The total reduction of \$184,811.75 in Departmental requests represents a saving to the taxpayers of over two and one-half mills.

The above was accomplished after numerous conferences with Departmental Heads, inspections of proposed projects, co-ordination of departments, postponing of desired capital improvements, reparing of equipment rather than purchasing of new equipment, and rental of equipment from other departments rather than purchasing new equipment which will not be used full-time in any one department. I desire to thank the Departmental Heads for their splendid spirit of co-operation in making this reduction possible.

The General Manager recommends that the "cost of living" wage of \$200.00 be continued for all employees of the Town of Manchester, with the exception of the employees of the Department of Education as this is taken care of by the Board of Education in salary increments, as per salary list furnished to General Manager under date of June 21, 1949.

In order that you may be informed of the increase in the budget for the year ending August 14, 1950, I am listing below a comparison of the 1949 budget with the present budget.

> GENERAL GOVERNMENT: The estimated cost for the year ending August 14th, 1949 is \$102,130.00, with a recommended budget for the coming year of \$89.529.00. This decrease is made possible by no elections being held this fall, as provided in the Town Charter. The Controller's account is reduced by reason of the fact that it will not be necessary to purchase accounting machines this year. PURLIC WELFARE:

> The estimated cost for the year ending August 14th, 1949 is \$84,000.00 and the amount recommended for the coming year is \$96,157.00. It will be necessary for the General Manager to apply to the Board of Directors for an increase in the present budget for this year at some public meeting before the end of the present fiscal year. The increase in the proposed budget is caused by increases in Institutional Care, Hospitalization, Aid to Dependent Children, and Board and Care in Nursing Homes.

The Building Inspector's account has been increased in the amount of \$1,350.00 to provide for additional Inspections and printing of new

codes, etc.

The Cemeteries' appropriation has been increased in the amount of \$4,400.00 to allow for a new fence on the Harrison Street side of the East Cemetery and a new fence on the opposite side of the Cemetery at the rear of the homes on Westminster, Street, in addition to armor-coating of all roads in the East Cemetery and paving in the West Cemetery.

The estimated cost of the Police Department for the current year is \$126,900.00, with a recommended budget for the coming year of \$153,291.40. Additional men and officers of the Police Department call for an additional amount of \$22,496.20. If approved, the Police Department will have a total of twenty-eight officers and men and we will be able to provide additional police protection in sections of the Town not now covered, which we believe is an absolute necessity. The entire increase asked for in this Department will be used for additional police. tional personnel. HEALTH:

The additional amount requested in the Health Department is \$3,000.00 for a Chest Clinic to be operated under the direction of the local Health Officer and the Department of Health of the State of Connecticut. This clinic will provide for any person in the Town of Manchester being allowed to call at the Mobile Unit for chest X-Rays and your General Manager approves of this expenditure as a help in eradicating tuberculosis. The other increase allows for the printing of a new health department code and other pamphlets to be distributed as an aid in preventing the spreading of disease. RECREATION AND PARKS:

It is estimated that the total cost of Recreation and Parks for the current year will be \$105,800.00, including the cost of work on the Sanitary Facilities at Mt. Nebo in the amount of \$7,200.00. The Departmental Heads requested a budget of \$136,065.00 for the coming year and the General Manager has reduced this to \$105.885.00. The Recreational Department of the Town has been very active during the present year, and there seems to be a definite demand for increased facilities. Since August 15th, 1948 the Recreation facilities here been enjoyed by \$7,540 persons in accordance with the report of the Recreation Director as of June 1st, 1949, including active participants or spectators, including men, women, youths and children. Park facilities have been used by \$7,051 persons during the current year, either participants or spectators, in skating, skiing, coasting, fahing, band converts, picnics, playgrounds, nature walks, and community evants. This makes a total of nearly 78,000 persons using our facilities for ten months. I recommend the General Manager's tentative budget, and know that with the increased facilities Manch ever will be making a definite contribution to the future citizens of the country.

The increase in the Budget for the year ending August 14, 1850 over the Budget for the present year is \$250,182.57, or nearly 10%.

After a conference with Assessor Mutrie, I estimate that the new Grand List of the Town of Manchester, as of October 1st, 1985, will be approximately \$72,000,000.00.

A 24 mill tax rate on the above Grand List of \$72,000,000.00 will raise \$1,728,000.00, which amount will be sufficient to pay the cost of operation and set aside \$132,000.00 to the "Reserve Fund" providing the income of \$225,000.00 from the State as a Grant to School Buildings is received.

In accordance with Chapter V. Section 3. "Budget and Finance", of the Town Charter, the General Manager is causing this tentative budget to be advertised in the "Evening Herald" on July 5th, 1949, forty days prior to the beginning of the ensuing fiscal year.

Section 4 of the Town Charter provides "The Board of Directors shall hold a public hearing not less than "thirty" days prior to the beginning of the fiscal year at which any elector or taxpayer may have an opportunity to be heard." I would, therefore, suggest that the date of the public hearing be set for July 15th, 1949.

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


