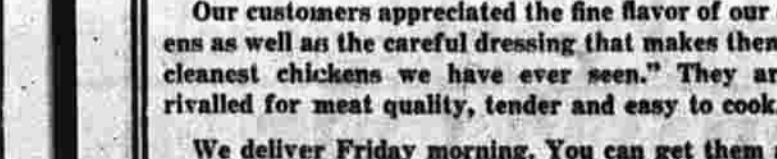

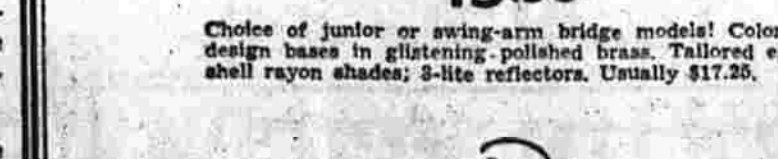

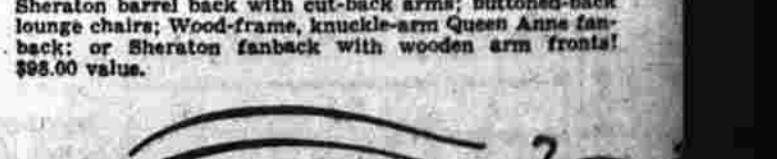

Priest Talking Here Says Leaders Not Christians in Thought

Referring directly to the stand of Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt on the Bardeen bill regarding Federal aid to education and to President Truman's refusal to appoint an ambassador to Spain, Father Joseph Leo Flynn, head of the Pastoralists order in the diocese of Hartford, told Manchester members of the Holy Family Retreat league at St. James' school hall last night: "Some of our leaders are not Christians in their thinking."

Father Joseph Leo's talk followed the showing of a March of Time film, showing scenes in the Vatican, by Ferrante Vicchi. Rev. John F. Hanson, pastor of St. James' church, also spoke on the program at the end of which coffee and doughnuts were served. Chairman Henry Kelly announced that at the next meeting it was hoped to have Albert Rochoon of New London, state president of the Manchester chapter under the same setup as that of the state organization.

To Be Ready in Year Opening his talk, Father Joseph Leo said: "If things move normal in the monastery chapel and retreat house, Father Rochoon will be ready in a year. Then you can, I am sure, have two retreats yearly from Manchester."

"It is my hope to fill the retreat house every week within two years of the time we open its doors. Clubs Combine For Meeting

European War Trials By Judge Daly

A group of 125 Rotarians from East Hartford, Glastonbury, Manchester and East Hampton gathered at the Villa Maria in Glastonbury last night to hear Judge Edward J. Daly of Hartford speak on "The European War Crimes Trial."

The gathering marked the first in a series of group meetings planned by the different service clubs. The Rotarians were given a vivid account of the trial and individual cases were singled out for illustration. Judge Daly told of how evidence was obtained against the different industrial concerns such as the Krupp and Farin works.

For example, the Krupp works had, with typical German efficiency and thoroughness, kept complete and exact records of its methods of operations and use of slave labor drafted from concentration camps, said the speaker. When it became apparent that the Americans would reach the plant, an effort was made to destroy all records. But 50 tons of detailed accounts were found hidden in a salt mine and these records helped convict the Nazis.

Justice Daly told of information gained about these slave labor survivors from a group of about 500. The women were brought to Krupp from a concentration camp. Each was given one dress of burkas, one blanket and a pair of cardboard shoes. Forced to live in bombod ruins, the girls often had to eat mice to stay alive.

Big Changes Started When Marlow's Moved

Where Orford Hotel Retained by the Glass Men's Socks Showed Daily by the Dozens

Big changes started when the store went into its new location. Where once the Orford Hotel had sold slugs by the pair, Marlow's sold socks by the dozen. The old hotel bar room was fitted into a different mercantile picture after the Quarter Store moved to take over part of the hotel building.

Low prices, as low as could be had consistent with good quality, were a big drawing card, and the variety was another magnet. Poor started to get the idea that if they couldn't get an article anywhere else in town, it could be found at Marlow's.

In the same building at that time in the twenties were the Newark Shoe Store and the Phelps Dress Shop. In 1928 the shoe store location was absorbed by Nathan Marlow, who then, after years of being known as the Five and Ten or the Quarter Store, gave his enterprise the name and the enterprise became Marlow's.

