Word Awaited From Truman On Labor Bill

House Democratic Leaders Uncertain What To Do About Wreckage Of Repeal Measure

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—House Democratic leaders today awaited word from President Truman on what to do about the wreckage of the administration's bill to repeal the Taft-Hartley law.

The Senate completed demolition of that bill yesterday. Then it passed a substitute by Senator Taft (R-Ohio) which contains the basic provisions of the present labor law. The vote was 51 to 42.

Blasts Hopes of Repeal

That action, by a coalition of Republicans and southern Democrats, blasted high and wide the 1949 hopes of Taft-Hartley repeal advocates. It probably means the T-H measure still will be on the books—and a top campaign issue again—when the 1950 congressional elections roll around.

The Senate vote scarcely was tabulated when Mr. Truman told his news conference: The fight is going to continue as hard as I can make it.

That made it clear no white flag will fly from the White House. But it did not lay down a specific course for Mr. Truman's lieutenants in the House.

Two months ago the House fought the first round of the Taft-Hartley battle, and it ended in a deadlock. The House fired the administration's repeal bill to its Labor committee after coming within a hair's breadth of passing another measure to keep most of the Taft-Hartley act.

Would Make 28 Changes

Since then the House committee has taken no action. Now it has another Democratic repeal bill which would make 28 changes in the present law, but retain the essential provisions.

Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex) told reporters he doesn't know yet what the House will do. He has other Democratic leaders indicated they want to get Mr. Truman's views on the matter.

Senator Lucas of Illinois, the party's chief in the Senate, said he is standing by his prediction that Mr. Truman will veto the Taft bill if it ever goes to him.

Other senators who voted against the bill made similar forecasts, but Mr. Truman declined to say whether he would veto the Taft measure.

Asked whether he would try to defeat Taft for re-election next year, Mr. Truman replied he never had undertaken to defeat the Taft measure.

Suspends Church Fire Set

New Britain, July 1.—(AP)—The Rev. Joseph H. Seiferman, pastor of St. Mary's Roman Catholic church here today said that an attempt had been made to set fire to the church. Police are investigating the report that the cloth on a side altar in the main church was found burned on Thursday morning when the action opened the ceiling. Father Seiferman said he believed a match had been used to ignite the altar cloth and a table about five feet from the altar. He said that the fire was set Wednesday night.

Suspend Slowdown Order

London, July 1.—(AP)—Leaders of 400,000 British railwaymen have agreed to suspend a "slow down" originally ordered to begin at midnight Sunday. Labor Minister George Isaacs announced to the House of Commons the decision of the National Union of Railwaymen. The union had ordered the partial work stoppage on June 23 to support demands for wage increases.

Backward Areas Aid Urged

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—President Truman sent to Congress today a draft of suggested legislation to begin his program of aid in developing backward areas of the world. The draft of proposed legislation, dispatched through Secretary of State Acheson, mentions no specific amount of money. The bill would authorize appropriations of "such sums as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this act."

"Clipping" Charge Made

Hartford, July 1.—(AP)—A confessed flag leader in a Treasury balance battery was accused in Superior court today of "clipping" a New Britain man described as his partner in the operation. Attorney Edward L. Reynolds of New Haven, counsel for Anthony J. DeLuca of New Britain, accused Irving Atherton of Waterford of "clipping" on a weekly expense account ranging from \$400 to \$700. DeLuca is on trial on a charge of conspiracy and Atherton has pleaded guilty to such a charge and turned state's witness.

Two Policemen Killed in Riots

Beaten to Death in Slovakia; Undeterred Squaded Number Injured

Prague, July 1.—(AP)—At least two Communist policemen were beaten to death and an undetermined number injured in rioting between Roman Catholic faithful and government adherents in Slovakia recently, according to reliable reports reaching high diplomatic sources here.

These sources added that the situation in this intensely Catholic province now appeared "quiet on the surface." But they were inclined to give credence to reports that at least small partisan bands of Catholics had been formed there to stage violent resistance to the Communists in the church-state fight.

Travel Being Restricted

To hush up the situation, diplomatic quarters said, the government was restricting travel into Slovakia.

Other developments in the church-state war were:

1. Disclosure that the Czechoslovak Foreign Ministry so far has ignored a protest delivered by the diplomatic corps here about the forcible detention earlier this week of Msgr. Gennaro Verolino, Vatican diplomat.

2. Msgr. Josef Beran, archbishop of Prague and the nation's spiritual leader, is staging a virtual "sit-down strike" in his palace, refusing government suggestions that he leave for a summer holiday.

Diplomatic quarters were inclined to evaluate cautiously open Slovak anti-Communist activity.

Nevertheless, they said, the report about at least small-scale partisan activity were persistent.

These reports said the anti-Communist called themselves "Janakovic" after Janakovic, the Slovak "Red" hero.

