are so misguided as to be born in a Communist country.

Local Student In College Revue
 Paul Maynard, of 22 Dover road, is a member of the 22 Dover road planning committee and also of the orchestra at Boston University that will present their own original musical revue entitled "Anything Can Happen" at the Charles Hayden Memorial Auditorium, Boston, Wednesday evening, March 16.
 Special features of the revue, which is being produced by the Fantasia Club, honorary musical society at the Boston College of Music, include a progressive story on "How a Song Is Born" and a South American "cabaret" scene with six-foot handsome "cabaretiers" taking the roles of the performers. The show includes a cast of 60 students of the university.

Timely Holiday
 John L. Lewis has ordered his miners into a "period of inaction." For two weeks they will refrain from digging coal. While they might be digging coal, they will be thinking hard thoughts about President Truman's appointment of Dr. James Boyd as director of the United States Bureau of Mines, which is apparently as big a grievance as Mr. Lewis has on tap at the moment. They will all be thinking memorial thoughts about miners who have been killed or injured in their work.
 These are Mr. Lewis' stage directions. They tell nothing of the real plot of the play.
 The plot, we think, is even a little more subtle, this time, than usual. His first aim, obviously enough, is to reduce the country's supply of coal so that, come contract negotiating time in June, Mr. Lewis will once more be able to threaten to shut down American industry.
 But reducing the amount of coal ready for consumption will do more than strengthen Mr. Lewis' own hand. It will also help keep coal prices up. Mr. Lewis' announcement, partially enough, comes only a few days after the first reductions in the price of coal had been announced, giving rise to reports that general price reductions might be on the offing.
 Now, we presume, Mr. Lewis' threat of future coal scarcity will cancel out any thought of cheaper coal for the American public. It is, therefore, not too certain that the mine owners and operators will really be as mad as Mr. Lewis as they may pretend to be. In fact, it looks as if Mr. Lewis had begun to take the owners and operators under his own expansive and protecting wing, guaranteeing to protect their price and profit margins as well as the wage standards of his own miners.

Bi-Partisan
 The two political parties divided evenly, last Friday night, in providing the votes by which the Senate light to end the filibuster was cast. The Democrats provided 22 votes against their pronounced administration policy. The Republicans also provided 22 votes against their own frequent party pledges.
 Most of the Democratic Senators voting to perpetuate filibuster had a sectional reason for their vote. They were Southern Senators, who sincerely believe that the civil rights legislation which would follow the banning of Senate filibusters would be bad legislation.
 The Republican Senators who voted to continue to have filibusters were in no such clear position. Some of them, in spite of their own official party position, are against civil rights legislation. Some of them want to preserve the filibuster for their own future use. A few of them, like Senator Vandenberg, were primarily concerned with their belief that the parliamentary maneuver to end filibusters by voting for or against a ruling from the chair, rather than by frank adoption of an amendment to the Senate rules, was not a sound and consistent tactic.
 But, when all the voting was summed up, both parties had failed in their pledge to end filibusters and enact civil rights legislation. Perhaps they never really intended anything different.

Former Resident Is Awarded Honor
 Ralph Scuderi, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank P. Scuderi of 57 Oak Street, was recently awarded First Mention by the Beaux Arts Institute of Design in New York on a drawing entitled "Statue of Liberty and Information Center." Scuderi was one of two students of architecture from the University of Pennsylvania who submitted drawings.
 Outstanding architectural students from colleges, universities throughout the country were selected to enter their work for evaluation by the Beaux Arts Institute.
 Scuderi was graduated from Manchester High school with the class of 1942. During World War II he served with the Air Corps as a pilot, and upon his discharge was employed for several months at the University of Pennsylvania. Scuderi and his wife, the former Edna Sharkey of Detroit, are residing in Pennsylvania.
