them on building up the west and  
 dispersed forces of the  
 smaller nations, we can build up  
 a powerful collective force to de-  
 fend them all. More important  
 still, the Atlantic police force will  
 serve as a steady international  
 police force wherever we decide,  
 as we should, to extend the At-  
 lantic Pact into a world pact un-  
 der proper world authority.

This kind of suggestion will ob-  
 viously get no encouragement  
 from official American policy,  
 which is so much opposed to a  
 limitation of armaments, or the cre-  
 ation of an international police  
 force as it is in itself. And per-  
 haps it is just as well that it will  
 get nowhere, for the Flinders-  
 Sparkman proposal is one more  
 piecemeal attack on a problem  
 which probably can only be solved  
 in one big world decision, one  
 more half-hearted gesture toward  
 a program which can probably  
 only come in one great world re-  
 solve.

If the proposal does have any  
 present value, it is perhaps in the  
 fact that it shows the American  
 people are highly conscious  
 of the danger that lies in our  
 present policy of halfhearted  
 and old-style power politics  
 in the form of the Atlantic Pact,  
 and highly eager to put  
 some healing and uplifting altera-  
 tion into it.

Senator Flinders, in argument  
 of the proposal, gave a highly  
 dramatic, but not entirely un-  
 justified, version of how American  
 intentions seem to him, as Amer-  
 ican industrialist and public serv-  
 ant. If they seem such to him,  
 they must also seem that way to  
 some people in the outside world.  
 It looks to him said Senator  
 Flinders, as if "the mass murder  
 of civilians is the strategic objec-  
 tive of our air force." He charged  
 that the original atomic bombs  
 were dropped on Japan to "find  
 out what they would do," not to  
 win the war, since Japan had al-  
 ready offered five "peace feelers."

Their referring to well publicized  
 Air Force plans to atom bomb  
 Russia's 10 largest cities in case  
 of war, he charged that the At-  
 lantic Pact is the destruction  
 of the civilian populations of  
 these cities.

If you take this view of Air  
 Force strategy, then the North  
 Atlantic Pact is merely the in-  
 strument by which we assure our-  
 selves the best and most certain  
 carrying out that strategy.

What the Air Force may plan  
 in the event of war, in my think-  
 ing, is of no interest to the peo-  
 ple of average Americans. But  
 the point, already well illustrated  
 by Hiroshima, is that average Amer-  
 icans sometimes have some  
 knowledge of what American pol-  
 icy does, sometimes even no  
 knowledge of what American pol-  
 icy is planning to do. It is never  
 unadvisable, therefore, for con-  
 sistent Americans to try to lift  
 their own nation's policy, to try  
 to set public and official stand-  
 ards for it which may have some  
 slight moral influence on what  
 goes on behind the top, closed  
 doors. The American people do  
 not want to atom bomb Russia,  
 and the more often they say so  
 the better. The Flinders-Spark-  
 man proposal is one way of say-  
 ing it.

**The Lifted Bloom**

**Connecticut Yankee**  
 By A. H. O.

There may be some heated and  
 divisional party controversy along  
 the road, but it is noteworthy that  
 the Republican party is embarking  
 upon its 1950 Connecticut cam-  
 paign at a very early date.

The election is more than a year  
 ahead. Yet the party already  
 seems in the throes of its selection  
 of candidates. It is not impossible  
 that developments within the next  
 few weeks should produce the  
 main shape of the Republican  
 ticket for 1950, with major nomi-  
 neations so well assured that the  
 individuals scheduled to receive  
 them could go out and begin their  
 campaigning a year ahead of  
 time.

Strangely enough, for a cam-  
 paign in which it was assumed,  
 even a few weeks ago, that the  
 Republican party would be lack-  
 ing in candidates of major cali-  
 bre, the party has surprised  
 even itself by developing two  
 possibilities of "ready-made"  
 candidates—the gentleman from  
 Hartford, and the lady from  
 Fairfield County. Both have be-  
 come rather easily available  
 after years of professional talk  
 and expounding theories, perhaps  
 even capable of formulating  
 and explaining a party which has  
 sufficient sense to realize that  
 the party is not a young group to  
 know its own mind and stand.

With names like Mortenson and  
 Lewis in the race this early, the  
 party is far from any candidatorial  
 handicaps.

How does it come about that the  
 party leadership which is acting  
 as if it were a young group, have  
 been able to find such ready-made  
 candidates, is really acting as if  
 it had learned the truth, which is  
 that you can't wage an effective  
 election campaign in three months  
 time.

"First, we think the party lead-  
 ership has been impressed by the  
 magnitude of its 1950 task. The  
 combination of Governor Bowie  
 and Senator McMahon on the  
 Democratic ticket, which can also  
 be strengthened by a wise nomi-  
 nation for the short Senate term,  
 is going to be something to beat.

