### Tax Receipts Jump Looms

**Expected as Result of New Federal Law on Cigarette Shipments**

Hartford, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Connecticut cigarette tax receipts will jump "at least \$10,000,000 a year as a result of a new Federal law on interstate shipments of the commodity.

That estimate was made today by State Tax Commissioner Dennis P. O'Connor. In a statement, he said that the new Federal law requires shippers to furnish data regarding their cigarette shipments to consumers in that state.

The Federal measure was signed Thursday by President Truman, and requires shippers to furnish data regarding their cigarette shipments to consumers in that state.

Cigarette tax receipts in Connecticut during the past year were \$7,294,733. One-third of that was based on one cent a pack sent to the Soldiers' Station, and Marines' fund for needy veterans.

The remaining two-thirds went into the state general fund.

### Wife Is Held For Murder

**Shooting Follows Gay Party and Quarrel With Female Friend**

Frankfurt, Germany, Oct. 21.—(AP)—U. S. authorities said today the pretty brunette wife of a young German lieutenant was charged with murdering him after a party at which she quarreled with a female friend of the family.

Frankfurt District Attorney Fred Johnson said he would place a charge of first degree murder against Mrs. Yvette Madson, 22, daughter of Dr. Madson, 5612 Sixth avenue, Brooklyn, N. Y. She is the mother of two small children.

She is living with her husband, Andrew W. Madson, 28, of Oakland, Calif., who was shot early in the morning in the living room of his home near the Rhine-Rain air base.

The announcement said he died from a bullet fired from a .45-caliber Army pistol owned by Madson.

Madson and his wife attended a party given by friends in an American community near Frankfurt, Mrs. Madson quarreled with a female friend of the family and then left the party, early in the morning, driving the family car.

It is an hour later Madson was driven home by a friend.

She shot through the front door of the house he was shot through the heart," the announcement said.

Mrs. Madson summoned the Rhine Main base provost marshal, Capt. W. G. Hillman, who arrived directly across the wooded lane. She told Hillman she had shot her husband in the living room of the house, the Air Force said.

She then fled to her home in Germany at Christmas, 1947. The Air Force said her two children, four-year-old son named Dana and a daughter, Nancy, 11 months old, were in the temporary care of other Air Force officers.

Mrs. Madson was taken this afternoon from the hospital, where she had been under treatment, to a prison, to the U. S. Civilian court in Frankfurt.

Madson's mother, Mrs. Dorothy Madson, lives at 7512 Sunlight drive, in the city of Frankfurt.

Johnson, district attorney of the U. S. zone's Fourth Judicial district, said Mrs. Madson would be charged under the section of the German penal code which is the equivalent of first degree murder.

Johnson, of 2822 Clara avenue, St. Louis, Mo., explained that Mrs. Madson is the widow of an American serviceman comes under the jurisdiction of the Allied high commission civil court.

Madson was a ground officer in the Military Air Transport Service.

Friends said he also had been a pilot during the allied air hit to Berlin.

Neighbors said the shooting occurred about 2:45 a. m. following a party the Madsons had attended.

Mrs. Madson was placed in Rhine-Main hospital for treatment of shock and emotional upset after the shooting.

Hartford, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Danger that the government-sponsored and supported research programs at universities might "too markedly" determine the direction or results of research was voiced last night by Dr. George R. Harrison, dean of science at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Speaking at Hotel Board at a dinner of MIT Alumni and friends stressed the contribution of the school "to the national welfare" and to "technological development of modern warfare."

This outstanding achievement, he declared, "has resulted in a strong demand on MIT, as on many other universities, to carry on research projects sponsored by the government and supported by government funds. While much of this sort of work should be done as a public service and is of very great value in giving opportunity for professional work during training to both faculty and students, there is the very great danger of the direction which research takes being determined too markedly by this type of support."

**Gagnon Gets Year in Jail**

Local Man Sentenced On Morals Charge; Tried Before Jury

Charging a two weeks' trial held behind the closed doors of the Hartford County Superior Court, Leon J. Gagnon, 40, of 22 Fallow drive, was sentenced yesterday by Judge J. Howard Roberts to serve one year in the County Jail on a charge of indecent assault. Gagnon was charged with molesting a 9-year-old girl. The jury returned after three hours' deliberation and announced that it was unable to reach a verdict. Judge Roberts requested the jury to make another attempt at a guilty verdict, and was returned at 4 p. m.

Assistant State's Attorney Joseph V. Fay, Jr., asked that Gagnon be sentenced to one to five years in State prison. Defense Attorney George C. Leamer stated that the accused had no police record, that he had an excellent Army record and was a devoted churchgoer. Leamer requested a suspended sentence and a two years' probation. He also urged that Gagnon be treated by a psychiatrist if such treatment was required.

Prosecutor Fay replied that the state was not seeking to penalize Gagnon for the indecent assault, but for the crime in 1946, and that a psychiatrist would be available at State prison.

Gagnon was presented in Manchester Town Court on Friday for indecent assault. Judge Wesley C. Gryll found probable cause and bound the case over to Superior Court.
