### Bowles Plans Housing Work

Hartford, July 13.—Gov. Bowles today began to focus his major attention on passing the state's new \$5 million dollar housing act.

During the next few weeks, the governor will travel throughout Connecticut to talk with experts in various housing fields, and to inspect latest building techniques.

Next week Governor Bowles is expected to go to Washington to confer with Federal authorities. Efforts will be made to "tie-in" Connecticut's new housing program with that recently adopted by Congress.

The chief executive's decision to devote virtual full time to housing during the next few weeks stems from his statements during the past year in which he termed housing the state's No. 1 problem.

Connecticut's present housing measure was one of the few major items on which the bitterly-divided 1949 Legislature found a compromise. It included points advocated by both parties.

The act calls for 65 million dollars for units to rent at around \$40 a month. Short-term units to be used to provide the lowest possible interest charges are described in this "five year" phase of the 1945 housing act in the 45 million dollar moderate rental measure passed by the 1947 Legislature.

Second part of the housing act calls for expenditure of 20 million dollars for dwellings to be offered "for sale" also to low and moderate income families. Loans will be FHA guaranteed, with amortization over a 25-year period.

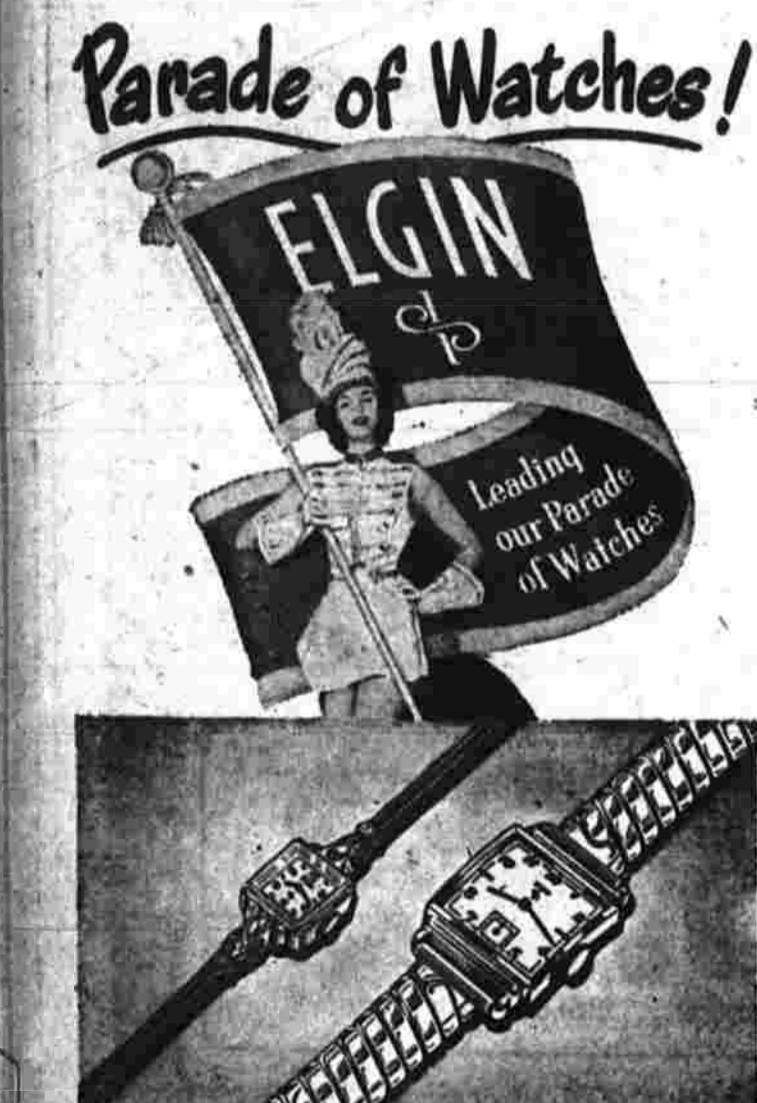

 The undertones and overtones of the His trial are threatening to become more important than the elemental and still unresolved factual question involved—that of whether or not Alger Hiss or Whittaker Chambers is telling the truth.  
 What the trial involves, outside the trial itself, is one more phase of a running battle between two American political and ideological extremists.  
 To the Hearst press and its columnists, who have been prosecuting not only Mr. Hiss but also the judge and jurors in the trial, Mr. Hiss is not merely Mr. Hiss, but he is a symbol of the whole New Deal, with its liberalist philosophy brought into government. The same concept goes for those members of Congress who are most zealous in their own prosecution of Hiss.  
 All these private prosecutors are not merely after Hiss; they are after Justice Felix Frankfurter, and Secretary of State Dean Acheson, and a thousand other lesser lights who have come to Washington as liberal-intellectual admirers for the New Deal. To prove that the New Deal brain trust was nothing but a spy ring for Russia would be a choice and sweet victory for those elements who, having Franklin D. Roosevelt even more now than he is dead than they did when he was alive, are still living in hopes of discrediting a whole era of American politics and driving its survivors out of the Washington scene.  
 The assumption that a conviction of Hiss would produce such desired results is perhaps not valid; nonetheless it has been made by the Hearst papers and by some Congressmen. To them, Hiss must be guilty.  
 On the other extreme, in Washington and throughout the nation, are those whose own ideological and political alignment insists and demands that Hiss must be innocent, and win acquittal, not merely for himself, but for all the "bright young men" and New Deal brain-trusters of the Washington scene, and not merely for these, but for the whole concept of the New Deal and the whole record of Roosevelt.  
