Enfield Dam Plan Opposed

Two Power Companies and Three Railroads Object to Building

Hartford, June 24.—(AP)—Two Connecticut power companies and three railroads voiced opposition yesterday to an Army plan for a dam and channel dredging project on the Connecticut river.

The \$23,000,000 plan would make the river navigable to Holyoke, Mass., and would build a power dam at Enfield. It was discussed at a hearing called by the State Flood Control and Water Policy commission. The Army's New England district engineers submitted the plan June 9 to the Corps of Engineers Board of Engineers for rivers and harbors.

Questions "Cheap Power" "It is a tax subsidy which would be the cause of its being cheap."

And the Connecticut Light and Power company offered to build the Enfield dam itself. Estimated cost is \$10,000,000. The company urged the government not to "power project."

A "New Haven" railroad representative attacked the cost of that part of the proposal that would enable ships to travel along the Connecticut river as far as Holyoke.

E. H. Pierce, the railroad's district traffic agent, said shippers would save less than the annual cost of keeping up the navigation part of the project. He said the initial cost would be about \$14,000,000 and maintenance would be \$33,000 yearly.

Another railroadman, C. S. Robinson of the Boston and Maine Railroad, said "it (the project) would not be justified for the best welfare of the community."

Effect Not Fully Analyzed Robinson, senior chairman of the Committee on Waterways Projects of the Association of American Railroads, added, however, he had not fully analyzed the plan's effect on shipping.

New York Central railroad spokesman also expressed disapproval of the navigation features.

"We are going forward with our program without any hesitation of any sort. Not the slightest delay has been introduced into the program in any way whatever and the program is in better shape today than it ever was before."

"Now, that is a negative result of Paris but it is an important one."

The secretary described the working arrangement which was reached in Germany as a "very modest document" but of some importance because it "relaxes the tension" built up by the Berlin blockade.

The agreement on issues which had halted progress towards an American settlement he described as being a victory for neither side but rather a "mutualist step forward."

cost of bonds which lowers issue would be 90 per cent for regional schools and schools built "to accommodate a disproportionate increase in school population due to a public housing program."

To meet the cost of the University of Connecticut project, the Senate approved a \$4,000,000 bond issue.

House Bills Offered

Republican senators offered in opposition bills similar to the one approved by the House for local school building grants and \$1,200,000 for the University of Connecticut.

A \$7,200,000 appropriation was beaten down in the Senate by a 20-8 vote on a roll call, and the other amendment was defeated by a voice vote.

The Democratic strategy in the face of the House's expected rejection of the bonding proposals was beginning to take shape. Reliable sources reported that as a last resort, Democrats would agree to the \$2,500,000 appropriation for the University of Connecticut, but would stand fast against the \$7,200,000 for the school building.

The disagreement between the two chambers even extended to the time of the next meeting.

The Senate, after approving the education bills and one minor non-controversial appropriation, recessed until next Tuesday, and Senator Alfred F. Wechsler (D, Hartford), the majority leader, said he hoped the House also would be back in session at that day.

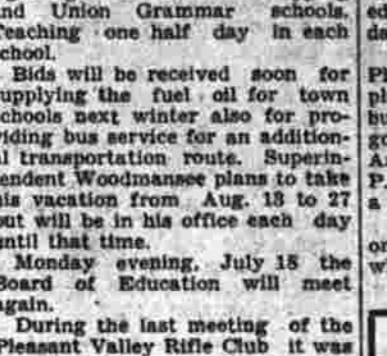
