Believed Missing Youths Back Home

Danbury, Sept. 11.—Five youths, four of whom are believed to be missing, returned home late Saturday, unaware that they had been the subject of a nation-wide missing persons alarm issued by the FBI.

The youths, Howard M. Polley, Jr., 21, his brother, Ralph, 19, John Miller, Jr., 21, and Alfred Adian, 19, all of Danbury, returned from Hollingsworth, 21, of Yardley, Pa., had been on a summer vacation trip to Alaska.

Parents of the Polley youths became alarmed when they failed to hear from the party making the return trip home when postcards showed they planned to mail regularly on route stopped coming. Public Works Activity Here

Town Engineer's Report Indicates Amount of Various Jobs Done

A large amount of highway and public works activity for the past month is shown by the report of Town Engineer James Sheehey, submitted to General Manager George H. Waddell.

In the engineering department 21 property lines were run, 15 street lines and much other survey work incidental to the improvement of streets is noted. Street numbers were assigned in 46 cases, building and yard lines were set in 19 instances and there was prepared a variety of estimates on construction necessary for public works.

To keep the engineering records up to date, new dwellings have to be "located" on maps, and the latest considerable excavations and time.

During August storm sewer grades were prepared for Green street, and the intersection of Woodbridge and Parker streets; a storm sewer was staked on Clcott street; many roads were oiled and sanded; there were surveys made of North School, Adams, Lake and Middle streets, to bring records up to date.

Various "locations" of water and sewer mains have been prepared, such as on Parker street and the East corner, curb grades have been improved, and Main street near Locust, estimates of various highway repairs have been prepared and sectional maps of sewer proposals have been drafted.

The engineer's office also prepares plans for minor public building repairs and alterations, such as those just made in the town court room.

In the highway department, on many various streets gutters have been cut, and graveling has been done; there has been a large amount of street patching and cleaning of catch basins. Highway sides have been mowed, high collected, grading and scarifying of four streets was completed.

With its many miles of highways under town charge, rights of way, and water lines, an engineering department, an engineering department, and the town engineer and his staff, with the highway department workers put in busy summer months. The activity in winter does not slacken, it merely shifts to snow clearing and the complications of freezing weather.

Town Engineer's Report Indicates Amount of Various Jobs Done

A large amount of highway and public works activity for the past month is shown by the report of Town Engineer James Sheehey, submitted to General Manager George H. Waddell.

In the engineering department 21 property lines were run, 15 street lines and much other survey work incidental to the improvement of streets is noted. Street numbers were assigned in 46 cases, building and yard lines were set in 19 instances and there was prepared a variety of estimates on construction necessary for public works.

To keep the engineering records up to date, new dwellings have to be "located" on maps, and the latest considerable excavations and time.

During August storm sewer grades were prepared for Green street, and the intersection of Woodbridge and Parker streets; a storm sewer was staked on Clcott street; many roads were oiled and sanded; there were surveys made of North School, Adams, Lake and Middle streets, to bring records up to date.

Various "locations" of water and sewer mains have been prepared, such as on Parker street and the East corner, curb grades have been improved, and Main street near Locust, estimates of various highway repairs have been prepared and sectional maps of sewer proposals have been drafted.

The engineer's office also prepares plans for minor public building repairs and alterations, such as those just made in the town court room.

In the highway department, on many various streets gutters have been cut, and graveling has been done; there has been a large amount of street patching and cleaning of catch basins. Highway sides have been mowed, high collected, grading and scarifying of four streets was completed.

With its many miles of highways under town charge, rights of way, and water lines, an engineering department, an engineering department, and the town engineer and his staff, with the highway department workers put in busy summer months. The activity in winter does not slacken, it merely shifts to snow clearing and the complications of freezing weather.
