Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—A Federal jury convicted 11 top-ranking American Communist leaders today of conspiring to teach overthrow of the U. S. government by force... The 11 defendants, all members of the Communist National Board, were remanded to jail to await sentencing next Friday at 10:30 a. m. They face sentences up to 10 years in prison and \$10,000 fine each... Immediately afterward, Federal Judge Harold B. Medina found five of their lawyers guilty of Criminal Contempt during the nine-month trial and sent them to jail for terms varying from 30 days to six months... Eugene Dennis, a defendant who was not in court today, also drew a six-month sentence... Trial Unprecedented... Thus ended after seven hours of jury deliberation that began yesterday afternoon, a strike-industry trial unprecedented in American history... The Senate, apparently desirous of agreement in the near future, voted last yesterday to continue financing the Army, Navy and Air Force on the same temporary basis that has provided the three services with money since July.

Congress is hoping to adjourn within a week; the Senate proposal would keep the military in funds until the lawmakers return in 1950.

Technically, the armed forces have been without official funds since last Monday, the expiration of the last previous temporary measure.

Air Force Figure Trimmed

The House on April 15 passed a \$18,272,128,900 bill financing the military establishment for the present fiscal year. On Aug. 29 the Senate passed the House bill after trimming the Air Force figure and knocking out funds for the stockpiling program.

Congressmen went to work to try to adjust the differences. They agreed on everything but the size of the Air Force and the stockpiling program.

Last Monday the House, by a vote of 305 to 109, refused to give in to the Senate on the two items. Subsequently the

such a passion for disclosing our atomic energy formula and secrets.

Hickenlooper is preparing a report to the Atomic Energy Commission. He is expected to dwell at length on his contention that the commission has been lax in keeping A-bomb secrets.

The majority report, approved by 10 Democratic members of the committee and opposed by six Republicans, was made public yesterday in just about the form indicated earlier by Senator McKelvin (D., Conn.), the chairman.

The report said:

"If any security leaks appreciably assisted the Soviet, and probably they did not, the record implies that the commission has been negligent in its duties. It is the duty of the commission to see that the atomic energy program is kept secret."

The report said:

"No mobilization of guards, police and forces could ever protect us so well—before or after the Soviet bomb test—as the powerful deterrent American stockpile which the commission has striven to accumulate."

Stalin's congratulatory message last night to east Germany's President Wilhelm Pieck and Chancellor (Premier) Otto Grotewohl called establishment of the stable regime "turning point in the history of Europe."

He declared that the Russian and German peoples made the greatest sacrifices in World War II.

"If both peoples," Stalin continued, "will show the same determination to fight with the same intensity of effort for peace with which they waged war, peace in Europe can be regarded as assured."

The statement was distributed here by ADN, the official Soviet news agency.

"There is no doubt," Stalin said, "that the existence of a peace-loving democratic Germany, along with the existence of a peace-loving Soviet Union, excludes the possibility of new wars in Europe, makes an end to European bloodshed, and makes impossible the servitude of European countries under world imperialism."

The Russian premier declared, "I have the greatest confidence that the German people will renounce forever any claim on the former German territory now held by the Soviet Union, Poland and Czechoslovakia."

He said that the Russian people would cooperate with the other peoples of Europe to bring about a new world order.