Second, we suspect that the  
 party leadership has a special rea-  
 son of its own for promoting a  
 present crystallization of major  
 candidates. That party leadership  
 is under fire from many sections  
 of the state. Its leadership in the  
 last General Assembly was not  
 impressive. Its prestige is low,  
 and it would be entirely possible  
 in the months ahead, for a revolt  
 to develop inside the party.

If, however, the present party  
 leadership should play its part  
 in the selection of Newington as  
 its ticket, and that state  
 school should be one of obvious  
 weight and prospects, and the  
 leading members of that pro-  
 spective state ticket should be  
 well satisfied with the present  
 party leadership, then that pres-  
 ent leadership will be able to  
 withstand the attack now rum-  
 bling through the state.

But the party leadership has a  
 growing idea that the leaders of  
 the Democratic ticket for 1950  
 ought to be designated at an early date,  
 and allowed to begin building their  
 campaign well before campaign  
 season officially opens in sound  
 reality, almost too sound, perhaps,  
 to come true. The Democrats hope  
 it won't come true.

**Polio Patients At Newington**  
 Ten Admitted Last Week as Result of Outbreak This Summer

Newington Home and Hospital  
 for Crippled Children is feeling  
 the aftermath of this summer's  
 polio, stage with the admission  
 of 10 patients from this  
 area of seven and a half months  
 ago and a half months of treat-  
 ment and rehabilitation. At least  
 as many more children will be ad-  
 mitted as soon as an adequate  
 nursing staff can be recruited and  
 facilities rearranged. The polio  
 epidemic list this year continues  
 since 1948 when 85 cases were  
 admitted from New Haven  
 County as a result of the epidem-  
 ic "through."

Through the generous support  
 of Connecticut citizens, our hos-  
 pital is ready to do all that can be  
 done in the polio emergency," B.  
 E. Fox, Director stated.

He said that the hospital has  
 well equipped hospital and thera-  
 py departments with their  
 trained staffs are already rehabili-  
 tating these youngsters. While  
 this emergency is causing some  
 rearrangement of our operating  
 schedule for some of the 28 other  
 diseases treated here, we are de-  
 veloping everything we can to keep  
 up with our regular work in addition  
 to the polio cases. We are de-  
 veloping a younger group to  
 provide more space for polio pa-  
 tients. Other rearrangements are  
 going on to provide more beds,  
 stretching the capacity of the  
 hospital to care for the larger  
 share in some cases several years  
 for a new group being discharged  
 from hospital's next week.

**Kept Busy**  
 Parents and friends of polio  
 patients need not worry that the  
 children are finding their days at  
 Newington long and boring. They  
 are very busy getting well. Ho-  
 spitals are applied almost con-  
 stantly during the day. Treat-  
 ments are given in the physical  
 therapy department and in the  
 wards for short periods between  
 the packing. The treatment under  
 trained therapists consists of ex-  
 ercises for weak and paralyzed  
 muscles and those needing to be  
 stretched because of existing  
 spasm.

Concern about missing school  
 with some of the older children  
 were showing has disappeared  
 with the promise that they will  
 attend the school at Newington  
 Home as soon as they are able.  
 Here the children attend school  
 on their beds, in wheel chairs and  
 braces and crutches. The school  
 program follows the same pattern  
 as that of the regular schools so that  
 upon discharge

the school teacher was  
 trying to tell their pupils about the  
 "As I stood on the station plat-

 asked.

**Body of Westport Woman Found Hanging From Apple Tree Limb**  
 Westport, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Police  
 listed as suicide today the death  
 of Mrs. Lillian Hughes Bragg, 50,  
 whose body was found hanging  
 from the limb of an apple tree at  
 her home here.

Police Lieut. Edward Capone  
 said Mrs. Bragg succeeded in  
 hanging herself with a piece of  
 clothing after her first attempt,  
 made with a leather belt, failed.  
 The belt, torn in two, was found  
 underneath the tree.

The lieutenant said Mrs. Bragg  
 mounted the clothesline around her  
 neck, after securing one end to  
 her home here.

Her body was found early last  
 night by her husband, Harry G.  
 Bragg, Jr., a former assistant at-  
 torney general in New York  
 state, when he returned home  
 from his New York city office.  
 Police quoted him as saying Mrs.  
 Bragg had been ill and despondent  
 for some time.

In addition to her husband, she  
 leaves an 18-year-old son, Harry  
 G. Bragg, Jr., a student at Robert  
 college, Geneva, N.Y.  
 Funeral services will be held in  
 New York city.
