Police Chief Waits Test of Meter

Chief of Police Hermann Schmidt is awaiting a letter from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology before making his final selection of the type of parking meter that will be installed in Manchester.

M.I.T. has conducted an intensive study of all types of parking meters, taking them on the basis of mechanical perfection, efficiency, etc. The chief has selected one meter which he believes to be superior to the others, but wishes to check his findings with those of M.I.T. A letter has been written to the university requesting its rating of the meter in question.

Parking meters are expected to be installed in town by July. Main street will definitely be equipped with meters from Center to Bridge street and possibly the terminus. Assembly Agreement Chances Appear Dim

Democrats and Republicans Follow Familiar Pattern in Split in Committees

Hartford, May 6.—(AP)—The chances for a Republican-Democratic agreement on major issues confronting the General Assembly appeared as dim—if not dimmer—than ever today.

Following a pattern made familiar by past disputes between the two parties, Democrats and Republicans came to a parting of the ways in committee yesterday on bills dealing with such problems as finance, increased aid for education and labor legislation.

Continued Amount Too High

The Senate side of the Finance committee, controlled by Democrats, approved a \$10,000,000 bond issue for a building program. House Republican committee members, contending the amount was too high, tabled the measure. The Democratic bond bill is \$10,000,000 above the amount recommended by Gov. Chester Bowles (D.).

Senate Democrats on the Appropriations committee approved three bills involving new spending for education totaling almost \$42,000,000. The House side of the committee refused to act on the measure.

The House and Senate Labor committees voted independently of each other to report competing versions of bills on workers' and unemployment compensation.

World Karmark Money

The \$70,000,000 bond issue bill approved by the Senate Finance committee would "earn" the money for these purposes: \$30,353,253 for education; \$18,818,844 for health; \$1,096,435 for welfare; \$25,000 for state police; and a \$3,000,000 reserve.

Of the funds made available for educational building, \$18,000,000 would be used in state grants in aid to municipalities building schools and \$10,753,000 to expand the facilities of the four state Teachers' colleges and to build vocational schools.

Of the \$42,000,000 in educational grants approved by the Senate Appropriations committee, about \$24,000,000—the cost of the building for education—would come from the \$70,000,000 bond issue. The remainder would come from general fund appropriations to increase state grants for other school costs.

New Hormone Aids Arthritis Victims

New Britain, May 5.—(AP)—Sufferers from rheumatic arthritis who were treated with a new hormone known as "Compound E" were soon able to dance, run and walk swiftly up and down stairs, according to a motion picture shown at the closing sessions of the Connecticut State Medical society here yesterday.

Dr. Philip S. Hench, professor of medicine, University of Minnesota Medical school and chief of the section on rheumatic diseases at the Mayo clinic, showed the picture.

Preliminary results have been shown in at least 12 patients. Dr. Hench explained, there is not enough "Compound E" in the body to make the difference. He asked physicians not to apply for the compound before next January.
