New York, June 15.—Clare Boothe Luce, criticizing the U. S. State Department, said last night there is "mystery" in American policy in China.

The former congresswoman, noting that some State Department officials oppose aid to China because of corruption in the Chinese government, conceded that there is some corruption.

She asked, however, in a dinner speech: "By what ethical standards does our State Department find corruption—or black marketing—more reprehensible than the persecution, torture and murder of individuals and whole groups for their political beliefs?"

"Effective aid now," Mrs. Luce declared, "will be more painful and costly than it would have been when it was first called for," but she said she would not say when it would be called for again.

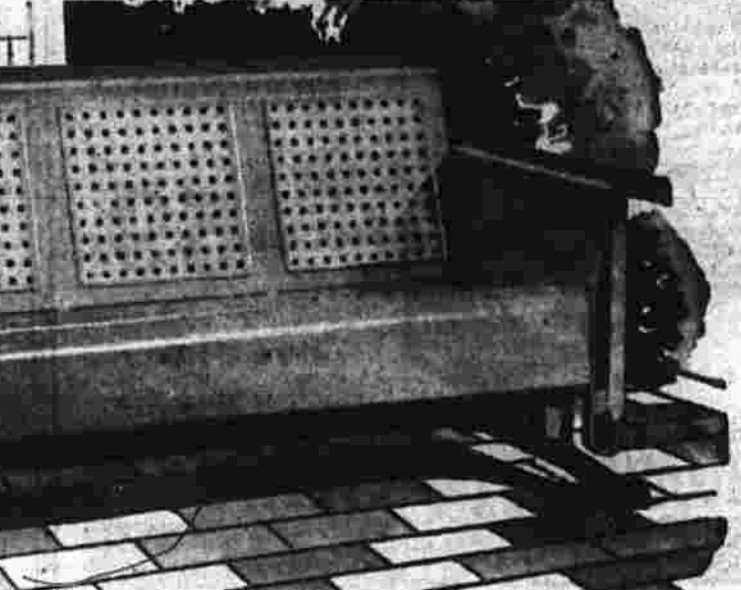

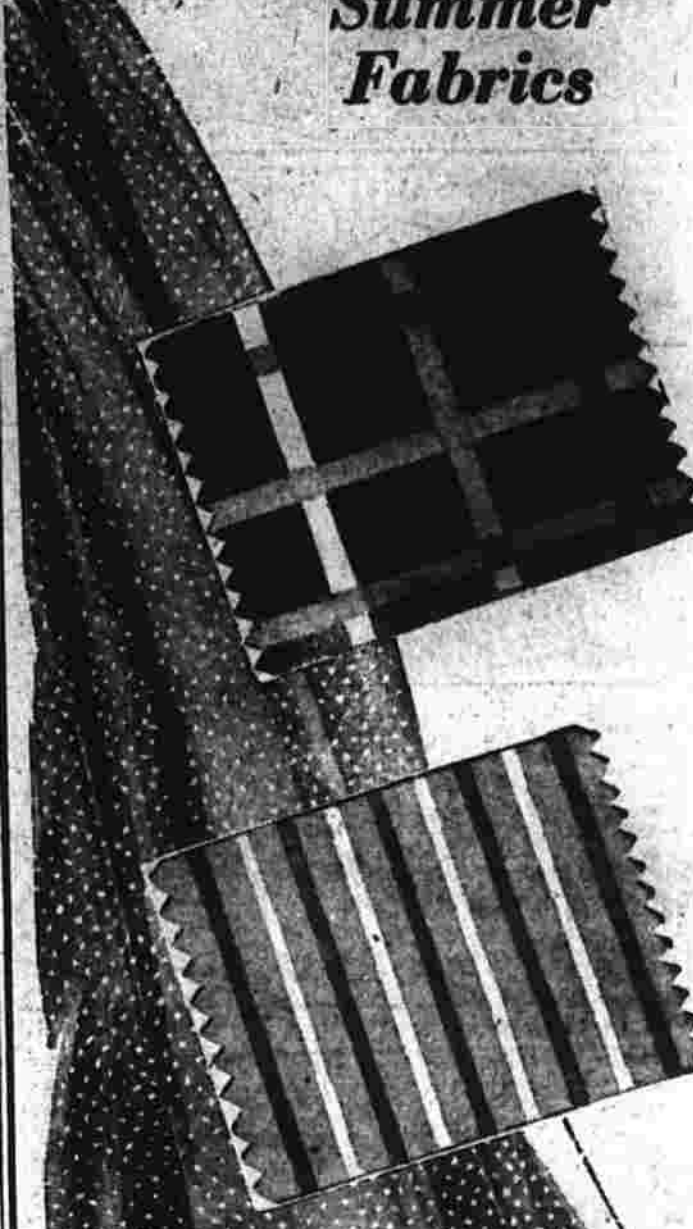
