New Service Begins Work

Designed to Aid Manufacturers in 'Emergency' Areas of State

Hartford, Oct. 12.—A new state service designed to aid manufacturers in "emergency" areas in procuring government contracts, has been established by the State Development commission and began functioning today.

The new department, known as the Federal Procurement service of the State Development commission, is located in Room 100, State Office building, Harry M. Ashmore of New Haven, a paid representative of the commission, is in charge of the service.

A spokesman for the commission said today that the aim of the new department is to quickly bring to the attention of manufacturers in the "E" areas opportunities to bid on items and contracts sought by various Federal agencies. The service will get daily reports from all Federal agencies their invitations to bid.

The State Labor department employment offices also will get the daily flyers and will contact local manufacturers who are qualified to bid on contracts. The procurement service will also assist small manufacturers to obtain sub-contracts when a prime contractor is placed with a manufacturer who places sub-contract orders of the work.

All bidding will be on a nationwide basis, the commission spokesman said with preference being given to bidders in "E" areas in the case of a tie bid.

Dr. Fischer said, however, that Dykason evidently had suffered a fainting spell on the beach and then had managed to get back in the car before he died.

Flood Drowns Two Workers

Four Others Escape From Tunnel Beneath Waterbury Canal

Waterbury, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Trapped by a sudden flood from the broken bed of a canal, two workers drowned yesterday inside a 30-inch sewer pipeline. Four others escaped with their lives from a tunnel directly beneath the canal.

Victims of the accident were Salvatore Carpentieri, 39, 80 East Clay street, and Gino (Jerry) Capodipino, 42, 141 River street, both of Waterbury.

The two men were about midway in the 2,000-foot pipeline, in which they barely had room to walk on hands and knees, when it was flooded. The water rushed in from a connecting mainline after the tunnel had filled when its roof gave away.

Wooden Form Acts as Dike

Their bodies were washed to one end of the pipeline where a wooden form acted as a dike to back up the water in a pool.

The sewer is being installed for the city of Waterbury on the grounds of the Scovill Manufacturing company plant. 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Little Halt in Business Locally on Columbus Day

Manchester today observed Columbus Day with little halt in business activity, but with complete shutdown of banking and municipal offices due to the fact that this is a legal holiday. This morning, with many people enjoying the day off, activity was slow along Main street, but picked up toward noon as numbers of shoppers appeared.

Flags which had fluttered up at distant intervals early in the morning, became more numerous as merchants, by mid-morning, had found an opportunity to plant them along the walks.

No special events were scheduled for today, although some schools have had recess made of the importance of October 12.

The whole occasion is somewhat disturbed in the records as to what occurred on the day.

Actually, at 2 a. m. on the morning of Friday, October 22, 1492, Rodrigo de Triana, seaman aboard the "Nina," of 40 tons burden, smallest of three vessels in the flotilla of Admiral Cristobal Colon, sighted land and thereby discovered the New Bahaman island of San Salvador. The discovery was made under the flag of the Kingdom of Spain.

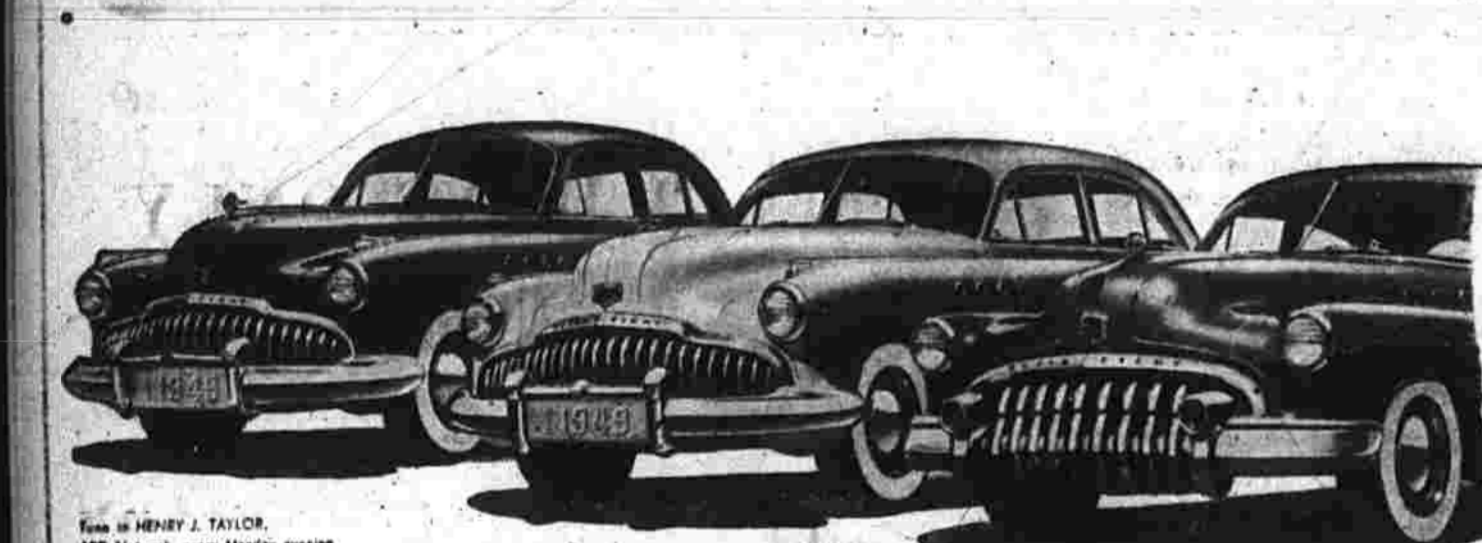

earlier than 1885 was not possible. Viability thought a while, perhaps wondering whether he should cable Moscow. But finally he replied, saying he would be right as a date. The United Nations family could hardly wait for the dinner to end, so it could get out and tell the outside world that Russia had finally invited somebody across the street.

