Atomic Bomb Seen Preventing Russia Moving in Europe

Churchill Tells World Europe Would Have Been Communized and London Under Bombardment But for Deterrent of A-Bomb

Boston, April 1.—(AP)—Doughty old Winston Churchill thrust out his bulldog jaw, and told the world that: "Europe would have been communized—like Czechoslovakia—and London under bombardment some time ago but for the deterrent of the atomic bomb in the hands of the United States."

"War Not Inevitable"
But, he said, "war is not inevitable."

Speaking of the "war of nerves" he advised the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Mid-Century convocation last night:

"If we persevere steadfastly together, and allow no appeasement of tyranny and wrong-doing in any form, if we stick to the core of the structure of our civilization which will break—something else will break, and peace may yet be preserved."

"Recipe for Peace"
Reaction from abroad was slow, but the first British newspapers to comment called the speech a "recipe for peace" and "remarkable."

These comments came from three Conservative British newspapers, The Yorkshire Post, The London Daily Mail, and The Daily Telegraph.

In a letter expressing his regret at being unable to fulfill his own engagement to speak tonight at the convocation, President Truman said:

"Mr. Churchill, I'm sure, will give you something that will be historical for this period."
Harold E. Stassen replaces the president as tonight's speaker.

Blunt Accusation
Churchill rolled out in sonorous tones a blunt accusation that "13 men in the Kremlin . . . sitting at the rule of the world" had "set preservation" as the root of their "insidious and malignant policy."

Repeating the phrase, "these 13 men in the Kremlin," Churchill said their "insidious" are in every country as a fifth column, awaiting the day when they hope to be the absolute masters of their

Jury Decides Taylor Guilty

Senator Fined \$50 and Sentenced to 180 Days in Jail; Appeal Filed

Birmingham, Ala., April 1.—(AP)—A circuit court jury pleased just about everybody directly concerned when it convicted Senator Glen H. Taylor (D-Idaho) of disorderly conduct last night.

The jury fined Taylor \$50 and sentenced him to 180 days in jail. "That's fine," said Taylor. He added that the verdict gives him a chance to test the case in higher courts through appeal. His appeal was filed immediately.

City attorneys and Police Commissioner Eugene (Bull) Connor agreed with the senator that the verdict was final.

Taylor, then a candidate for vice president on the ticket with Henry Wallace, was arrested by City Police May 1. He had attempted to enter a door reserved for Negroes at a meeting of the Southern Negro Youth congress.

The police court trial May 4 resulted in a fine of \$50 and a sentence of 180 days. The circuit court trial was on appeal from that conviction.

Taylor, on the stand and through his attorneys, contended the case arose from Birmingham laws requiring separation of white persons and Negroes.

Judge George Lewis Bailey, presiding in Circuit court, disagreed in these words:

"If this defendant committed the acts charged at the entrance to an old ladies' quilting party, is he more or less guilty?"

Taylor took the stand to say "segregation is the issue," and so deny testimony of city witnesses that he sought to force his way into the May 1 meeting.

An all-white jury took an hour to decide the senator was guilty. The penalty if fixed is just 50 dollars or 180 days. The jail sentence of 180 days is the limit.

The Idaho senator's case now goes to the Alabama Court of Appeals at Montgomery. It probably will come up with other cases from this county in November.

Taylor testified that he was han-

Solons Agree Bomb Secret Keeps Peace

Churchill's Speech Produces Expected Reaction in Congress; Critics Led by Langer

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—Congressional leaders agreed today with Winston Churchill that world peace now hangs on continued possession of the atomic bomb secret by this country.

Churchill's speech in Boston last night, praising the Marshall plan, the North Atlantic pact and unity among free peoples, produced the expected reaction in Congress.

In general, the lawmakers who support such foreign policy moves expressed their approval. But there also were critics—led by Senator Langer (R-ND), who carried on a bitter attack on the wartime British prime minister on the Senate floor yesterday.

McMahon Comments
Senator McMahon (D-Conn.), chairman of the Joint Congressional Atomic committee, said of the Boston speech:

"Mr. Churchill correctly judges the part the atomic bomb plays in presently keeping the peace. However we shall not remain the exclusive possessors of the atomic bomb in the future and Mr. Churchill, unlike so many others, realizes it."

Senator Hickenlooper (R-Iowa), former chairman of the Joint Atomic group, agreed with Churchill that the "atomic bomb" has been the major deterrent to Russian aggression up to this point.

"That does not mean we can keep them exclusive indefinitely," Hickenlooper said. "The North Atlantic pact is a major step toward unity of free nations which will be another deterrent against aggression."

