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Washington, June 10.—(AP)—Senator McKeller (D., Tenn.), today shouted at ECA Boss Paul Hoffman: "The sooner you resign, the better it will be for the United States." The veteran chairman of the Senate Appropriations committee openly accused Hoffman of trying to bully the committee into not cutting European recovery funds.

Hoffman, who has been in the job since 1947, today told reporters that he would resign if he reached a point where he no longer thought he could direct the recovery program successfully. And he said he did not think it could be done with less than the \$3,568,470,000 that ECA is asking for the first ten and one-half months of the fiscal year.

McKeller brought up the subject early in today's hearing on the ECA appropriation, saying: "Other than giving away other people's money, I wonder what you are doing in Europe. I think it would be a very good thing if you did resign."

Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) broke in to say he did not consider Hoffman's remarks any threat and did not think the ECA chief had intended them as such. "Don't you think," Ferguson said, "it is a good thing to have people in the government who are willing and able to resign if they can't do the job?"

McKeller retorted "I did take it as a threat" and then he turned on Hoffman again. "You have undertaken to do it before and you are not going to do it this time," he said. "I think it would be the best thing for the

Sees Sitdown By Democrats

Los Angeles, June 10.—(AP)—There is a "governmental sitdown" in Washington by which, obviously, the Truman administration is seeking to sabotage its own so-called legislative program, Senator Harry P. Cain (R., Wash.) declared today.

In his talk prepared for a luncheon of the 11-state Western Republican conference, he continued: "We have the spectacle of a newly-elected president with a Congress including majorities of his own party in both the Senate and the House, not only failing to translate into law any of the administration campaign promises, but actually doing everything within its power to prevent action on legislation in line with the pledges made by Mr. Truman and the Democrat platform of 1948."

Would Be Great Calamity
"Don't misunderstand me," Cain added hastily. "It would be the greatest calamity ever suffered by our nation if that program should, by some mischance, be enacted."

But he said, Mr. Truman claims a mandate from the people and one would expect the Democratic House and Senate to try, yet "not only are they not trying, but, at the direct instigation of Mr. Truman, they are making sure that no move of any consequence is made to fulfill those promises."

Cain contended that Democratic leaders like National Chairman J. McVay said there are 171 voluntary medical care plans now operating in 43 states, exclusive of 22 sponsored by medical societies. 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Budget, School Building Grants and Bond Issue for Expansion of Mental Hospitals as Basic Agenda; May Take in New Legisla- tion and Open Up New Political Warfare

Hartford, June 10.—(AP)—A wide-open extra session of the Legislature that may last at least a week loomed today. It will begin Tuesday, at 10 a. m., with a budget, school building grants and a bond issue for expansion of the state's mental hospitals as the basic agenda.

Will Decide Agenda
But, the Legislature, itself, will decide the extent of the agenda, which may take in new legislation and open new areas of political warfare.

No limits were put on an agenda at a meeting today between Governor Bowles and party leaders of the Senate and House at which the mechanics of the "cleanup session" were discussed.

Today's Developments
Meanwhile, today's developments were:

1. A resolution validating bills adopted during the closing hour of the recent session will be enacted to prevent any challenge of their legality because they were passed after midnight, the constitutional deadline.
2. The House will reenact its budget which the Senate tried to adopt but missed in the final minutes. The new G. O. P. budget may be 5 per cent lower, if G. O. P. Leader George C. Conway presses for it. He said today he favored the cut.
3. When the session opens rules must be adopted, committees named and organization completed. It may take two days.
4. If new legislation is proposed, public hearings may become necessary.
5. This afternoon, Governor Bowles will issue a proclamation for the session. As agreed upon

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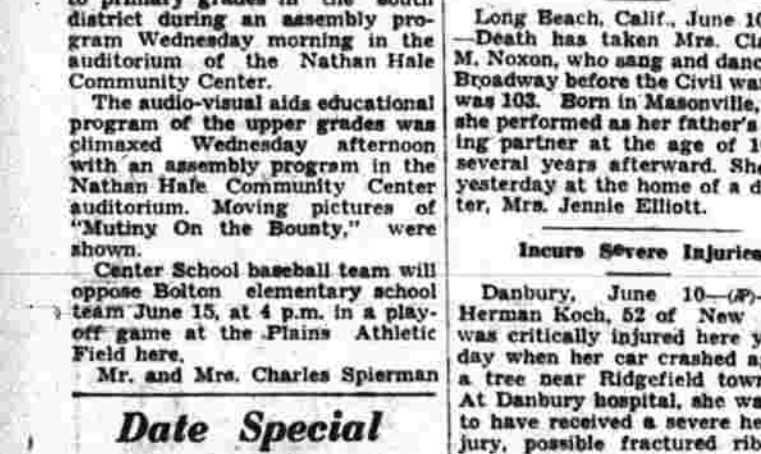
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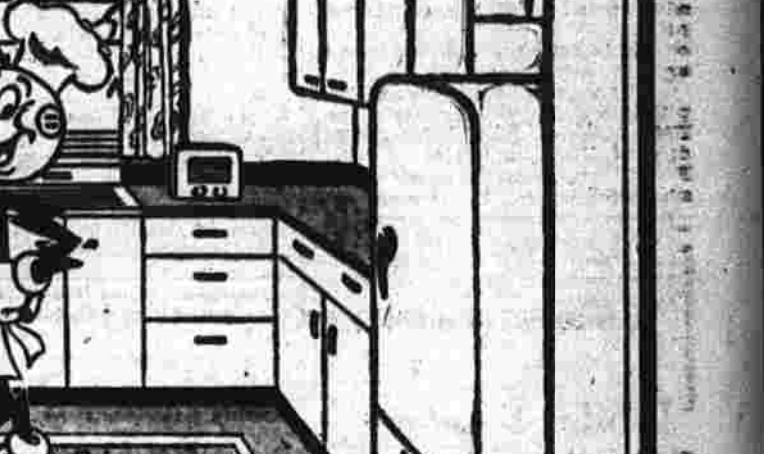
