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Measles Cases Lead in State
Increase Slightly During Past Week; Two Diphtheria Patients
Hartford, March 22.—Measles cases increased slightly during the past seven-day period, to become the most prevalent disease within Connecticut, according to the weekly summary of reportable diseases of the state Department of Health. There were 531 new cases of this disease recorded during the past week, in contrast to 501 cases for the previous period. German measles cases increased from 77 to 83 during the same period while bronchitis pneumonia cases rose from 41 to 54. Lobar pneumonia cases from 24 to 40, streptococcus throat cases from 10 to 14, ringworm of the scalp from 2 to 13 cases and diphtheria from no cases to 2. Both diphtheria cases were reported from Bridgeport. Two diphtheria patients were reported from the city of Hartford. Both children, and both were on the decline. Cholelithiasis cases dropped from 603 to 548, and those of scarlet fever from 56 to 47.

 Columbia Congregational church, built in the summer of 1822, has been presented with a rough board, which may be called a plaque, on which appear the names of the builders, information as to the Grange which met on the interest of the day. It was apparently made by the men, perhaps while they rested from their work during the noon hours. It is an ordinary looking piece of wood, finished, probably North Carolina pine, one man said. The board is a gift of Harold W. Taylor, of Hillhouse and Taylor of Willmarctic. Mr. Taylor told that when he was a boy, through whom he learned the presentation that it had been passed on to him by his mother, the former Jennie Fuller. The name of her great-grandfather and Mr. Taylor's great-grandfather, Jonathan C. Fuller is neatly burned into the board. He was 23 years. The name of Elmore G. Dewey holds another prominent spot on the board, and his too. He is the great uncle, to numerous other local residents including the families as the Lymanas. His home, now occupied by Alfred Brand, is one of the finest and most beautiful in town and stands at the top of the hill overlooking what is known as Old Hop River and in the section which was once called the new Charles purchase. The land bought from Lebanon was in the original purchase of the Fuller family lived at the center. There are other Fullers in the town, but Mr. Brand says that the name of the Fuller family is prominent in Columbia history. The name is associated with the town in the old days, known as Bacon Hall, Ezra Daggett of Middlebury, Georgia, buried his name on the board. Electric Vote Plan Offered

Automatic Voting System Proposal Before Rules Committee

Hartford, March 22.—An attempt is being made to set school from the "electrical age" in voting procedure.

Chairman of the Legislature's Rules committee today has announced a proposal for installation of electrical automatic roll calling system in the House and Senate.

The streamlined system would replace the age-old "Ayes" and "Noes" voting system. It has been advocated by Legislative councils on a number of occasions. It would cut roll call voting time to a few minutes.

Installation in Connecticut's "electrical" House of Representatives would run much higher than the average. It would cost \$100,000. The House here has 272 members and the average roll call takes 15 minutes. The Senate has 36 members and the average roll call takes 10 minutes.

The International Roll Call Association would cost \$44,000. The House here has 272 members and the average roll call takes 15 minutes. The Senate has 36 members and the average roll call takes 10 minutes.

Installation would be much less in the Senate where there are only 36 members. Initial cost would be \$12,000, with an annual operating cost of \$2,000. Outright cost is \$22,000.

Among states now using such a system are New York, Pennsylvania, North Dakota and California.

Cheney Tech News Items

A recent addition to the instructional equipment of the Cheney Technical School is a new General Electric dynamometer, installed in the electrical department.

The equipment consists of three main parts, the cradled dynamometer, a control panel containing the necessary switches, instruments and load resistors to regulate the current, and a tachometer and speedometer to indicate the speed of rotation.

The dynamometer is a permanent magnet type and is capable of measuring torque up to 100 foot-pounds. It is used in the study of the characteristics of electric motors and in the study of the characteristics of synchronous and induction motors.