It was just before the depression, the high point of "prosperity." But still you could step into Pat Dougherty's barber shop for a haircut, and if you were young, for a lollipop, the whole combined for 25 cents.

The Manchester Electric company took over the Phelps Dress shop site but after a while when the electric office was moved to its present location, Marlow's took over the whole Orford frontage. However, partitions between the three stores were allowed to stand for a time, this giving rise to the impression that Marlow's consisted of three stores.

The jazz era was out in full blast and "flappers" were making a name for themselves. Phonographs were turned up to things like "Pretty Little Blue-Eyed Sailor" or "We're Happy in My Blue Heaven." Christian came to mean a lot more than a South Carolina port and now and then somebody who had a radio with a loudspeaker would get a few popular songs along with opera, concertos and station identifications.

The latter formed almost the main part of radio broadcasting then, for people seemed nowhere near as interested in getting programs as in getting stations.

These were the days! Main street in 1911 alternated between mud and dust; if it was rainy and customers brought in more than their share of it was dry the wind blew in more than customers.

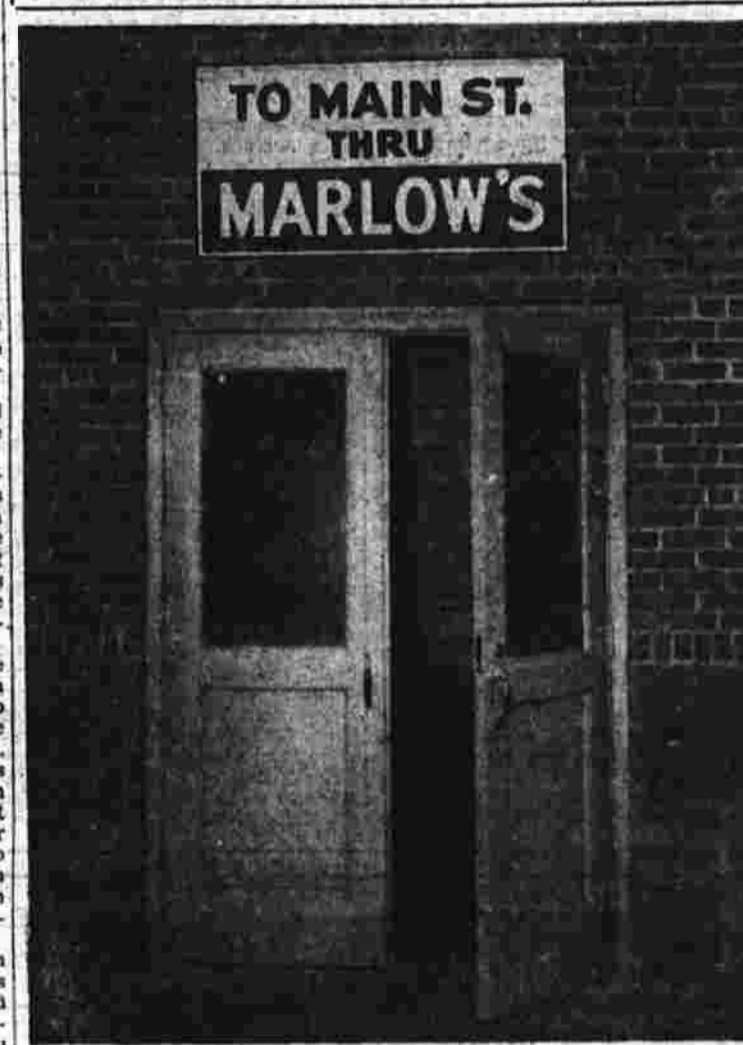


Marlow's Two Main Street Entrances

Rear Entrance Way From Purnell Place



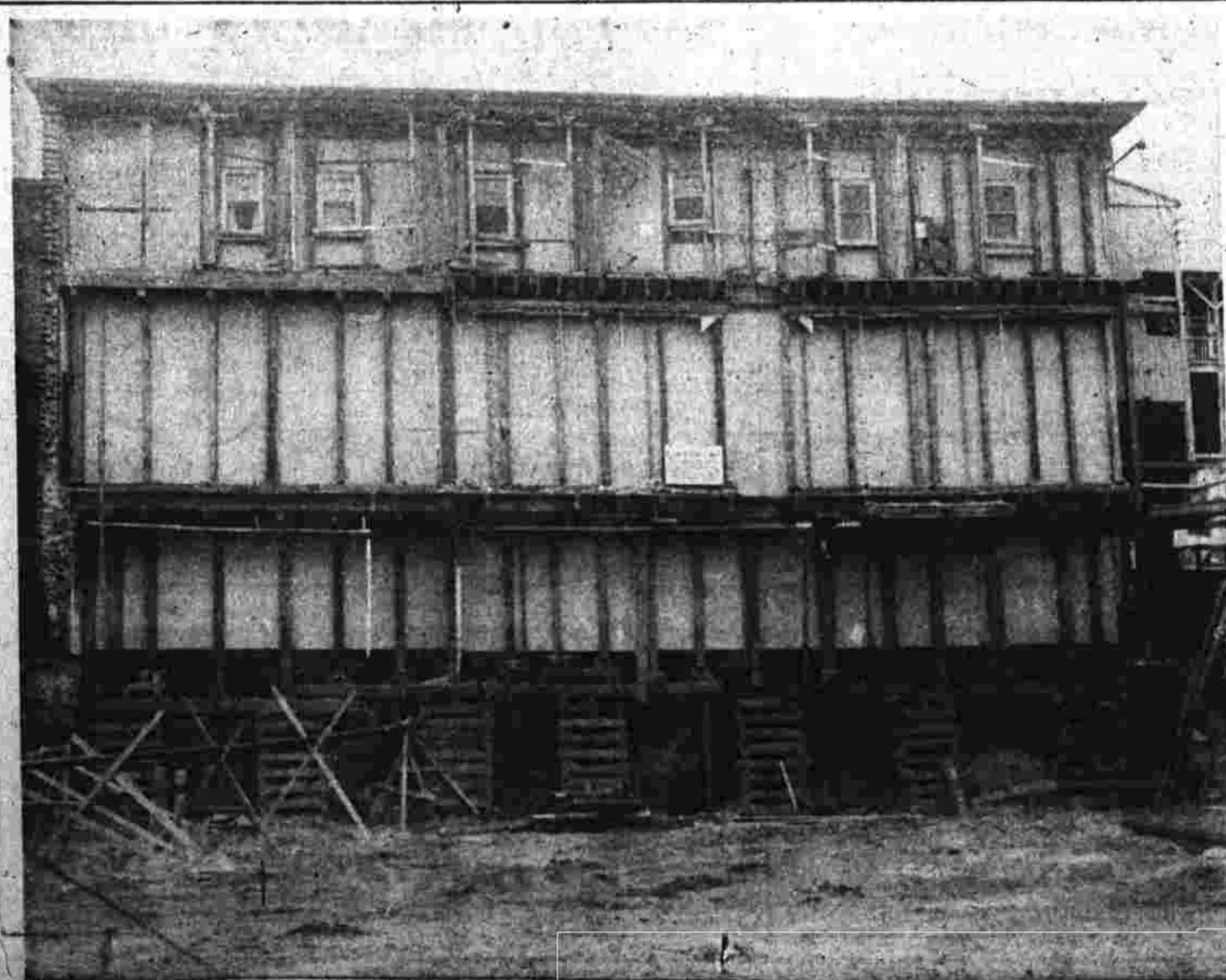

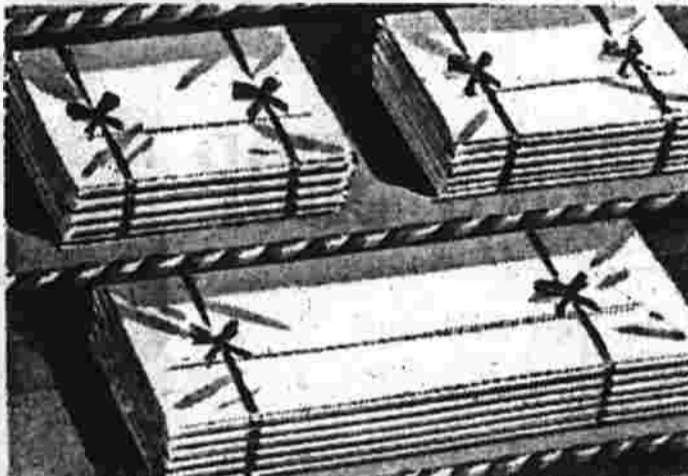

Marlow's Long Known As Family Store

It's All Brand New But It Doesn't Show

Up on the Roof a Big Job Was Done by Ed Coughlin for the New Marlow Store

When you look at Marlow's you can see nearly everything except the roof. Yet it was up on top that one of the big reconstruction jobs for the new store was completed by E. V. Coughlin, local roofing specialist. It was no easy task, not only because of the 7,000-foot area that had to be covered, but because the work was started while a blanket of snow covered the town.

