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Gordon Gets 2 to 5 Years
Local Man Accused Of Armed Robbery Receives Sentence
 Samuel J. Gordon, 31, of 177 Middle Street, was sentenced yesterday to serve from two to five years in State Prison, after pleading guilty to robbery with violence before Superior Court Judge P. H. O'Sullivan in Hartford.
 Gordon was arrested at his home May 22, by local police and subsequently charged with the shooting of a package store in Hartford, West Hartford and East Hartford. A few days before his arrest, he had applied for a superintendent position with the local police.
 Assistant State's Attorney John S. Murtha told the court that Gordon used a .20 gauge shotgun that was concealed under a pair of trousers for the robbery.
 Public Defender Robert A. Gleason told the court that before the trial Gordon was considered a model young man, serving in both the Royal Air Force, and the American Air Force. After leaving his job and falling into debt, said Gleason, Gordon took the gun from the home of a girl he knew in Middletown.
 Judge O'Sullivan deferred sentence for some time after hearing the evidence. He said he feared he would be too harsh if he sentenced Gordon to prison. Things Done By Assembly
\$95,000,000 State Housing Program Voted in Closing Hours
 State Capitol, Hartford, June 9.—Here are some of the things done by the General Assembly during its closing hours:
 Approved a \$95,000,000 state housing program, including \$40,000,000 authorized by the 1947 Legislature.
 Abolished state taxes on uncolored deomargarine and removed restrictions against the use of the better substitute in state institutions.
 Longer Compensation Period Increased from 10 to 12 years the period in which a totally disabled employee may receive workman's compensation benefits.
 Increased from 22 to 26 weeks the maximum period during which unemployment compensation may be received.
 Strengthened the state Board of Mediation and Arbitration by increasing its membership to six, and giving it wider powers to intervene in labor-management disputes.
 Removed the present \$50 limit on old age assistance benefits, and giving it wider powers to intervene in labor-management disputes.
 Authorized the Hartford Metropolitan Water district to build a dam on the west branch of the Farmington river in the Hogback section of Hartford.

Pair Prefer Court Trial

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the key to our present economic uncertainty. But if there is any one key, we think it is in the price of production turning again. Low prices are the only thing which can start these wheels turning again.

There are two ways of getting such lower prices. One is to go through a depression in which everything is shaken out and down until lower prices become a desperate necessity.

The other is to adjust prices lower without waiting for a depression to do it.

The latter process is a ticklish, perhaps an impossible operation, which requires bold business thinking and convincing action. Take the price of steel, for instance. The production of steel has just reached a nine year low. One of the reasons for the decline in the production of steel is the way of price, difficult though that way may seem; there is only death in reliance on the bomb.

The Quakers have enough and courage enough and common sense enough to play the chance for peace instead of accepting the price of steel. They are going to be no out in the price of steel.

But, although no out may be what the steel executives intend, they are wrong. There is going to be a drop in the price of steel. It is going to be a drop in price which comes too late, after depression has taken its grip, or whether it is going to be a more voluntary cut, made now, in time to speed up the wheels of steel users again before they have to go through a depression.

If we have a depression, the price of steel will go down, down to a certain bottom level. And it may take years before even that bottom price stimulates steel users to activity again.

Right now, a percentage of steel price reduction might save themselves for this in what they are waiting for that it would make it possible for them to make their own products at the lower prices they themselves want to pay. It is not a question of whether they might come in with the steel order which would stabilize the price of steel again.

If steel prices are driven down they are likely to be driven down all the way. If they come down to a certain bottom level, they may come down only part of the way. But the longer steel executives try to hold out against the market, the more they are doing at it does when the Atlantic Treaty and the program of military assistance for western Europe are occupying the center of the foreign policy stage.

The idea that 91 elected Congressmen should thus formally endorse and present a resolution as fundamental policy for the United States that proposes transformation of the United Nations into a limited but strong world government which is the platform of the United World Federalists—that idea would have seemed impossible a year or two ago to most observers of the fledgling movement for world government. But the idea has its own strength; it is the strength of historical inevitability; even those who oppose it now concede that it will have to happen some day. It cannot fail to keep on growing.

In other words, these Congressmen are pointing out that the emergency measures are not going to be a contrast to the old and always failing methods our actual foreign policy of the moment is employing.

The critical matter in the last few hours and days was our budget. I was deeply concerned because the House budget was out of balance. It seemed to me with a budget out of balance by rather a considerable sum there were four things we could do.

We could pretend we had no deficit and move blithely ahead and have our funds run. It didn't seem we could do that either. Another solution was to cut the budget and services to the income we had. Take some of these building programs out of the general fund and put them into a capital improvement program.
