Military Services Reveal Extensive Civilian Job Cuts

Washington, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Secretary of Defense Johnson announced today that 135,000 civilian workers for the armed services will be laid off in his drive to slash military spending. The largest cut will be in the Army, which will lose 70,000 men, followed by the Air Force with 45,000 and the Navy with 15,000.

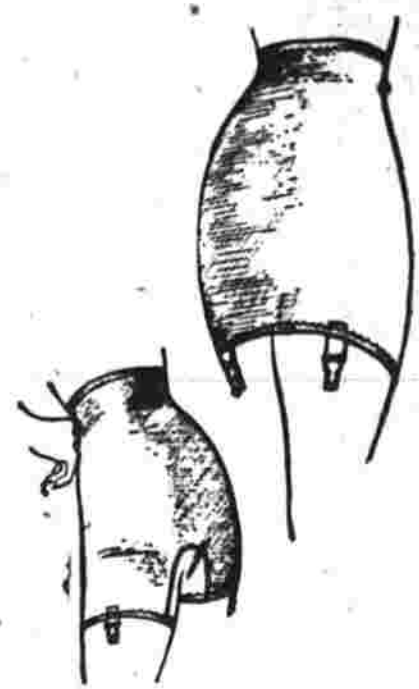

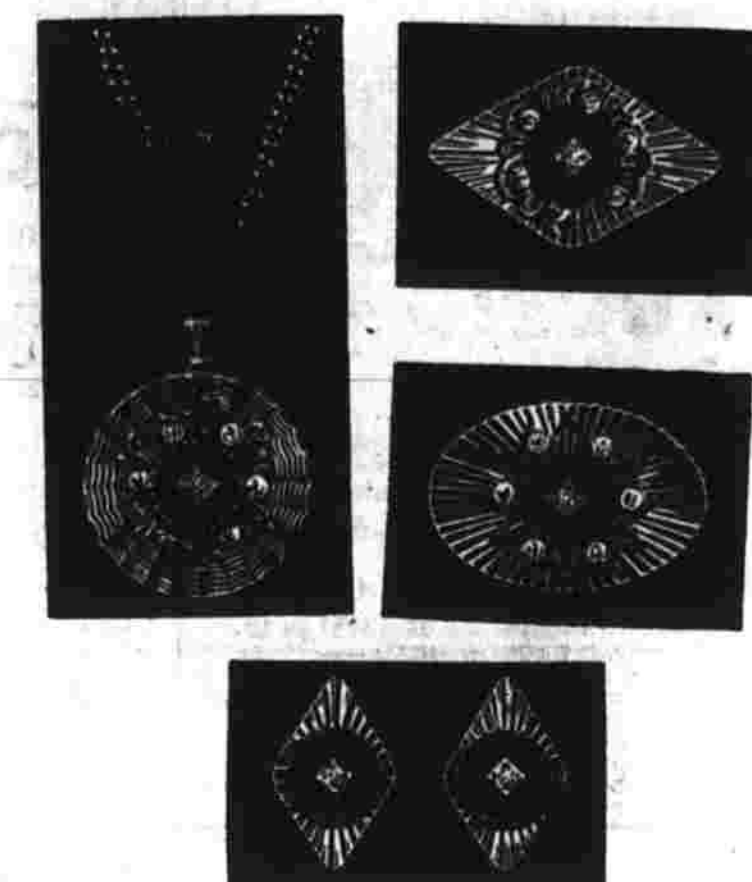

Navy Official Admits His Memo Included Confidential Matter

Worth Tells Committee He Gave Glenn Martin Document Copy Without Knowing It He Was Entitled to Secret Information; Says Didn't Tell Kimball About Actions

Washington, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The suspended Navy official who wrote the anonymous memo that touched off the E-98 investigation admitted today he put "confidential data" into it. Cedric Worth also told the House Armed Services Committee he had given a copy of the document to plane manufacturer Glenn Martin without knowing whether Martin was entitled to secret information.

He admitted many heads of the document have reached many hands.

Committee Counsel Joseph B. Keenan suggested that parts of it relating to performance figures of the giant, atom-engine intercontinental bomber, might help an enemy or potential enemy.

"I don't doubt that they had it," Worth said.

The exchange on confidential material came shortly after Worth had backed down on part of yesterday's testimony.

At that time he told the House Armed Services Committee, making the investigation of the memo, Navy Undersecretary Dan Kimball, told the committee he wrote the memo.

Today Worth said what he actually told Kimball was that Chairman Vinson of the committee was asking for the memo.

Keenan pressed Worth on the "unscrupulous man" Worth mentioned in the memo. Worth finally produced the name of Floyd Odium, head of the Atlas Corp., which controls Consolidated Airplane Company, makers of the B-36.

The memo linked Odium to charges of politics connected with the Air Force B-36 program. Odium is due to be heard later.

Keenan conducted Worth down through the anonymous document.

European Recovery Rate Is Slackening; Sober Report Given

Washington, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The Economic Cooperation Administration (ECA) today reported a slackening in the rate of European recovery. In a sober report on its first year's operations, the agency said the dollars earned by the nations of Europe during the period were enough to pay for only one-fifth of their imports from the western hemisphere.

"Critical Problem"

"This was the critical problem which the participating nations faced as the European Recovery program (ERP) entered its second year," the ECA said.

However, the report added, the program's "ultimate objective of healthy economy independent of extraordinary outside assistance remains as a difficult but attainable goal."

The report noted that Congress had authorized the European recovery program to boost production, stabilize currencies and stimulate trade among the participating nations.

"In each of these fields," ECA said, "the nations of Europe made substantial progress in the first 12 months of the European recovery program."

"Slackening in Progress"

As the year drew to a close, however, there were indications of a slackening in the rate of progress, particularly in the export trade, which gave warning of the difficult problems that must be solved before the goal of economic independence can be attained."

The agency noted that western Europe looked to exports during the 12-month period, through April 2, 1949, until they were about equal to the per-war volume. This, it said, was a significant advance.

"But the persistent difficulties which the nations have posed in continuing the process of sustaining the high level of trade which is the change from a seller to a buyer's market, has placed emphasis on measures needed to strengthen and expand multilateral trade."

Chiang Wants Fight to End Against Reds

Chiang Kai-shek appealed to Nationalist China today for a final fight against the "aggression" of the Communist International.

The Reds answered with a new push of uneasy Canton.

The Chinese Reds have "unmasked themselves as international agents of the 'aggression' of the Communist International," Chiang said, "and are now reaching the end of their fight."

But he also seemed to see the end of Canton as his government's refuge capital. For he said to-day that the "aggression" of the Communist International will again become the center for the fight against the Reds.

The new Communist drive was unleashed by famed one-eyed Gen. Liu Po-Cheng in the southwest corner of Kwangsi province. It threatened the town near the Kwangtung province border—all within an arc 140 miles northeast of Canton.

It was believed the Reds were trying to take Chianning, Lungtan and other strategic points in an enveloping movement aimed at capturing the city.

3. The perfume company was in the White House in August, 1945, when Maragon got into difficulties with Customs agents who found he had valuable perfume.
