### Rap Inaction On Education

**State Teachers Association Sends Letter to Governor in Protest**

Hartford, May 11—In an open letter today to Governor Borden the Connecticut Education Association expressed "deep disappointment" over the attitude of the legislature with regard to education bills.

Henry W. Farrington, chairman of its Legislative Commission and Secretary of the CEA, commended the Governor for his own "forthright recommendations" for educational improvements, but criticized both parties for "wringing" that thus far has brought no concrete results.

"We are gratified," Mr. Farrington declared, "for the efforts on the part of the Senate Education Committee, but we are tired of hearing about the 'technique' of the bills."

"I refer in particular to Senate Bills 697, 702 and 318, which were introduced to be heard before the Appropriations Committee on May 5. To that so-called hearing hundreds of citizens came to Hartford to register their support, only to return home disgusted with the thinly-disguised stalling tactics of the committee chairman."

The Connecticut Education Association has been working constantly for years to bring a decent education to all of the children of the state and to improve general conditions for teachers.

Mr. Farrington said, "The interest of the members of this Association in these bills is obvious. Many of them are teachers whose salaries next year will depend on whether local school authorities