After the snow was pushed off, the new materials arrived. There was only small space to store the material in, and much of it was hoisted up top for safe keeping. Nearby firms aided in the giving of use of sufficient space for the many things that go into a big roof job.

Bayley's Hardware, Quin's Pharmacy and Manchester Plumbing and Supply Company let Coughlin use parts of their premises for materials and working space. Two big heating kettles, one for pitch and one for asphalt were set up. Finally, with the way clear for a start, the installation of a Ruberoid bonded roof, guaranteed for 15 years' minimum service, was started.

Way It's Done

Because of the high conductivity of steel, the first requirement of a roof to be applied over a treasured steel deck, is that of the application of an insulating material. Primarily this is to prevent the escape of heat in winter, and to keep out the heat of summer. Secondly, insulating materials stiffen the steel deck.

Following the application of the moisture barrier and the insulation the roofing is applied. In this case, an almost dead level roof, the specifications called for three plies of tar-saturated roofing felt, alternating with mopings of hot tar followed by another heavy application of hot pitch in which, while it is still molten, crushed stone is spread, as much as will stick in the hot pitch.

While all this sounds like something that can be done in short order, the opposite is true. Because of the season, the weatherman may spring most any kind of weather on you from day to day so all work progressed with that in mind. The moisture barrier consisting of asphalt felt rolled in to hot asphalt on the steel deck was applied over all the finished decking serving as a temporary roof, protecting work going on below in case of subsequent snow. Insulation consisting of one inch

panels of fibre-glass insulation, the finest roof insulating board, were laid in hot asphalt over about one quarter of the roof area only. All insulation had to be covered with roofing immediately after application to insure its dryness at the beginning.

With this moisture barrier, the insulation and the bonded three-ply roof in place, the next step on the first quarter section was "graveling in" with crushed stone in both pits and the application of the parapet wall copper flashing and a series of three copper drains through the brick parapet wall.

With this quarter section completed a ready-made dumping area was available in case of further snow storms during the construction of the remainder of the roof.

In time, in which two small snow storms were encountered, the entire roof construction was completed according to the rigid requirements contained in the specifications provided by the Ruberoid company.

Tailor Made Weather Comfort at Marlow's

Town's Largest Installation for System of Air-Conditioning is Working Smoothly

One of the best things you will find out about Marlow's new store is the comfort and ease in which you may shop. This is due largely to the "tailor-made weather" that prevails in the store. The largest of its kind in Manchester, Marlow's special air-conditioning and cleaning system is the outgrowth of much planning and the best in workmanship.

The installation was engineered by Fred H. Rubin, consulting engineer of Hartford and installed under his direction by the Rubin Heating and Cooling Company, the Beacon Sheet Metal Works, the Standard Plumbing Company, Earl Kohler, electrician, and Charles Volkert and Son, well-diggers.

The conditioning system is unique in that it was specifically designed for Marlow's store. Approximately 150 gallons of degree water circulated through fan-type cooling coils throughout the space more than 25,000 cubic feet of air per minute on the way to the duct work throughout the store.

The air passing through the cooling coil is chilled approximately 25 degrees and the excess moisture and humidity is condensed on the cooling coils so that the air enters the store cool and dry. All the air in the store amounts to well over 250,000 cubic feet in the store and is filtered every nine minutes.

Mr. Rubin designed the control system to provide precise control of temperature and humidity for Marlow's sub-basement, basement, main floor and office, second floor of the old building. It is to be noted that this installation is the first in Manchester to provide year-round air-conditioning for offices. The system has been designed to provide heating, ventilation, humidification and air-cleaning.

The system was given a test trial and though the street temperature was about 91 degrees with an extremely high humidity the store thermometer read 72 degrees with a very low relative humidity, so that every customer remarked how cool and dry and comfortable Marlow's felt.

Another of the unique features of this installation is the fact that the air ducts were fabricated out of heavy sheet aluminum instead of steel; the equivalent weight of steel would have amounted to more than 25,000 pounds of metal whereas in aluminum it amounted to 10,000 pounds. In the ducts are located hundreds of grills, registers and controls which allow for completely controlled distribution of the conditions of air in every area of the store. These last were manufactured by the Tuttle and Bailey Company of New Britain, Connecticut.

