**Ret Is Killed By Policeman**  
 Runs Amok and Stabs Neighbor Who Tries To Subdue Him  
 "Baltimore, Sept. 15—(AP)—Charles Burke Jr., 21, was killed by a young Army veteran who was on a rampage which ended in his death.  
 Burke, 21, was killed in the abdomen when he tried to subdue Lawrence Meyer, 21-year-old Purple Heart veteran, Meyer had nearly wrecked a neighbor's home and had terrorized an entire block in South Baltimore before he was finally cut down yesterday by bullets from a policeman's revolver.

 Meyer suddenly lost control of himself, stomped into the home of his next-door neighbor, Mrs. Mildred Walters, and began to smash furniture.  
 Burke dashed into the house when he heard the commotion. He tried to quell the raging veteran, who dove a switch-blade knife and plunged it into his neighbor's abdomen.  
 Witnesses summoned Donald Hundertmark, an off-duty policeman who was on duty in the area across the street. When he arrived and tried to quiet Meyer in a violent struggle followed.  
 Only after Meyer struck at Hundertmark with the knife and nearly missing him on one thrust, did the officer draw his gun and fire. One bullet struck Meyer in the chest and he was pronounced dead at the scene.  
 A University hospital attendant said Burke is expected to recover.

**Nurse Testifies Against Professor**  
 Columbia, N. C., Sept. 15—(AP)—A 45-year-old nurse testified yesterday that Russell H. Maxey called her his "sweet woman" before an attorney friend of his.  
 Maxey, a 45-year-old engineering professor at the University of South Carolina, is on trial for burglary with intent to murder the attractive brunette nurse and for assault and battery with intent to kill.  
 Conviction on these charges carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment.  
 Miss Pierce also related on the stand yesterday that Maxey pistol-whipped her for almost two hours after he emerged from a hotel room, he had been hidden in her suburban home here August 2.  
 When he was arrested, Maxey told officers he had been with her because he was jealous and wanted to marry her. He recently became reconciled with his wife.  
 The pretty death-bed nurse further testified yesterday that Maxey several times asked her to marry him but that she turned him down. She told the jury, however, that she and Maxey had traveled and registered at several hotels as man and wife.  
 She also said that she allowed Maxey, a professional photographer, to make "nude studies" of her without her bathing suit on when they were visiting a South Carolina beach.

### Dewey Orders Robeson Probe

New York Governor Believes Peekskill Riot Started by the Reds

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 15.—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey has ordered a sweeping Grand Jury investigation of the rioting that followed stage Paul Robeson's concert near Peekskill Sept. 4.

The Governor said last night that the violence obviously was provoked by Communist groups.

He decided that a special Grand Jury be called in Westchester county to determine whether the concert was "sponsored for the purpose of deliberately inciting disorder and whether it was part of the Communist strategy to foment racial and religious hatreds."

He also ordered that the grand jury find out whether the concert was "sponsored by the Communist party or other persons who came to express disapproval" of a Communist concert.

Dewey said that the veterans who staged a protest parade during the Negro baritone's concert and the "large number" of other persons who came to express disapproval "fell into a Communist trap."

However, he asserted the protesters were guilty of lawlessness. He said the "entire incident was a shame and a disgrace."

Must Be Investigated

Dewey said in a statement that "any action by persons, whether he is in violation of the rights of free speech and assembly will be investigated." He said the grand jury find out whether the disorders near the concert site, about 40 miles north of New York city, were the result of organized planning on the part of any individual or group.

Dewey announced his action at a news conference following a four-hour meeting with George M. Fannell, Westchester county district attorney, Fred W. Busch, sheriff of the county, and John A. Gaffney, superintendent of state police.

Fannell told reporters he would call a special grand jury as soon as he could, possibly next week.

In New York, a Communist spokesman said last night: "This is clear that Dewey plans more than a whitewash. He now plans to pin the responsibility for the storm troop action at Peekskill not on the hoodlums, but on the victims."

In his 1,100-word statement, Dewey also ordered Fannell to complete an investigation of the violence that prevented a Robeson concert Aug. 25 at another spot near Peekskill.