Organize to Protect Priests

The trouble in Slovakia was said to have started when the Catholics organized to protect their priests from arrests. These volunteers protective hands clashed with the police in various towns.

Slovakia, according to church pastoral letters, has been the main target of Communist persecution.

Berlin Faces Money Woes

Threatened With Bankruptcy Of East-West Strife

Berlin, July 1.—(AP)—Berlin was threatened with municipal bankruptcy today as a hangover from east-west strife.

A prospective budget deficit of 321,000,000 west marks (\$98,300,000) plagued the allied-recognized city government just as its railway city troubles ended.

Soviet-controlled elevated passenger trains resumed operation in western sectors early today, 41 days after they were tied up by the strike of an anti-Communist rail union.

Traffic Being Restored

The railway management said international traffic between Berlin and western Germany was being restored gradually, with pre-strike schedules to become effective again Monday.

After two days of harassing tactics, Soviet autobahn guards began passing into Berlin all West German truck cargoes which had been cleared at the Russian zone frontier.

But the Russians tightened a blockade on foodstuffs which east German farmers were trying to

No Rain Seen In This Area

Report Heavy Damage To Farm Crops; Expect Greater Heat

Another day of hot and humid weather was in prospect for most of the central and southern parts of the country today.

Warmer weather also was forecast for most of the eastern states, and no rain was forecast for dry-stricken southern New England, New York and New Jersey. Farm crops were endangered and heavy losses already have been reported.

It was hot as a Fourth of July firecracker over the central states yesterday. The mercury climbed into the 90s and close to the 100 mark from the plains states to the Ohio valley. But cooler air from the Pacific northwest moved into Montana and the Dakotas today and some cooling off was expected in parts of the north central states.

Midwest Expects Relief

Minnesota's twin cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul were expecting cooler temperatures than yesterday when the mercury soared to 90. It hit 91 at Kansas City, St. Louis and Sioux City, Ia., and 95 at Chicago and Omaha.

Crop experts in New Jersey—40 days without rain—said losses will be \$500,000 a day unless there is rain. The secretary of the New Jersey Farm Bureau said German truck cargoes which had been cleared at the Russian zone frontier.

Agree to Ease Trade Checks

Britain and U. S. Compromise on Loosening Economy Regulations

Paris, July 1.—(AP)—Pushed and prodded by the United States, western Europe moved one small step towards free competition in trade today.

W. Averell Harriman, U. S. ambassador at large to the Marshall plan countries, announced early today that a midnight session of Europe's top economists had reached a compromise between American demands for freer trade among European nations and British demands for continued stringent regulation.

Differences Resolved

The economic differences between free enterprise America and socialist Britain, which many diplomatic observers had feared might affect Anglo-American political harmony, were resolved on a basis which eased—but did not abolish—restrictions.

A small amount of trade—less than two per cent of the normal \$8,000,000,000 yearly volume—will be conducted on a multi-lateral competitive basis. Since the war most European trade has been conducted on a barter system between two nations at a time.

Last year, when distributing Marshall plan dollars, the U. S. was careful to make no moves which might upset this delicate barter balance. This year, however, the men running the European Recovery program felt the time had come to loosen up trading practices.

Women College Graduates Bearing More Babies Now

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—Women who are college graduates are beginning to have more babies.

While they still aren't having as many babies as the women who barely went to school at all, the college girls showed surprising gains from 1940 to 1947.

That's what the Population Reference Bureau said yesterday.

The bureau was founded as a nonprofit, scientific educational organization to coordinate and distribute population data. It's supported by donations.

Bureau Gloomy Previously

As recently as two weeks ago the bureau was gloomy about the college graduate mother. Ditto for father.

It had completed a study on the graduates of 25 years ago, and this was no babyless the bureau wondered: "Does A.B. mean abstinence?"

The class of '24, the bureau found, was falling 24 short of replacing itself.

But the more recent collegian is doing much better.

Census bureau figures show that during 1940-1947 the girl graduates have increased the birth rate for their group by 81 per cent. This compares with a 23 per cent average gain for all women.

But, continues the bureau, women who have graduated from college still don't have babies at the rate of the less educated.

Acheson Plans To Ask Advice On China Reds

Will Consult Fully With Foreign Relations Committee When Recognition Question Arises

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—Secretary of State Acheson has assured Senate foreign policy leaders they will be consulted before any decision is made on recognizing a Chinese Communist government.

State department officials said today word had been given Chairman Connally (D-Tex) of the Senate Foreign Relations committee that Acheson will consult fully with the committee on the recognition question when it arises.

There has been recent criticism from some senators of administration policy toward China. Twenty-one senators sent President Truman a protest last week against establishing diplomatic relations with the expected Communist regime.

No Reply From President

There has been no reply yet from the president but presumably his response will be based on the promise to consult and the fact that no decision has been made as yet.