All automatic controls were provided by the Minneapolis Honey-

well Company and were designed for the Marlow installation. The water from the deep well comes out of the ground at 48 degrees and by the end of the cooling process the temperature of the water rises about 10 degrees. It is planned to use this water for spraying the roof of the store to lessen the sun load on the system and at a later date this water will also be used for general purposes throughout the building.

Beauty Salon At Marlow's

The recent completion of Marlow's Beauty Salon marks another step forward in the growth and progress of Manchester. The newest and most modern beauty salon in New England is located on the lower level of the remodeled Marlow's Department Store. All the latest equipment necessary to serve the beauty needs of Manchester women have been embodied in the construction of the salon.

The main walls are decorated with low knot swags in rich color combination. The side walls of the salon have an ensemble treatment of a neat block on a beautiful blue ground, blending in perfectly with the blue on the main walls. Fluorescent lighting is used extensively in double troughs the entire length of the salon. The floor is tan and hewn checked tile. The whole atmosphere is cheerful, commodious and relaxing. The equipment is of solid chrome. All dryers are adjustable to any desired heat, the permanent wave machines are the newest innovation in the industry. They are remote control type, eliminating unsightly wires. The operator's chairs are adjustable, allowing greater efficiency in preparing the customer, and the greatest amount of convenience for both operator and patron.

For the comfort of the women, the salon is air conditioned. Arrangements have been made for free parking at Funnell Parking Station. Marlow's Beauty Salon is under the management of Mrs. Marion Menzel, assisted by a competent staff of well trained, experienced hairdressers.

The policy of the salon will be prompt, courteous attention with the most comfortable conditions possible for patrons. Naturally, famous permanent, first shampoo, finger waves, the latest hair style creations by skilled stylists will be featured at the lowest possible prices.

Floor Covering by Langer

Omitted from the list of sub-contractors in this edition is the name of Langer's Floor Covering Company. Langer's was responsible for the installation of almost two carloads of Armstrong's asphalt tile amounting to thousands of the nine inch squares. This installation is unquestionably the largest of its kind in Manchester and Langer's skilled mechanics are to be congratulated for the results of their tireless efforts.

Navajo Boy Makes Heap Big Jump

M.—(NEA)—As a child of eight Charlie DeJolie tended his father's sheep and horses in the vast expanses of the Navajo reservation near Kibeto, Ariz. He had never been to school—he did not know a word of English. Charlie DeJolie was endowed with a prodigious gift, though. The young Navajo had a will to learn so that some day he could help his people. Today at 17, Charlie is well on the way to his goal. He has completed five years at a government school in Tuba City, Ariz., three years at the Albuquerque Indian School, and is now enrolled as a scholarship student at Phillips Exeter Academy at Exeter, N. H. It was a long and difficult jump from the solitude of the Navajo reservation to the hustle and bustle of one of the best known prep schools in the east. First he had to convince his father that a school education was more important to a young boy than herding sheep. The necessary papers were sent to the Navajo reservation, and DeJolie approved by attending his thumbprint to the document. Charlie has many wondrous tales of the east to relate to his classmates. "I visited New York City one day," he told them, "and walking

The Doctor Says:

Twisting of the Eyeball in Any Case Causes Amblyopia. By Edwin F. Jordan, M. D. Written for NEA Service. The eyeball is shaped much like a sphere. The rays of light come from the pupil, are focused on the retina, and the image is formed. If the eyeball is not perfectly spherical, the rays of light do not come together at the same point in the back of the eye. This means that a person who has amblyopia sees things all blurred. Instead of having a clear image of what he is looking at, the object appears fuzzy and irregular. The correction of amblyopia requires finding out for each eye just what change there has been in the curvature and which plane is out of order. Then the lens for glasses is prescribed and ground to correct the plane which was in error and to bring the parallel rays of light to a single focal point in the back of the eye so that the image of what is seen again becomes clear. Skill and training is necessary to find out just what is the matter and to prescribe exactly the type of glasses needed to correct the error. Special instruments are required and in most cases doctors place a drop of atropine or something like it in the eye which causes the pupil to become dilated and makes the examination of the error more simple and more accurate. It would be interesting to know if amblyopia is increasing, decreasing, or staying the same in frequency. Also, it would be nice to know more about its causes.
