Obviously Nehru's a silly fellow, and India must be a silly country.

Just as we suspected, he gets some of his silliness from fellow named Gandhi. He admits it himself. Gandhi, he says, taught the creed of nonviolence. Once you practice that creed, you get into a softening of big power attitudes, that it will take it upon itself to prevent the great mass of world humanity which does not want war, that it will take its own positive steps to create the peace it is supposed to guard.

All this was the burden of remarks by Sir G. G. Postel, president of the General Assembly, the other day. He was the first United Nations official open to the idea that the United Nations is merely a peace-keeping organization, and to advance the theory that if it wants peace to keep, it must make it.

They do not know how to make peace.

If there is a chance of peace, it lies in the possibility that the United Nations itself will propose and compel a softening of big power attitudes, that it will take it upon itself to prevent the great mass of world humanity which does not want war, that it will take its own positive steps to create the peace it is supposed to guard.