 These two extremes have small regard for the actual evidence. Each is under its own ideological compulsion to think Hiss guilty or innocent. Neither, so long as the present deadlock of the actual evidence obtains, will ever abandon its theory—the one being that Mr. Hiss is merely the high example of the moral leprosy and ideological betrayal of the New Deal, and the other that Mr. Chambers is believing that Mr. Chambers is the author of the most insane and fantastic and carefully built revenge plot in all human history.  
 This situation, in which two groups of Americans are permitted to nourish their own prejudiced verdict, ought to be ended, by evidence both would have to accept.

**Yesterday's Crashes**  
 For a few days now, the world's newspaper readers will be somewhat shocked by the coincidence of two serious air crashes in one day. Perhaps a few people will hesitate before they board a plane. And then, because no one is going to stop travel by air, the crashes will be forgotten.  
 Meanwhile, in justice to the air travel industry, it should be noted that in both of yesterday's crashes there were circumstances involved which were in themselves infringements of the highest code of safety which the best air transport companies try to follow.  
 Two changes of route and schedule for the Dutch plane which crashed in India—the first change being the first Dutch flight over India since the Indonesian trouble, and the second change calling the plane down out of the sky for an over-night stop at New Delhi when it was already on its way to Calcutta—had the result of bringing a Dutch pilot into territory with which he had no previous familiarity. This seems the elemental explanation of why the plane dove out of a rain cloud into a hillside.  
 The California crash was the crash of an "unmanned" plane being operated by a "cut-rate" firm which specializes in sensational low fares. The plane, just before the crash, was being operated through weather so severe that it drove one of the passengers to hysteria, so that the pilot, just before he crashed, had his mind occupied with a disturbance inside his plane.  
 The India crash, in terms of ratiocating, would be comparable to what might happen if a speed train engine starting operation on one of the modern fast trains without any previous knowledge of the curves on the route. The California crash, in terms of ratiocating, would be comparable to what might happen if a speed train crew were operating colorblind.  
 This is not to say that crashes do not occur on the best-regulated air lines, with the best available pilots, thoroughly familiar with their route. They do. Air travel involves risks which cannot even be the best precautions can cover out completely. But in yesterday's two crashes, the element of risk had been increased by human policy.

**Ching And Chiang**  
 Each day that both are in the news it takes us a few instants to realize that Ching (Cyrus S.) and Chiang (Generalissimo) are two different people.  
 Neither Ching nor any other Chinese, for that matter, is trying to mediate the steel contract dispute.  
 Nor is it Federal Contractor Ching who has been visiting President Truman in the White House. One is Ching and one is Chiang, and it must be a very glib reader of headlines who would ever get them confused, even for an instant.