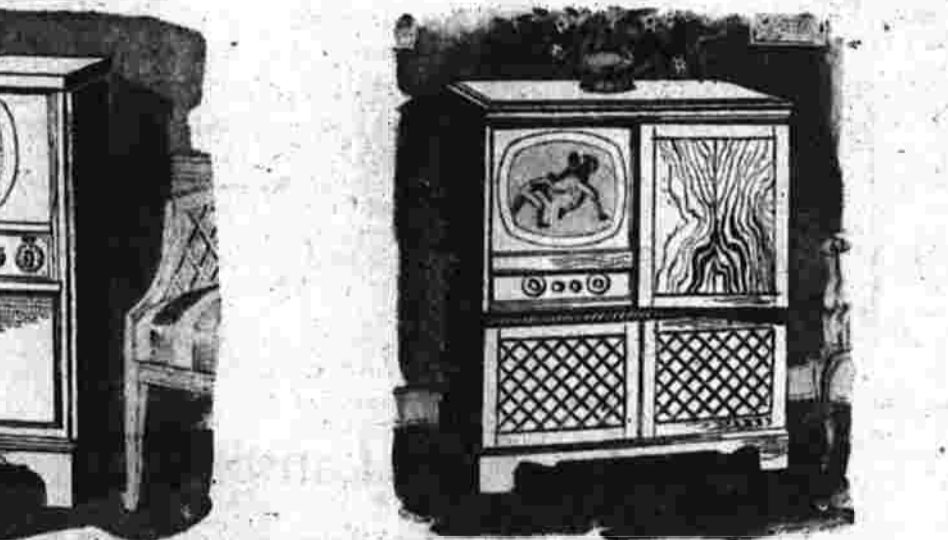

Realistic Peace Champion

The 1949 award of the Nobel Peace Prize is, we believe, excellent among all awards of record. There have been times when the award has gone to representatives of causes and principles almost purely idealistic. And there have been other times when it has gone to the sponsors of seemingly practical policies for peace, only to have time bring realization that the practical policy was built on shifting and treacherous world sand.

But the new award, to Lord Boyd Orr of Britain, goes to an idealist and to a realist, in one and the same man. And, through him, it goes to a policy which is at once the age-old dream of poets and the practical politics of our own time.

Lord Boyd Orr first came to prominence in the post-war world as a nutrition expert, in which capacity he became director general of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization. There he sharpened his awareness that food production and hunger are one world problem, only to be solved through recognition of that fact and application of one world principles.

When he left that organization, eighteen months ago, he had planted the seed of the idea which has recently flowered in the FOA's proposal for a world clearing house for farm production, which could operate to cure the present penalty for over-production in a world which is still hungry, and which could take the food of the world producers to those who need it. We have previously referred to this proposal as the possible solution of the American farm problem. You never know, in fact, how many separate problems can be solved with one program when that program is based on a broad world view, and when Sir Boyd Orr left the FOA, he did so in order to devote his time to the world idealism of the World Federation—the institution of a limited world government—has long been the dream of the pure idealists. Now, in our time, it is also the down to earth common sense of world politics.

It deserves a peace award if anything ever has deserved peace award. For it represents the political essential of peace. It is the one thing without which peace cannot be had. It stands stark and alone as the only real route there is to peace. It is the cause in which men of vision, men of good will, and men of the most elemental realism all now believe together. For once, the Nobel award has coincided with the real, true hope of the future.

Rockville Call Special Town Session

Fillbuster

The proposed liberalization of the Displaced Persons Bill now before the Senate would not add to the number of persons eventually admitted to this country from the countries in question. As many as come in, eventually, under the quota system, and those whom the bill would admit now will be charged against that quota system. The main thing the bill would do is permit 134,000 of these homeless Europeans to come in during the next three years.

It would also remove some of the un-American restrictions on selection of admittances which the 80th Congress wrote into its bill. But it does not change the requirements that those to be admitted to this country should be carefully screened, and that there should be, in each case, a good guarantee that these new immigrants to this country should not become a public charge or burden.

Against this bill there is now a filibuster in progress, a filibuster designed to kill the bill by talk at a time when members of Congress are known to be anxious to adjourn and go home. Those who are against the bill make their attitude pretty plain. They don't want "foreigners" coming to this country. This Pizza Earth
Dr. Gerard P. Kutper, a Netherlands astronomer who is now at the University of Chicago, has a fine theory for the origin of the earth and other planets. About three billion years ago, he says, there was a fat pancake of gas and dust, revolving around the sun. As it grew to be a bigger pancake, it began to break up under its own whirling. The disintegrated pancake re-formed into a series of great globules, still revolving, and these became the earth and the other planets, with the gas condensing and the solid particles to form the present solid tenants of the skies.

These planets each had various satellites. It took a few thousand years for a planet to condense and form itself. A satellite could take final shape in a mere stellar moment, say 100 years.

This seems to us a very reasonable and valid explanation of how the earth came into being. We like it about as well as any other scientific theory ever offered. It's quite plausible, and reminds us of the way pizza dough is made. When it gets around to such unessential details as science, we know, will tell us where the original gas and dust and sun came from.

Hartford, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Attorney General William H. Hadden has disclosed that he and Gov. Charles Bowles do not agree on the issue of control of tidal lands.

Hadden, a Republican, disclosed yesterday he has filed a brief, on behalf of the state, with a congressional committee contending that tidal lands ought to be returned to state control.

Shannon, Hadden's predecessor, had never, to his belief, in Hadden's opinion, taken any action to infringe on state rights, would result in financial loss to the state through curtailment of taxes and oyster fishing licenses fees and would cause forfeiture of ownership titles.

Hadden's brief said that Connecticut had established a tidal lands policy in 1862 when the tidal lands charter was passed by Connecticut and New York. Long Island sound was approved by Congress in 1881.
