## Proposed Report Would Clear AEC; Stirs Up Dispute

### Senate - House Atomic Committee Thrown Into Bitter Factional Battle; Hickenlooper Brands Decision in Paper as 'Whitewash'

Washington, Oct. 1.—(AP)—A proposed report clearing the Atomic Energy Commission of "incredible mismanagement" charges threw the Senate-House Atomic Committee into bitter factional battle today, Senator Hickenlooper (R., Iowa), who made the charges several months ago against the AEC and Chairman David E. Lilienthal, branded as a "whitewash" a staff-prepared draft report which said the charges "could not be proved."

Hickenlooper also bluntly challenged a statement by Committee Chairman McMahon (D., Conn.), that "we need no change in the management of the Atomic Energy Commission. The commission is not guilty of the charges that have been leveled against it."

Replied Hickenlooper: "This is not a report at all. It is not an audit. The conclusions never have been discussed. The investigation is not even completed."

The Senate-House committee wound up its public hearings into Hickenlooper's accusations last July 11, after six weeks of sometimes fiery testimony. It then turned to a closed-door study of the atomic agency's security policy.

Prepared by Committee Staff

The proposed report on the committee's investigation was prepared by the committee staff headed by William Borden, under McMahon's direction.

The draft was circulated to committee members as a confidential document for their study. McMahon called the group into session next Wednesday to approve or reject it.

Senator Knowland (R., Calif.) already has challenged the circulation of the document "without any prior consultation or discussion with the committee membership."

Senator Russell (D., Ga.) said he doubts that the time yet has arrived for the committee to make any report.

The preliminary draft, which went into details of evidence presented in the hearings, along with other proposed findings, made its contentions that Hickenlooper's mismanagement charges could not be proved:

1. That if there were any leaks

## Figures Show Jobless Drop Past Month

### Reopening of Schools And Spurt in Production Credited With Cutting Down Idle

Washington, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The reopening of schools and a spurt in production were credited today with cutting down unemployment in September for the second month in a row.

While much of the \$38,000 decline estimated by the Census bureau was traced to youngsters who gave up the job hunt to resume school work, the bureau found "some evidence" that adult unemployment shrank too.

Causes Drop in Peak

On the other hand, "the return to school of numerous summer workers" also caused a 630,000 drop in employment from the 1949 peak reached in August.

Totals for September were placed at 59,411,000 civilian employed and 3,351,000 unemployed. With 1,489,000 armed forces personnel added to civilian workers, the number of jobs was 60,870,000.

"Gratifying," Secretary of Commerce Sawyer commented, adding that the Census bureau report "further bolsters accumulating evidence that general business conditions are improving."

Farm Prices Go Up

Along that line, the Agriculture department reported that farm prices went up an average of almost two per cent from mid-August to mid-September—the first upturn since March.

Despite the rise—which was led by meats, truck crops, poultry, eggs and dairy products—the level of farm prices still is 14 per cent below a year ago.

But some declines in the wholesale prices of agricultural products were reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for the week ended Sept. 27. Wholesale prices as a whole, the bureau said, dropped 1.1 per cent in that week, bringing them 9.2 per cent below the corresponding week of last year.

Grain Prices Climb

Drops were noted in hog, steer and cotton wholesale prices, while grain prices climbed slightly.

In the employment picture, the Census bureau said non-agricultural industries accounted for 51,254,000 of the nation's workers in September.

Employment in that field was off 187,000 from August, the first month in which seasonal job opportunities generally hit their high point.

Farm employment, at a total of 8,153,000, was down 349,000 from August. The Census bureau said slow maturity of the cotton and tobacco crops had slowed the usual demand for harvest workers when these figures were obtained in the week ended Sept. 10.

This morning, when he appeared at his desk to begin his 61st year, Publisher Ferguson found on a specially bound scrapbook, suitable for collection of his own many souvenirs of 60 years of newspaper work, a gift from his employees.

As the morning progressed, he began to receive congratulatory messages from his fellow Connecticut publishers and newspapermen. He is dean of Connecticut publishers, and vice president of the Connecticut Associated Press.

"Proud of The Herald"

"It is given to very few men," said Publisher Ferguson this morning, "to have a record of 60 years in one job. I am grateful it has been permitted to me. ### Tito Accuses Russia Of Overthrow Move

#### Charges Effort to Infiltrate Spies Into Army and Government To Foment Revolt

London, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Premier Marshal Tito accused Russia today of trying to infiltrate spies into the Yugoslav Army and government in an effort to overthrow him. The Yugoslav leader, replying to Thursday's Soviet note scrapping the Russian-Yugoslav friendship treaty, charged that the Soviet government, "with diplomatic notes full of insults and threats," followed by demonstrative troop movements in countries bordering Yugoslavia, sought to intimidate the Yugoslav people.

Hungary and Poland yesterday followed Russia's lead in denouncing their mutual aid treaties with Yugoslavia. Other Soviet satellites in the Cominform are expected to take the same step soon.

Tito's new note—its wording mixed with pain and anger toward Moscow—was reported here by Tanjug, the official Yugoslav news agency.

