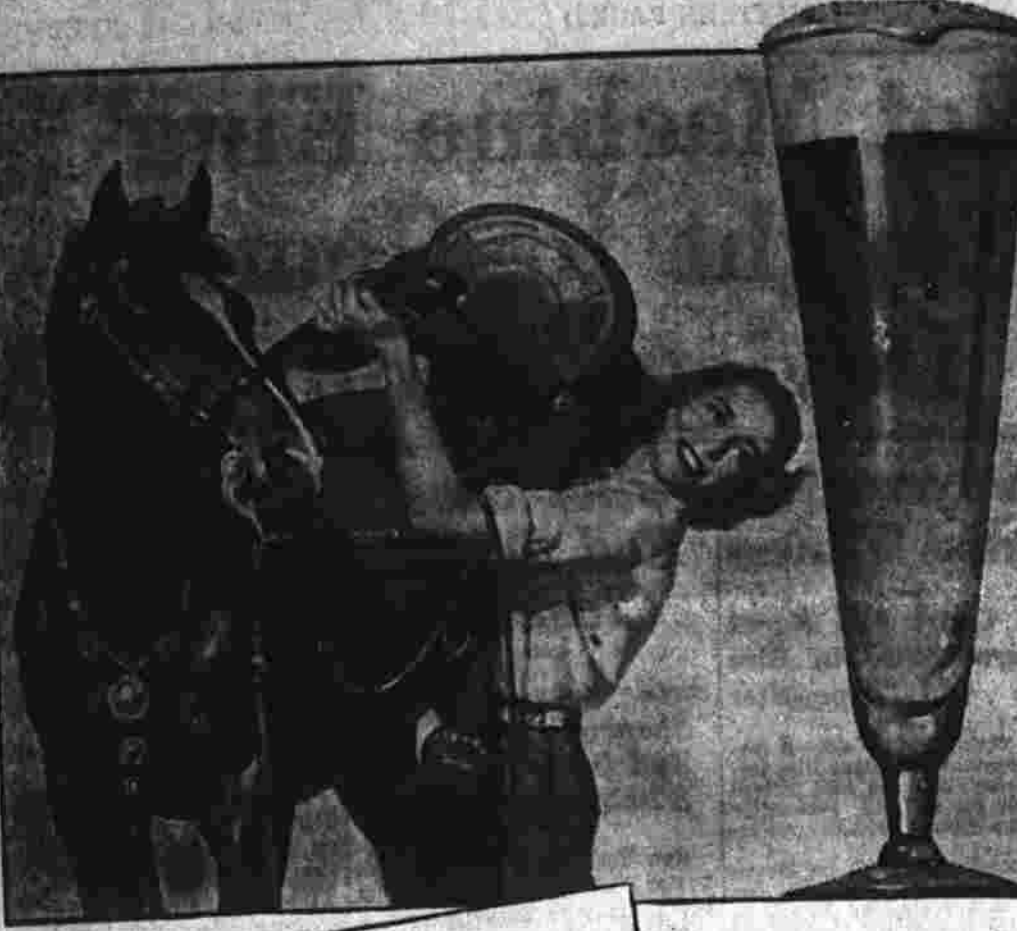

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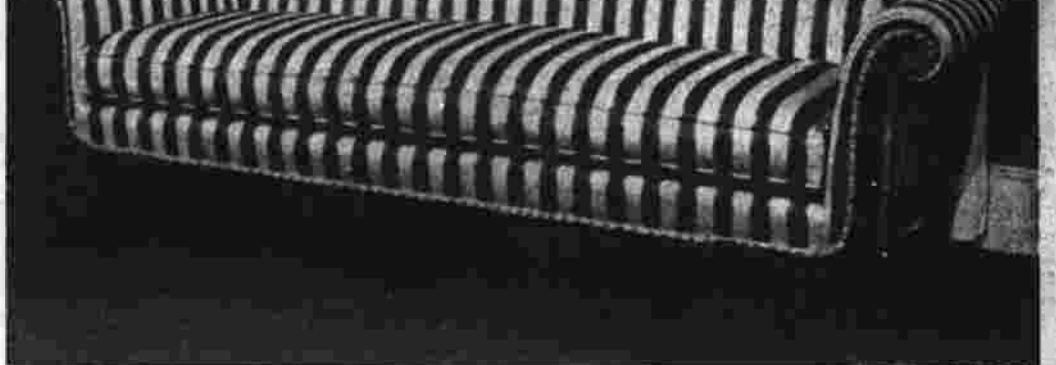

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Connecticut Yankee

The specific issues involved in the General Assembly deadlock are of little importance to the politician involved.

To the Republicans, the issue is not new classrooms for the University of Connecticut or state aid for town school building programs. It is merely whether, in pursuance of their willingness to take hard rapa for obstructionism now if only they can have Governor Rowley in a hole by which cannot fail to develop a deficit.

To the Democrats the specific issues are also unimportant, except as they seem to the Democrats to have possible popular appeal, or to be good causes to be championing. The Democrats like to narrow the issue down to something involving state aid to towns because they thought that would be a lever upon small town Republican legislators. But what the Democrats are after is not classrooms at Storrs or grants to towns as much as it is an escape from the budgetary trap into which they maneuvered themselves, with the aid of the Republicans, in the last days of the regular session.