This outside world was so impressed with the news that it resented, for a moment, its own across-the-street disparagement of the prospective host. News stories pointed out, quite pleasantly, that Russia's previous unwillingness to issue an invitation might not be uninteresting alone. Post-war Moscow, they said, were still anxious for living space suitable for the accommodation of United Nations delegates and staff.

It is more than an invitation which is needed to reconcile things between these world neighbors. But, for a moment at least, work was done. It was a very human basis, in which it seemed some progress of the kind which has defied formal diplomats and power politics was being made. We shall see how the invitation stands up, toward 1953.

Police State at Work

Yugoslavia having slipped away, Russia is determined to take its chances with Czechoslovakia. That seems to be the significance of the series of mass arrests now taking place in that country.

Newspaper reports describe the new arrests as being concentrated on the Czech middle class. They succeed a series of arrests of Communist "reactionaries," suspected of leaning toward the independence of Tito or the rising of Trotsky. Thus the effort, at least, is being made to wipe out the two natural enemies of Moscow Communist domination in Czechoslovakia, and to wipe them out before they have any chance to follow the example of Yugoslavia.

This is suffering for the individuals involved. But, to those who know Czechoslovakia and its people, it can never occur and its people, Communists are seeking security for themselves and their way of life.

Communism, in Czechoslovakia, as in some other countries, originally performed something of a historic role, breaking down classic obstacles to progress and opening the people. But, as elsewhere, it followed up that opening by the introduction of its own arbitrary and dictatorial way of life. And those who had some sympathy with some of its tearing down have found their disillusionment swift and certain. The election may bring repression of the past only in order to institute its own new repression.

The people of Czechoslovakia have borne tyranny before, and never lost their capacity to resent it, and, eventually, to end it.

The new firm Moscow grips Czechoslovakia, the more certain its eventual loss of Czechoslovakia. This may not be of much comfort to those who now suffer the artificialities of the police state, but it is history.

The Austrian Vote

In the Austrian elections, in which, according to the headlines, the Communists were "swamped," the Communists actually increased their vote by 38,394, up to a total of 212,651 out of the 4,242,239 voting. So the Communists were "swamped" again, as they had been in 1945, and they were held from making any significant increase in their vote strength. This was encouraging for the West.

But while the Communists were being held practically stationary, the new Austrian party, called itself the League of Independents, started from scratch and wound up the third Austrian party, with a total of 462,122 votes. This was not particularly good news for the West. For the new party is a Nazi party.

The rise of this new party cut into the strength of the People Party and Socialist coalition which has been ruling Austria since 1945. Furthermore, it offers the first temptation to this coalition, since it represents a potential balance of power with which the People Party might combine if it should come to a split with the Socialists.

So, against the news that Communism is static in Austria, the news is also the news that Nazism has raised itself again, and immediately obtained a position of potential influence. The election may have been defeat for Communism, but it was not all victory for the West, after all.

The Navy's Moral Question

One of the arguments Navy spokesmen have been delivering against American military planning has nothing to do with the technical capabilities of the B-36 as contrasted with other weapons.

In this particular argument the Navy does not even deny the ability of the B-36 to carry the atomic bomb payload.

What the Navy questions is a much larger issue—that of whether this country should have its potential war strategy, as it has based it in all recent planning, on the indiscriminate murder of civilian populations which is the only function of atomic bombing.

Should America plan this kind of war? Should creating 70 Hiroshimas inside Russia be professed American strategy, as it now is? Suppose we should fight this kind of war and win it? What kind of victory would we have? What kind of world would be left? How could we ever expect any kind of peace over to follow such a military policy?

These are the questions Navy spokesmen have been asking, entirely apart from their contention that the B-36 itself is a sitting duck. And perhaps they represent the most significant point the Navy has raised, a question not only of what kind of war we are planning to fight, but what kind of nation we are.

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Invitation?

The world problems of our time seem the most sensibly complicated problems of all time. And then, at some moments, they come down to a question astoundingly simple and commonplace—as commonplace as whether some neighbor with whom you haven't been speaking lately may invite you up on the front porch the next time she sees you going by.

There was such a tantalizingly human moment at a dinner in United Nations circles at Lake Success the other night. The Russians were host to a party of United Nations diplomats. Suddenly, Brig. Gen. Carlos P. Romulo, of the Philippines, president of the current session of the General Assembly, turned "point blank" to Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky and asked whether Russian hospitality would be available for a 1950 meeting of the United Nations General Assembly in Moscow.

Vishinsky said, quite calmly, that Russia would be glad to be host to the United Nations in 1950. His reply was a sensation.

This was the first time, you see, that the United Nations family has ever been given any kind of invitation to cross the threshold of Russia.

It has been waiting a long while for some invitation that such a thing might be possible. Hearing that it was possible, Secretary General Trygve Lie couldn't resist an opportunity to improve still more on the unexpected warm moment. He cut in to ask Vishinsky why some date

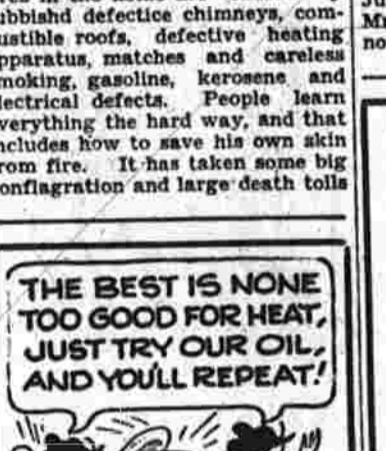