"It is well known that Soviet representatives tried to organize their agents within the Yugoslav government and Yugoslav Army with a view of overthrowing the legal Yugoslav government," the note said.

Aim to Exert Pressure

Russia's aim, it went on, was to exert pressure on the Yugoslav people "in order to realize its undemocratic and anti-social ambitions."

Russia and the Tito regime have been quarreling since the Soviet backed Cominform tossed Yugoslavia out of its membership in June, 1948.

Their bickering reached a climax with Russian denunciation of the 20-year assistance pact which was signed during the war, in 1945. Russia backed its action with an accusation that Tito's government was hostile toward Russia and was a tool of imperialism.

Yugoslavia's answer called it an attempt at "blackmail."

### Free Pension and Insurance Walkout Deals Crippling Blow to Industry; Coupled With Mine Strike, Stoppage Threatens to Disrupt American Economy; Half-Million Out Now

#### Picket Lines Small

Pittsburgh, Oct. 1.—(AP)—A strike by a half-million CIO United Steelworkers today shut down iron and steel mills from coast to coast. The free pension and insurance walkout dealt a crippling blow to American industry. Coupled with the two-week-old coal mine strike, it threatens to disrupt American economy.

Picket Lines Small

Picket lines at mill gates in 27 states generally were small and quiet in the first nation-wide steel strike since 1946. Plant gates in Pittsburgh, Detroit and Cleveland were circled by picket lines which dwindled to mere handkies several hours after the strike began at 12:01 a. m.

A restaurant man in Lorain, O., whose establishment is near a giant plant of the National Tube company, posted this sign in a window:

"Large bowl of soup, for duration of strike, one cent."

Supervisory workers and foremen passed through picket lines without incident. They are allowed free entrance to keep mill equipment in good shape to resume work whenever the strike ends. No violence was reported anywhere.

Four Companies Exempt

The strike does not apply to four steel-producing companies. They are Portsmouth Steel company, Portsmouth, O.; Allegheny Ludlum Steel Corporation, Pittsburgh; Kaiser company, Inc., with plants in Utah, California and Pennsylvania; and Harrisburg (Pa.) steel company.

Portsmouth, with 4,000 workers, gave in to union demands for a 10-cent hourly package covering company-paid pensions and insurance for employees. The rest of industry held out for company security programs in which workers would kick in part of the costs. Harrisburg Steel's 1,300 workers are on the job because negotiations are continuing under a later strike deadline.

Contracts Still Running

Allegheny Ludlum, which has 12,000 employees, and Kaiser, with about 4,000, are still operating because their contracts run until

## Says TNT Used For Signalling

### Substituted for Smoke-Making Powder in Mock Beach Assault

Boston, Oct. 1.—(AP)—A Navy officer testified yesterday that blocks of TNT had been substituted for smoke-making powder in signaling devices used during a mock amphibious assault on a Boston beach Thursday in which a Boston Post photographer was killed and three Navy officers wounded.

Lt. Comdr. Francis W. Fane, commander of an underwater demolition crew during the assault, told a Navy Court of Inquiry investigating an explosion that killed Morris (Mac) Fineberg, 56, that the change was made by Lt. Hugh E. McStay of Norfolk, Va. McStay was injured critically in the explosion but physicians said he was showing improvement.

Lt. Comdr. E. Grant Meade of Philadelphia, and Ensign William Langone of Boston were injured in the same blast that killed Fineberg and wounded McStay.

Wanted Distinctive Signals

Fane said McStay, whom he described as an expert of many years standing in the handling of explosives, changed the charges to provide distinctive signals for the amphibious forces.

He said he did not question McStay's judgment because of his excellent record as an ordnance expert. He said he did not know if the "modification" had been approved by higher authority.

Two test rounds were fired before four or five of the altered projectiles were set off. Fane told the Navy court. He described the devices as signaling projectiles employing a small parachute to hold a bomb in the air until it exploded.

## Two Men Die In Air Crash

### Seven Parachute to Safety from Flaming Plane Diving to Earth

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Two crew members were killed. Eye-witness accounts and a preliminary investigation indicated that the pilot, Capt. William E. Blair of Houston, Tex., remained with the plane to keep it from landing in a thickly-populated area. His body was found on the wooded hillside near the scattered wreckage.

"Chute" Not Hooked Properly

One soldier is believed to have plummeted about 6,000 feet without a parachute. After examining the "chute," officials said he evidently didn't hook it properly and was jerked free shortly after leaving the plane. The body was found in a nearby schoolyard.

He was identified as Cpl. Norman E. Hinson of Waycross, Ga. The plane was on route to Augusta, Ga., to Spokane, Wash.

The co-pilot gave this account of the crash:

A fire broke out in the left engine just before the plane approached Lovell field here. The plane asked for clearance for an emergency landing, but couldn't make the field. The men started bailing out at 6,000 feet.

The soldiers were treated for minor burns at hospitals here.