What the issue themselves? On one of them, the prolongation of deadlock threatens to be a great tragedy. On the other, the battle of the politicians may, perhaps, produce a good result for the state.

The tragedy is that the desperate need of the University of Connecticut for additional facilities should be ever involved in such a political mess. The University is the state's own direct responsibility; it is a great and growing institution. The University is the greatest emergency of all Connecticut. Its need is not a bipartisan shame that they should ever be kicked about as they are kicked about.

The strange and unintentional result could, from the complete defeat of the proposal for school building fund grants to the cities and towns. In the particular warfare on Capitol Hill, just the last day of the session, and quite unintentionally, produce a good result for the state.

Storage Garage Job Advancing

Straddles Don't Work

The Marshall Plan is our system for supplying Britain and other European countries with foodstuffs by which, in time, they are supposed to lift themselves into economic stabilization.

Now, in its effort of the Marshall Plan, Britain is making a bilateral trade agreement with Argentina. The agreement, practically speaking, is going to be good for Britain—if the United States does not carry through OCA Administration. The Marshall Plan aid to Britain because of it. It will give Britain meat for which it does not have to pay dollars—as it has to do to obtain food from the country. It will also give Britain a monopoly of the machinery market in Argentina.

United States resentment of the agreement is based on two factors, one of principle, the other of elemental self interest.

Britain, along with all the other nations tied in with the United States post-war economic policy, has pledged itself to a system of internationalism in trade. The closed corporation, agreement with Argentina is a direct violation of such pledges, and points the way back toward a cut-throat economic world.

Britain's reply to this argument is an argument of sheer necessity. If Britain is ever to stand on its own feet and maintain independence of the need for Marshall Plan help, Britain must be allowed to make such an advantageous trade agreement as a part of its own progress toward economic self sufficiency. That is the British argument.

The second phase of the United States resentment over the trade treaty with Argentina comes from the American meat industry and the American machinery industry. The meat industry sees the agreement freeing American machinery out of Argentina.

But it is the violation of pledge and principle which is the cause of our most. The Marshall Plan can't work in general unless it is aided by a general lowering of tariff barriers and special sections in its effort to make the Marshall Plan work for itself, is indulging in a practice which is the very opposite of the general Marshall Plan objective for the whole world economy it is trying to help.

There is still another complication in back of the British urgency. We would like, of course, to sell meat to Britain and machinery to Argentina. But we are faced with an economic recession at home, cutting down on our own foreign purchasing, which is the only way, outside the Marshall Plan itself, by which the rest of the world can get dollars for purchasing here. So one reason Britain feels forced to trade elsewhere is that the only way she could trade more here would go deeper into our recession.

All this is a very important example of what is happening in many fields during this period in which the world is trying to progress toward unity while, at the same time, it clings to the nationalistic terms and divisions of the past. The straddle doesn't work; it keeps defeating its own high purpose; sooner or later the world is going to have to end the straddle and go all the way to unity. There is actually no other practical way in which the world can run itself.

It Was Popoff

We have joined so bitterly in the general scoffing of all the restrictive disciplines of the Marshall Plan aid to Britain because we think the merits of one Russian claim might be admitted. That is the claim, generally derided by all the other Russian claims, that the invention of the radio receiver was Russian.

We were quite as surprised as the rest American effort to read a letter in the Christian Science Monitor pointing out that it was indeed Alexander Popoff, Russian electrical inventor, who first patented the radio receiver, and who first succeeded in receiving wireless messages, over a distance of some four miles, just about a year before Marconi began his own more successful demonstrations over longer distances.

Our subsequent research seems to verify that claim, and to indicate that Marconi had indeed proved upon Popoff's discoveries. Electrical inventors of other nations were close behind. In fact, all of the nations which have entered retroactive claims. And one needs only to study the international flavor of the research which produced the atomic bomb, now generally labeled an American invention, to realize how international science is, with scientists of many nations approaching the same research and discovery point simultaneously.

At any rate, if we had had Popoff more about the invention, and not Marconi, as the inventor of the radio receiver, and this seems to be one instance in which the Russians have an honest claim for Russian science. It is still difficult to understand, of course, how such progress could ever have been achieved under the czar, without the inspiration of the Communist way of life.

It Has Cleared Off

Public Works Cost \$522,000

That Is Estimate for the Coming Fiscal Year; Various Items

A total works appropriation of \$522,000 is shown as the estimate for the coming fiscal year against a current appropriation of \$429,061 plus \$93,200 capital outlay transfer fund taken from the capital improvement fund for non-recurring public works investment. This fund may be drawn on for emergency or similar emergency work.

The annual general departmental estimates being reviewed by General Manager George H. Waddell, the following items are shown: general maintenance highways and engineering, \$177,000; water and sewer, \$220,000; electric and power, \$121,700; oiling and paving, \$29,200; storm water sewers, \$800; new equipment, \$46,700; town and highways, \$20,800; municipal buildings, \$18,470; garbage collection, \$60,700; building inspector, \$6,000; and building inspector, \$6,000. It will be noted that the public works setup now includes many activities other than the upkeep of roads which once was the only major activity in this field.

Century care shows a large proportion of increased cost in the year. It is estimated that \$28,970 will go for wages, \$12,415 for contractual services such as insurance, mileage, repairs; and that supplies will come to \$4,045. The municipal buildings cost is about \$1,550.
