Voice of America Propaganda Seen As Chief Weapon

Committee of American Society of Newspaper Editors Favors Strengthening of Major Weapon in Cold War Against Russians

Washington, April 21.—(AP)—The "propaganda of truth" beamed abroad by the State department is a major weapon of the cold war and should be strengthened, a committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors declared today. Three hundred newspaper editors met in a special meeting here today to discuss the "propaganda of truth" program.

Viewed as inadequate "The program is even more important than it was when first conceived; that it is effective as far as it is able to go; that it is inadequate to the requirements of foreign policy in today's world."

The committee held that a "much larger" sum is required than the \$50,000,000 authorized by Congress for the Voice of America broadcast program.

Concurring with a recent study of the congressional-created United States Commission on International Information, the committee said the information budget should be brought into better balance with the country's multi-billion dollar military and foreign aid programs.

The great struggle for the minds of men is a continuous part of the cold war, a struggle which continues on a global scale. It is a struggle which has no end.

The committee urged that the State department be authorized to conduct an effective program of foreign information.

Hartford, April 21.—(AP)—Four Negro members of the Middletown High School senior class, who did not participate in the annual senior class trip to Washington, D. C., "because of segregation in the nation's capital," today received an invitation from Gov. Bowles to visit him for a "little chat" in Hartford.

In letters to Wardell Moody, Julia and Jean McArthur, and Louise Woods, the governor told them they were invited to visit him at his home in Middletown, Conn., on Saturday, April 23, and on Sunday, April 24.

The governor declared that "there are a lot of us in public life who disagree of the segregation in Washington, D. C." and that "we are working daily to do away with this kind of injustice which is a reflection on our country and a denial of most of the things you have been taught here."

"We in Connecticut are doing a great deal to make our state the best of places which every state ought to be," he said.

Gov. Bowles wrote, "I want to commend you on the courage and spirit which you and your classmates conducted in the demonstration in Washington, D. C."

The governor referred to the decision of several other Middletown seniors to join with their Negro classmates in foregoing the Washington, D. C., trip which he had just invited to attend this service.

School Board Seeks Advice

Asks Whether It Has Power to Bar Children Not Given Test

Bridgeport, April 21.—(AP)—City Attorney Harry Schwartz's advice was sought today by the Bridgeport Board of Education. The board wants to know whether it can make immunization "a condition of admission to public schools here."

The board voted last night, at a special meeting, to ask Schwartz whether it has authority "to bar children from entering the education system without proof of immunization or a negative Schick test."

Such a requirement was recommended to the board in a letter from Dr. Richard O'Brien, city health officer.

His letter stated that the board of Health Commissioners, at a meeting April 14, proposed that the Education department "make it a rule that no child be admitted to school for the first time...without first showing proof of having been immunized and having had a negative Schick test."

The letter said the recommendation was made "to insure against a repetition of what is now taking place; that is, numerous cases of diphtheria that could have been prevented had these people been properly immunized at the time."

It also requested that pupils transferring to Bridgeport schools from other communities show proof of immunization.