Chairman Tydings (D-Md) of the Senate Armed Services committee said the "atomic bomb" is the key to our defense, of course, but we need other military arms to prevent World War III.

Tydings also agreed with Churchill that this nation's atomic monopoly is undoubtedly a temporary advantage.

Senator Gurney (R-S.D.), who preceded Tydings as Armed Services chairman, supported Churchill's plea for unity against aggression.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio), chairman of the G. O. P. Policy committee, commented: "I agree with Churchill that the worst disaster since our victory is the collapse of China," and added that this was the direct outcome of administration's policies.

Senator Brewster (R-Me.) said Churchill's views might "require

Baby Tornado Hurts Three

Damage from \$150,000 To \$200,000 in Sudden Twister's Wake

Uniontown, Pa., April 1.—(AP)—A baby tornado that injured three persons as it swept across the Uniontown country club and six farms left damage unofficially estimated today at from \$150,000 to \$200,000.

The sudden twister partially demolished the Country club building and cut a 50-yard swath across nearby farms before disappearing in the Blue Ridge mountains yesterday.

Two Treated at Hospital
Two of those injured were treated at Uniontown hospital, Leo Williams, 35, of Uniontown, sustained back injuries, while Virginia Lant, five of nearby Hopewell, was treated for bruises suffered when the wind hurled her against a barn.

Edwin Small, a dairy farmer, was slightly hurt when his barn was overturned by the twister.

Small estimated damage to his barn, fruit orchards and an open-air movie screen he operates at \$40,000. Attorney Robert C. Hagan, president of the Uniontown Country club, estimated damage there at \$100,000.

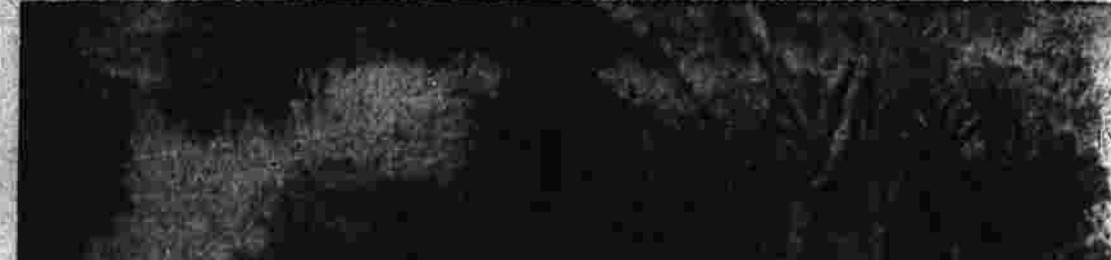
Garage Tossed in Air
Several other houses were damaged also. A two-car garage near Hopwood was tossed into the air with wreckage strewn along highway 40.

Survey Shows Gloomy Signs

Government Economists Assert Index Risking Reputation in Report

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—A survey of business spending plans today posted some fairly gloomy signs for the last half of 1949. However, government economists said that this index—which has forecast economic busts in the past—is risking its reputation for accuracy.

The collective bet of American businessmen on the future was posted in their plans for spending on new factories and equipment. Clearly, they figure that things are going to be aiding down through the final months of the year.

The survey, by two government agencies, pointed to business' decision to cutback outlays in last half 1949 by 14 per cent under last year. The theory is that prospects for profits would be poorer.

First-half 1949 factory and equipment buying, however, will run five per cent above the same period of 1948's record high—at least partly because of a lot of plant construction that couldn't be halted on short notice.

While businessmen's expectations are gloomy, the government's "Federal business enterprises" was so snarled by dissenting opinions that on one subject—public power—it could offer no recommendation. That had majority support.

But a majority urged that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, the major source of Federal credit in war and depression, be reorganized into a mere guarantor of private bank loans.

"Waste and favoritism" and "even corruption" are invited when the government makes direct loans to firms and individuals in the housing, farm and industrial fields, said the members led by Chairman Herbert Hoover.

Sharp disagreement on this and on proposed curtailment of Federal power activities was led by Secretary of State Acheson, vice chairman.

The result was a report marked by basic policy conflicts, the last of an 18-installment series on government reform drafted by the 12-member, bi-partisan commission headed by the former Republican president.

There was agreement that re-

Will Not Halt Wire-Tapping

Clark Says Practice Will Not Be Abandoned by Government

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—Attorney General Clark today said it is not going to abandon the use of wire-tapping in cases involving national security or a matter of life and death.