Escapes With Minor Injuries

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### About \$1,400,000,000 More Than Revenue Spent in 3 Months

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The most hopeful guess from an administration expert puts the budget deficit for the 12 months ending next June 30 at \$2,000,000,000. Senator Byrd (D., Va.) predicts it may run as high as \$7,000,000,000.

While a lot depends on what Congress does with some \$16,000,000,000 in appropriations bills still awaiting final action, officials said yesterday that government spending probably will top even the peacetime record of \$41,858,000,000 proposed by President Truman.

Revenue Likely to Fall

And while spending climbs, the government's revenues appear likely to fall below the \$40,885,000,000 forecast in January. So far, spending is running 22 per cent above last year, and revenues have increased only two per cent.

These are the official Treasury figures for the first quarter of the fiscal year, through Sept. 30: The government's income: \$9,015,000,000. Its spending: \$10,419,000,000. The deficit: \$1,404,000,000.

## Civil Defense Setup Weak

### About Dozen Men in Planning Groups; No Authority in Hands

Washington, Oct. 1.—(AP)—If American cities were attacked tomorrow the Federal government would be ready with two civil defense planning organizations totaling about a dozen men who have no authority whatsoever.

Some states and communities have gone ahead with their own plans for rescue and protection of civilian populations in event of atomic or other aerial attack under plans tentatively outlined by the Federal government a year ago and since put aside for new studies.

But the only civil defense planning groups in the Federal setup now are a study unit within the National Security Resources board consisting of a coordinator and one assistant, and a civil defense liaison office in the Defense department made up of about ten men.

Responsibility Transferred

In a directive earlier this year, President Truman ended the office of Civil Defense Planning created in March 1948 by the late Secretary of Defense James Forrestal.

## Young Episcopalians Told Church in Darkest Hour

San Francisco, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Young Episcopalians were urged last night to seize the greatest opportunity ever offered the church in what is at the same time its darkest hour.

The Rt. Rev. Stephen Neil, assistant to the archbishop of Canterbury, told a youth convention of the Protestant Episcopal church that a few realize "the power of the threat" of Communism to the Christian churches.

"For the first time in history the church has become literally world-wide," Bishop Neil said. He added that the greatness of the occasion was matched by the greatness of the peril.

Urges Support of Council

## Nation's Coal Piles Higher Than in '48

### Bureau of Mines Reports 48-Day Supply on Hand; May Last Much Longer

Pittsburgh, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The nation's coal strike is two weeks old today but, ironically, coal stockpiles are higher at the same strikeless time last year.

The Bureau of Mines reports a 48-day supply on hand. That compares with the 46-day supply in 1948.

And the coal may last a lot longer than 48 days. Usually a prolonged coal strike shuts down the fuel hungry steel industry.

Reduces Fuel Appetite

Now the steel industry is closed by a strike of its own. That drastically reduces the nation's fuel appetite.

One-fifth of John L. Lewis United Mine Workers go back to digging coal Monday. But it's still "no pension no work" for his 400,000 bituminous miners in northern and southern states.

Lewis yesterday signaled a return to work for 80,000 anthracite (hard coal) miners in eastern Pennsylvania who walked out in sympathy with their fellow UMW members Sept. 18.

Also ordered back to the mines were 22,000 western miners.

"The suspension of mining in the western and anthracite area is not now vital to the pending wage negotiations," Lewis said.

No Sign of Agreement

The fiery UMW leader is engaged in marathon contract talks with northern and western bituminous mine operators at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va. There is no sign of agreement.

The coal strike has idled 32,000 workers on coal carrying railroads.

The first industry layoff was reported by the Hayden Chemical Corporation at Morgantown, W. Va. They said they would curtail operations at their ordnance works 25 per cent effective Monday, to conserve coal.

Company officials said about 50 of its 1,000 employees would be laid off by the curtailment.

Plans to Procure Reserve

Meanwhile, the Virginia Emergency Fuel commission made plans to procure a 50,000-ton coal reserve for use in event the present coal walkout continues.

## Two Men Die In Air Crash

## Deficit End Not in Sight

### About \$1,400,000,000 More Than Revenue Spent in 3 Months

Washington, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The Federal government spent about \$1,400,000,000 more than it took in during the first three months of the 1950 fiscal year, and no relief from red ink financing appears in sight.

The most hopeful guess from an administration expert puts the budget deficit for the 12 months ending next June 30 at \$2,000,000,000. Senator Byrd (D., Va.) predicts it may run as high as \$7,000,000,000.

While a lot depends on what Congress does with some \$16,000,000,000 in appropriations bills still awaiting final action, officials said yesterday that government spending probably will top even the peacetime record of \$41,858,000,000 proposed by President Truman.

Revenue Likely to Fall

And while spending climbs, the government's revenues appear likely to fall below the \$40,885,000,000 forecast in January. So far, spending is running 22 per cent above last year, and revenues have increased only two per cent.

These are the official Treasury figures for the first quarter of the fiscal year, through Sept. 30: The government's income: \$9,015,000,000. Its spending: \$10,419,000,000. The deficit: \$1,404,000,000.