"The force of guard was military in character, operation and formation and discipline. They were equipped with weapons which were not prohibited by law, included live ammunition, gas, tear gas and clubs," he said.

He said the rioting was the result of an organized group which he said could be "so formidable and even deadly."

Unofficial reports placed the number of persons injured in the riot at more than 100. Fannell and Busch, in written reports to Dewey last week, set the figure at 76.

Both Fannell and Busch blamed teenagers for the violence.

Dewey also ordered Fannell to complete an investigation of the violence that prevented a Robeson concert Aug. 25 at another spot near Peekskill.

In his statement, Dewey asserted that the Communist group operated under the leadership of James P. Byrne and Attorney General Howard McGrath. Vincent represented President Truman, who was unable to attend.

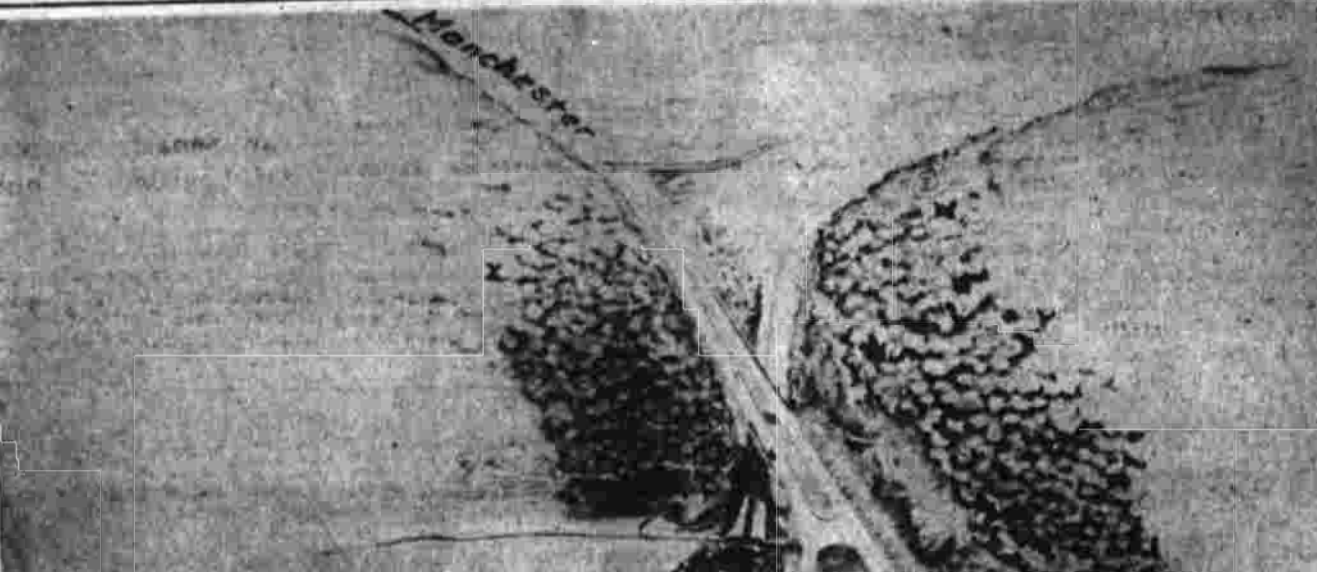

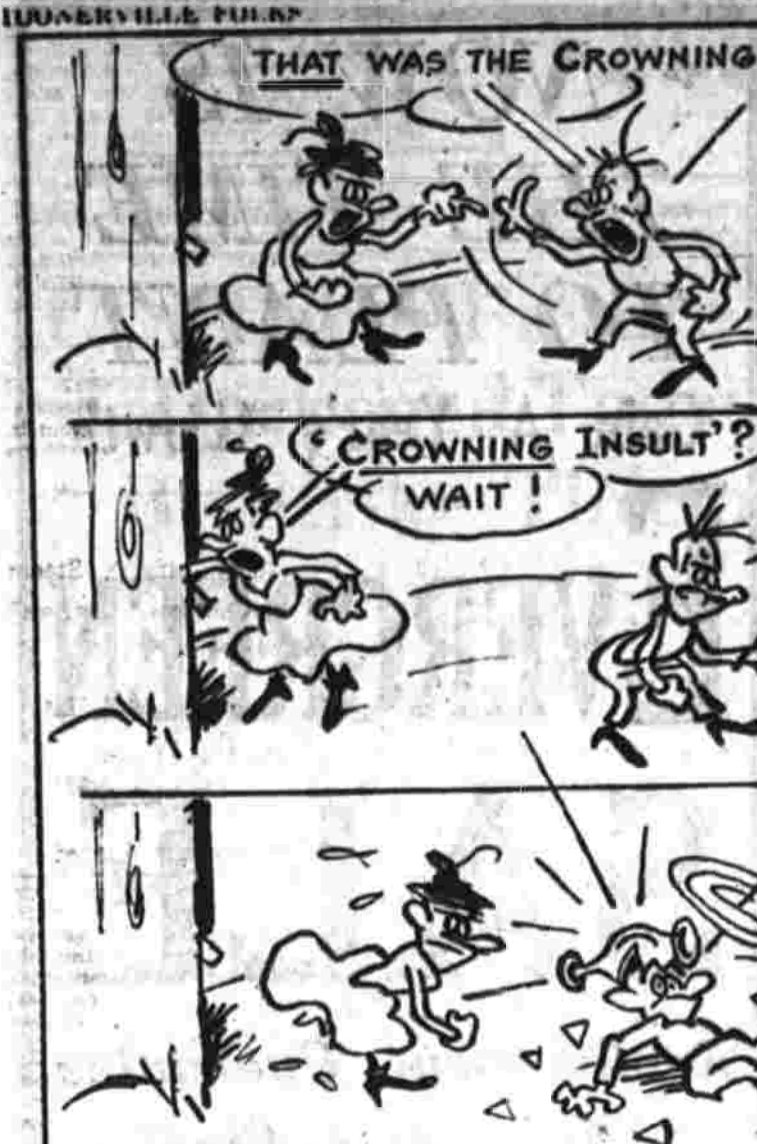

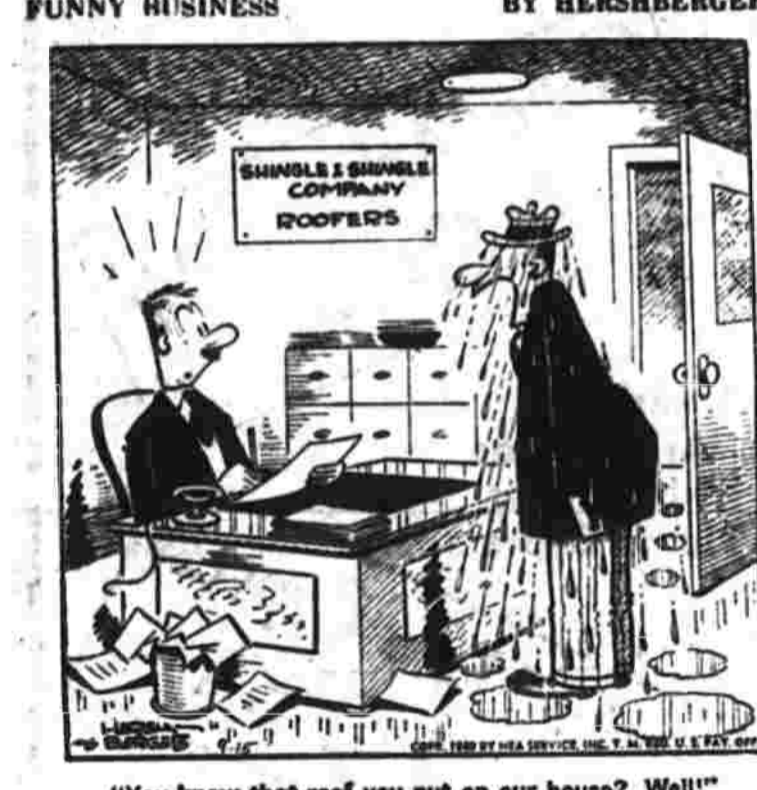