He acknowledged, however, that he will not press for one controversial provision in the administration bill to tighten anti-espionage laws. That provision would permit use in courts of information obtained from wire-tapping by the FBI and Military Intelligence.

Letter Creates Flurry
The two positions were disclosed as an aftermath to a flurry created yesterday by a letter sent to chairman McCarran (D., Nev.) of the Senate Judiciary committee. It was signed by representatives of the Americans for Democratic Action and the American Civil Liberties union.

The two organizations voiced strong approval of McCarran's action in removing the wire-tapping section from the administration bill.

They also went on to say that FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover had acknowledged publicly that the FBI does tap telephones in certain cases. The letter added that Hoover's statement "is an admission that he is violating the law."

No Basis on Books Now
McCarran said this wasn't so, that there is no law banning wire-tapping on the books now.

Clark, in a separate interview, told a reporter the department will continue as it has done for many years, to tap wires when national security, or life and death such as in a kidnapping case, is involved.

He said there "is no justification" for the criticism made by ADA and Civil Liberties group. McCarran also said there was no reason for any "furore."

He praised Hoover as a "great American" who has done a "great job" for his country.

Top Diplomat Says Russians Need Not Worry About Pact

Russians May Decide to See Treaties Dead

Virtually Certain to So Regard Pacts With France and Britain As Alliance Signed

Moscow, April 1.—(AP)—The Soviet union is virtually certain to consider her treaties with Britain and France dead upon the signing of the North Atlantic Security Alliance, informed sources said today.

The Russians denounced the pact today, calling it an offensive instrument aimed at striking fear into nations which refused to accept world domination by the British and Americans. The Soviet memorandum to the seven original sponsors of the Atlantic pact said the treaty undermines the "very foundations" of the United Nations and violates international agreements.

Rejects Suggestion
(The British Foreign Office rejected any suggestion by Russia that the Atlantic treaty violates either the U.N. charter or the British-Russian friendship treaty.)

When the Soviet Foreign Ministry originally denounced the Atlantic alliance early this year, diplomats took the view that the year treaties signed by France and Britain with Russia during the war were in jeopardy.

The Russians now have raised just this point: That clauses in both treaties stipulate that neither party shall join alliances directed against the other.

Russia says specifically that the Atlantic alliance is directed against the Soviet Union. If this is considered by Russia to be the case, she would deem it as a violation of the clauses in the two 20-year treaties.

Provisions of Treaties
The British-Soviet treaty executed in London May 26, 1947, stipulates in Article 7: "Each of the high contracting parties undertakes not to conclude any alliance and not to take part in any coalition."

Taft Proposes Spending Slash

Answer to Truman Argument Federal Deficit More Hurtful

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) offered his proposed \$3,000,000,000 slash in Federal spending today as the answer to President Truman's argument that a Federal deficit would hurt more than a tax boost.

Taft, who heads the Senate GOP Policy committee, commented: "If we can cut 10 per cent out of most of these appropriation bills that are coming along we can save \$3,000,000,000 and have a comfortable surplus of more than \$2,000,000,000 to apply on the debt."

Mr. Truman has predicted that the government will run \$375,000,000 in the red in the year beginning next July 1, unless taxes are increased. His warning that such a deficit would do more damage than higher taxes came at his news conference yesterday.

But Taft contended this would be only a "book deficit." To put on new taxes in a time of falling prices would do more harm than good, the Ohioan added.

Chairman George (D. Ga.) of the Senate Finance committee agreed with Taft that the way to keep the budget balanced is to cut spending—not raise taxes.

However, Senator Russell (D-Ga.) said he's so worried by the mammoth national debt that, in addition to cutting down appropriations, he would be willing to vote for more taxes if he could be certain the money would go to retire the debt.

Russell has joined with Taft in a proposal to cut 10 per cent off the proposed cash outlays for the European recovery program—a move that Senator Lucas of Illinois, the Democratic leader, said he has the votes to beat.

Supports Anti-Tax Stand
Senator Brewster (R-Me.) said he supports the Taft-George stand against slapping any new taxes on individuals and business.

"Apparently the president is the only person in the country who doesn't know that the boom is over and the problem now is how

Taxi Drivers Go on Strike

701 Cabs Cruise New York Streets Under Protection of Police

New York, April 1.—(AP)—A ten-ton freight taxicab strike started early today. As the morning rush hour began 701 cabs were reported cruising city streets under the protection of 3,000 extra police.

A police department survey at 5 a. m. today showed 421 feet taxicabs and 280 independents operating over special safety lanes designated by police.

