From Minus To Plus

Senator Ralph Flinders, the Vermont Republican and industrialist, made a deadly earnest speech in the Senate yesterday. His speech included a veiled threat that he might range himself against "restoration of the North Atlantic Pact. Why? Because he believes that this country ought to take the peace offensive and try to win peace before it departs more time and energy and reputation and money to the techniques of war.

The United States, in its present policy, Senator Flinders charged, is about to take measures which leave absolutely no possibility of opening up a door of understanding and hope in the wall that separates us from the Russian people.

What he would rather see, he said, is a peace offensive of our own, vigorous and imaginative. The Senate, he said, should put a price on its ratification of the North Atlantic Pact. That price should be a demand for "change in attitude and policy in the direction of a strong political offensive which is fundamentally friendly to the people of Russia."

The North Atlantic Pact, Senator Flinders said, is likely to cost us twenty billions of dollars.

"This," he said, "is the price we are paying for a defeat in the cold-war. Must we forever have our policy determined by a foreign power? Is there no way in which we can take the initiative, so that we become the determining force in our relations instead of being passively dependent on the moves of an adversary?"

"I firmly believe that we can shift our attitude from minus to plus, from retreat to advance, from a slow drift toward defeat back to definite victory."

Cancer Fund Lagging Here

Only \$1,420 Contributed of the \$6,398 Quota For This District

Progress in the Cancer Society's drive for funds in this district was reported today by Mrs. Silvanus, chairman, who stated that the amount raised to date is considerably less than half the quota, although the drive has been almost completed.

"Response to the Cancer Fight fund seems to be lagging at present," Mrs. Silvanus said, "and it is certain that extra efforts will have to be made in order to reach the goal. Since ten per cent of all money collected in town will be used entirely for service to Manchester's own patients, it is imperative that the greatest possible amount be raised within the next two weeks."

Of this ten per cent, set aside for local use, the total amount will be expended for medication, radium treatment, X-ray therapy, diagnostic examinations and similar services aimed at relieving sufferers in our community. As the result of last year's successful campaign, \$200 was obtained for these services. As the need for cancer detection and treatment increases, naturally the call for funds increases in proportion. To ward against cancer effectively, nothing less than the united efforts of the entire town will be enough. Unless the fund raising represents the very best efforts of the townspeople, cancer relief will lack much of the strength that requires a sound financial backing.

Long-Range Success Of ERP Seen Possible

Feeling of Cautious Optimism Growing Now Among Men on Inside of Program

Paris, April 14 (AP)—Men on the inside of the European Recovery program claim it now has a 40 to 60 per cent chance of long-range success.

A year ago, they saw only a 20 per cent chance. But they say their feeling of cautious optimism is growing.

The European Recovery program—ERP—has already cost the United States five billion dollars since it was started April 3, 1948. Cost may reach 17 billion.

The total cost may reach 17 billion dollars before the program is completed in mid-1952.

The payoff hoped for is nothing less than this: The peaceful evolution of diverse nations toward self-sustaining European unity, which will foster economic well-being and virile democracy for all of them.

More simply, the payoff might, with the impact of the Atlantic treaty, be a kind of United States of Western Europe.

Only a proper fortune-teller could pretend to know now whether Western Europe will ultimately reach this objective. The ERP, in wanting in this direction, is strictly a gamble.
