The Improvers donated cash awards for essays and poster contests.

During the program the essays winners read their compositions. Chief Mera gave a demonstration of several pieces of fire fighting equipment. He also turned "Fire-fighter 10" and conducted a quiz program with Snow and Pagani calling on children from the sides for the answers. The questions carried a cash award for each answer. A total of \$40 had been distributed by the end of the assembly, and these dollars were given to the school, range the school for a surprise fire drill that will see the building emptied of all children within one minute.

The Winning Essay: "Following is Thorp's winning essay: 'This does apply to you. To many people think of fire prevention as fire drills and that is for the family next door, around the corner or across the street. 'Hiding your home or fire hazards goes further than throwing out waste materials. It means checking your electrical cords for frayed frayed spots and loose connections; overloaded circuits also cause fires. Rusted furnace pipes allow sparks to escape and set fire to other materials. Uninsulated stove pipes placed too close to the wall are a potential menace as they are very likely to set the wall alight. Faulty or dirty oil burners may clog and cause very serious fires. Many central chimneys are not properly insulated to prevent excessive heat from running a fire in the fireplace. It is highly dangerous to have inflammable cleaning fluids around the