The city has more than 11,000 cabs. Police were uncertain how many normally operate during the morning hours but it was obvious that far fewer were rolling than usual.

There were no immediate reports of violence in the strike, called by the union in its bid for recognition as bargaining agent for the drivers. Union officials had threatened that not "a wheel would roll" once the strike order went out.

Police Patrol Streets
An extraordinary police squad, armed with anti-riot weapons, pat-

Court Denies Claim on Pay

Decision on Overtime May Set National Precedent

San Francisco, April 1.—(AP)—A court denial of a union claim for overtime on overtime pay may set a national precedent for cases involving millions of dollars.

Federal District Judge Louis E. Goodman yesterday ruled 1,300 Air Force longshoremen were not entitled to pay claims estimated at \$1,000,000. The union had brought suit in 1947 and 1948 against west coast water-front employers.

The longshoremen contended they should have received time and one-half their night pay scale for overtime work at night.

Employers held this would be overtime on overtime, since the night rate already was time and a half as compared to the day scale.

Cities Postal to Postal Act
In denying the union petition, Judge Goodman cited the 1947 postal to postal pay act. It exempted the employer from overtime provisions after 40 hours' work if he pleads and proves that the act or omission complained of was in good faith and in conformity with and reliance upon any administrative regulation, or interpretation of any agency of the United States.

Deck employers contended they were conforming with a 1938 ruling by a regional attorney for the Labor department that their pay practices were legal.

The union announced it would file for a new trial and appeal if necessary.

The U. S. Supreme court recently returned to a lower court similar suits involving eastern longshoremen for testimony on employers' good faith.

All They Have to Do Is Not Attack Any Member Nation; Reasserts American Position North Atlantic Alliance Purely Defensive; New Blast Not Affecting Signing Plans

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—A top State department official suggested today that the Russians need not worry about the North Atlantic treaty; all they have to do is not attack any member nation. This official, who declined to be identified by name, reasserted the American government's position that the treaty is purely defensive.

He said that any nation which has any doubts about it can fully protect itself by refraining from attack on any of the member countries.

Plan Formal Signing
This informal reaction to Russia's protest against the alliance came as plans went ahead for the formal signing of the treaty on Monday. It was clear that the new Soviet bid was not disturbing those plans in any way.

The Soviet protest, delivered late yesterday, was translated at the State department only this morning. It is still under consideration.

The department, therefore, was hesitant to take any formal position on it until it had been thoroughly studied by Secretary of State Acheson and other top authorities.

Among those determining the State department's final attitude on it is Acheson's top adviser on Russian policy, State Department Counselor Charles E. Bohlen.

Purpose To Affect Opinion
The State department spokesman declared that the obvious purpose of the Russian note is to have an effect on world public opinion. He said that was shown by the fact that the note was published by Moscow as soon as it had been delivered in the capitals of the Atlantic power countries.

The spokesman made it entirely clear that the United States government may consider the treaty to be without any foundation in fact and may formally reject it.

If the decision is made not to send a formal reply to the Russian government, then the Soviet argu-

Suffocate in Fire
Hollywood, April 1.—(AP)—Fath Hampton, beautiful silent screen actress and cousin of Hope Hampton, and her husband, Don Short, succumbed today as fire destroyed their one-room apartment, police reported. A newboy discovered smoke pouring from the tiny garage home this morning, but the couple was dead by the time firemen quelled the blaze. Police listed both as about 30 years old.

Must Complete "Basic Tasks"
Washington, April 1.—(AP)—If the United States is "to avoid losing" any future war, Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg testified today the Air Force must be able to complete "three basic tasks" in a hurry. The triple job, he said, is to hit hard at an aggressor, defend this country, and support other U. S. forces. The four-star Air Force general told a Senate Armed Services subcommittee the air arm can do it if Congress approves the so-called 10-group Air Force bill already passed by the House, and their later votes necessary funds.

144 Injured in Clashes
Nanking, April 1.—(AP)—Garrison headquarters announced 144 persons were injured—11 of them seriously—in two clashes between soldiers and university students this afternoon. The clashes resulted from anti-government demonstrations following departure of a government peace delegation to negotiate with the Communists in Peiping.

Dollar Deficit Out
Paris, April 1.—(AP)—Western Europe cut its dollar deficit considerably in the first six months of the Marshall plan. Recovery program experts said the 19 Marshall plan areas imported from the United States \$228,000,000 more than they exported in the period of April through November, 1948. The average for 1947 was \$284,000,000.