At his news conference yesterday Mr. Truman was reminded that Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich) and other Republican foreign policy leaders have complained that this country's dealings with China were not run on a bipartisan basis.

The president was asked whether he makes any distinction between China and other areas of the world in this respect. He replied that he certainly did not.

The implication of Acheson's assurance to the Senate is that he will seek support of the top-level Foreign Relations committee before deciding finally what to do about recognizing a Chinese Communist government.

No Real Issue at Present

At the moment, State department officials take the position there is no real issue, because the Chinese Communists have not yet formed a government.

But most diplomatic officials feel that if the Communists are going to run China this government should establish contacts with them and have trained observers there to observe their progress.

Acheson told a news conference Wednesday that there had been an exchange of views with other nations on the Chinese situation.

Credit Terms Up to Dealers

Government Control Over Installment Buying Have Expired Now

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—The terms allowed installment credit buyers are up to the nation's dealers today. The government has nothing more to say about it.

Federal Reserve Board authority to limit installment credit terms expired at midnight. Congress purposely let it lapse.

The controls, quite strict in wartime, were allowed to elapse for an 11-month period beginning in 1947. Then Congress renewed the law last summer.

Has Made Controls Lenient

For the past nine months the Federal Reserve Board has made its controls more and more lenient so that those expiring last night actually were no stiffer in most respects than dealers used to impose of their own accord in pre-control days.

For that reason, officials doubted if lapsing of the law would bring any general easing of installment credit.

Prison Term For Girl Spy

Judith Coplon Is Given Sentence of 40 Months To 10 Years in Prison

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—Judith Coplon today was sentenced to 40 months to 10 years in prison for spying for Russia.

The tiny brunette former Justice department worker heard the sentence unflinchingly.

A short time before hearing her penalty, she made an impassioned statement to Federal Judge Albert L. Reeves, but she did not ask for mercy.

Actually, Judge Reeves passed two sentences—40 months to 10 years on the first (spying) count of the indictment against her, and one to three years on the second (theft of secrets) count.

Concurrent Sentences

He stipulated, however, that the sentences be served concurrently.

Just before passing sentence, Judge Reeves said: "I thoroughly approve of the verdict of the jury."

Judge Reeves ordered Miss Coplon to post a new bond of \$20,000. Her old bond here—\$10,000—

Red Admits Telling Lies

Green Falsified Statements In Order to Get Post Office Job

New York, July 1.—(AP)—A defendant in the Communist conspiracy trial admitted yesterday that he once told a series of lies under oath "because I needed a job."

Gilbert Green, Illinois chairman of the Communist party, made the admission within five minutes after the government began its cross-examination. He had just finished his direct testimony after 13 days on the stand.

As U. S. Attorney John F. X. McGohey hammered at the witness' credibility, Green repeatedly answered questions with replies such as "I don't recall" and "I don't know."

Defense Protested

Defense lawyers protested that Green was being "judged."

There's been no badgering here, said Federal Judge Harold R. Medina. "So let's not talk about it."

With Green still on the stand, the trial was adjourned for the Fourth of July week-end until Tuesday.

Green is one of 11 top Red leaders on trial on charges of con-

Confused Situation Being Met Without Any Disturbance; Most Incumbents Holding On to Bench; New Appointees Filing Formal Protests and Withdrawing Pending Decision

Hartford, July 1.—(AP)—Connecticut had two sets of municipal judges today, but the confused situation was being met without any disturbance. In most cases incumbent judges were holding onto the bench, and new appointees were filing formal protests and withdrawing, pending a decision by the Supreme court as to who is entitled to the office.

The governor said in a statement today that he assumed some of his appointees would suffer indignities and abuse, but he urged them to "conduct yourselves with complete dignity."

Blame Republican Leaders

Governor Bowers put the blame for the tangle on a small group of Republican leaders who, he asserted, were "more interested in political manipulation and trickery than the welfare" of the people.

Announcing that his recess appointments of municipal judges was complete, the chief executive in a formal statement expressed regret over the "legal complications" which he said he understood would "inevitably follow."

His reference was obviously to the Republican challenge of his right to make those appointments.

Said the Governor:

"These complications were, in my opinion, deliberately brought about by the leaders of the Republican House of Representatives as part of their campaign to create the greatest possible degree of confusion and chaos in our state government."

Reason for Recess Action

The governor reiterated that the reason he had made these recess appointments was that the General Assembly had failed to enact legislation implementing a new constitutional amendment changing the method for appointing the judges.

In line with the constitutional requirement that the Legislature prescribe the term for the judges, Bowers said, he had proposed to the Legislature that it fix six-year terms for them to lift those posts "out of the political arena."

Said the Governor:

"The Republican leaders in the House of Representatives refused even to discuss my proposal. Furthermore, they refused flatly to ad-