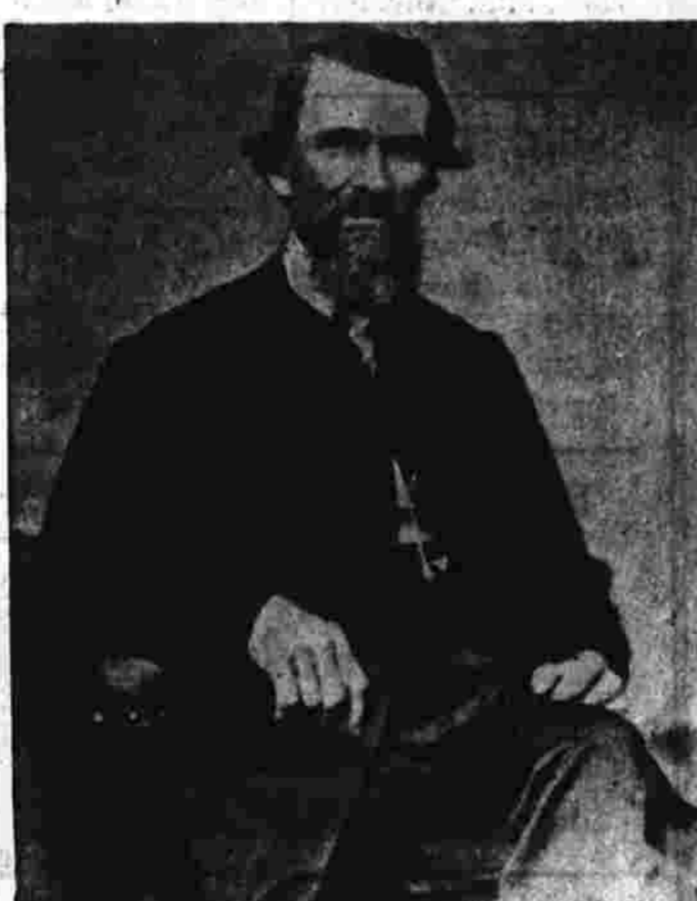

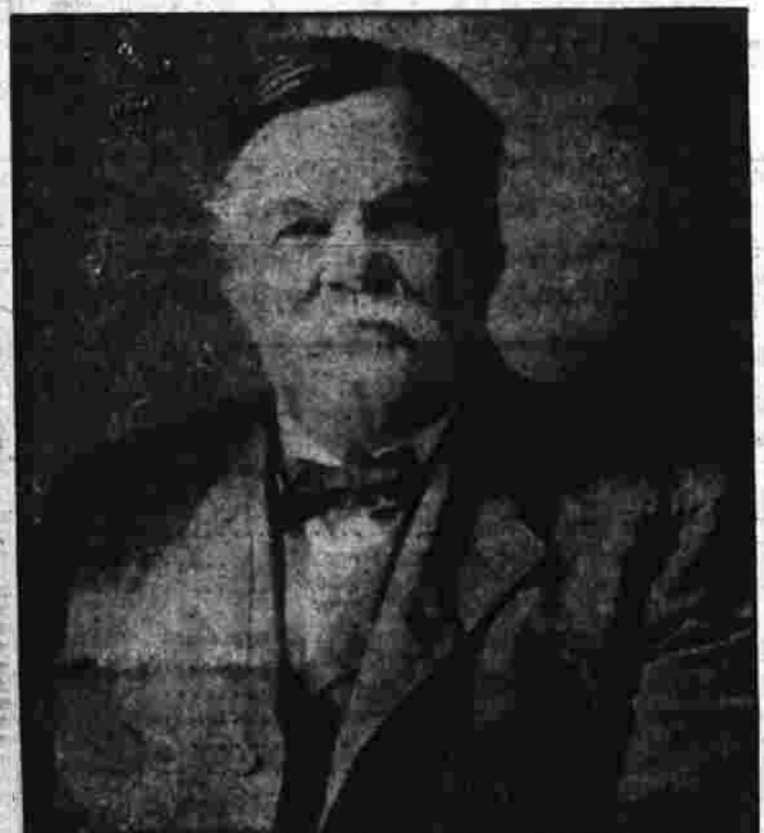

Here Is Brief History Of House and Hale Firm

House's and Hale's stands as a landmark at the corner of Main and Oak streets, and many of the newer residents drawn into town with the influx of workers for World War II are curious as to the history of these establishments.

The relationship between House's and Hale's has always been a close one. The original Hale business was started by Justus W. Hale in 1875 when he opened a general dry goods and grocery store in the old Charter Oak building. He later moved the business to the 74th building, Mr. Hale and Charles E. House then formed a partnership to construct the original building at the corner of Main and Oak streets. When this building was destroyed by fire in 1909 the present corporation of House and Hale, Inc. was formed and the two men erected the building which today houses the business under the same roof.

Being in supplementary merchandising lines the two stores developed together and in 1933 Herbert B. House and his father acquired the Hale business. Today Herbert B. House is the General Manager of Hale's assisted by Elmer A. Wedge as Merchandising Manager, a position which he has held for the past 16 years. Under the management of Mr. House and Mr. Wedge the department store has expanded and developed into one of New England's outstanding stores for its size.
