### Senior Scouts Club Speakers

Professional Women Hear Interesting Tale Of European Trip

Miss Emily Smith, former Girl Scout Commissioner and a leader of the group of Girl Scouts who toured Europe last summer, spoke at the meeting of the Professional Women's Club at its meeting last night in Center Church house with an account of the trip. Countries visited by the group of 12 were England, France, Belgium, Holland and Switzerland.

Arriving in England the scouts were met by English Girl Guides who showed them as much of their country as possible during the time they stopped there. The American Scouts noted the scenery of many towns in England which are taken for granted here and found the people friendly and gracious.

The second country visited was in sharp contrast to the first, where England lacked many things we term as necessities, Belgium seemed to be a land of plenty. There was food in abundance, there seemed to be more people than here at that time, and the people with whom the scouts came into contact seemed to be living very comfortably. The Belgians have made a remarkable recovery from the war. They seem also to have an extremely friendly feeling toward the Americans for they give credit for Belgium's liberation from two wars to the United States.

Upon arrival in France the girls were thrilled with Paris, and from there travelled southward where they witnessed beautiful scenery. In little villages peasant women were seen doing their washing out of doors in huge stone troughs. In sharp contrast to such simple, peaceful rural scenes, the scouts met stopped on the Riviera. This was a thrill not to be forgotten but, perhaps even more exciting, was a swim in the blue waters of the Mediterranean.

Switzerland was wonderful. "Switzerland was wonderful," heartily agreed all the scouts. The country was more beautiful than any of the others, except perhaps the mountainous section in southern France, and the people were clean, hard-working, and friendly.

In Aachen, Switzerland, the scouts stayed at "Our Chalet," an international hostel for scouts. The scouts from Manchester were the first American scouts ever to stay at this scout hostel.

Holland, with her regal, clean canals was the last country to be visited, but by no means the least interesting.

Miss Smith and her scouts illustrated their interesting talk with colored slides taken on their trip.

Proceeding the evening's program a short business meeting was conducted by President Marion Jensenman. Following the talk, refreshments were served by the hostesses, Miss Harriet Franzen and Mrs. Zoe Burke.

Professional Women Hear Interesting Tale Of European Trip

Miss Emily Smith, former Girl Scout Commissioner and a leader of the group of Girl Scouts who toured Europe last summer, spoke at the meeting of the Professional Women's Club at its meeting last night in Center Church house with an account of the trip. Countries visited by the group of 12 were England, France, Belgium, Holland and Switzerland.

### Town Plan, Zoning Personnel Changed

#### "Liberalizing" Effort Is Seen in Appointments Made by Board of Directors Last Evening

In a confused few minutes of nomination that attracted no more than a few spectators, the Board of Directors last evening changed the personnel of the Town Planning Commission and the Zoning Board of Appeals. The Board of Directors, within its own membership, tried and failed to make some shifts which would present a new face to the "liberalizing" Zoning Board of Appeals, as well as the Town Planning Commission.

The attempted change-around came as the Directors took action to fill vacancies caused by expiring terms and resignations. On the Town Planning Commission, Chairman Charles W. Holman had asked to be retired after long service. Another member, Hayden L. Griswold whose term was expiring, was almost certain to be "out" after his long service to the Directors two years ago. At that time the Directors had sought to force his resignation on the ground he was being called on, as a public official, to pass on work he had done as a civil engineer for private petitioners to the group which he was a member. At his trial, however, the Directors found they lacked power to force Griswold who had been "free" in for his term with the adoption of the new charter.

On the Zoning Board of Appeals, the term of Chairman Marlin E. Alvord was expiring, leaving one vacancy to fill. This group has been criticized at times by local businessmen and developers who have asserted that the Appeals Board's tendency to "water construction" of zoning layouts and rules has hampered real estate development. This same criticism has also been leveled at the Planning group on the ground that it has failed to provide sufficient business and industrial zones.

While the "liberalizing" move was rather involved, the maneuvering last night appeared to be in place. Chairman Alvord of the Appeals group, whose term was expiring, on the Planning Commission to fill out the unexpired term of Mr. Holman. Alvord has generally been considered as a zoning liberal.

Other Shift  
The second step was to shift Raymond W. Goslee, considered a zoning "conservative" out of the Appeals group and name him for the full term on the Planning Commission left by the Griswold term expiration.

The net result would have been to get at least one apparently strong "liberal" on the Planning force, and to make two vacancies on the Appeals Board which might have been filled by "liberals."

Unemployment compensation claims in Connecticut for the week ending Oct. 29 totalled 43,021, the labor department reported today. The fact that we have in the United States "a single market of 100,000,000 customers has been indispensable to the strength and efficiency of our economy. The creation of a permanent, freely trading area, comprising 270,000,000 consumers in western Europe would have a multitude of helpful consequences."

Unless Europe clearly sets out to meet these requirements by early next year, there will, Mr. Hoffman warned Europe, be no further Marshall Plan appropriations for this country.

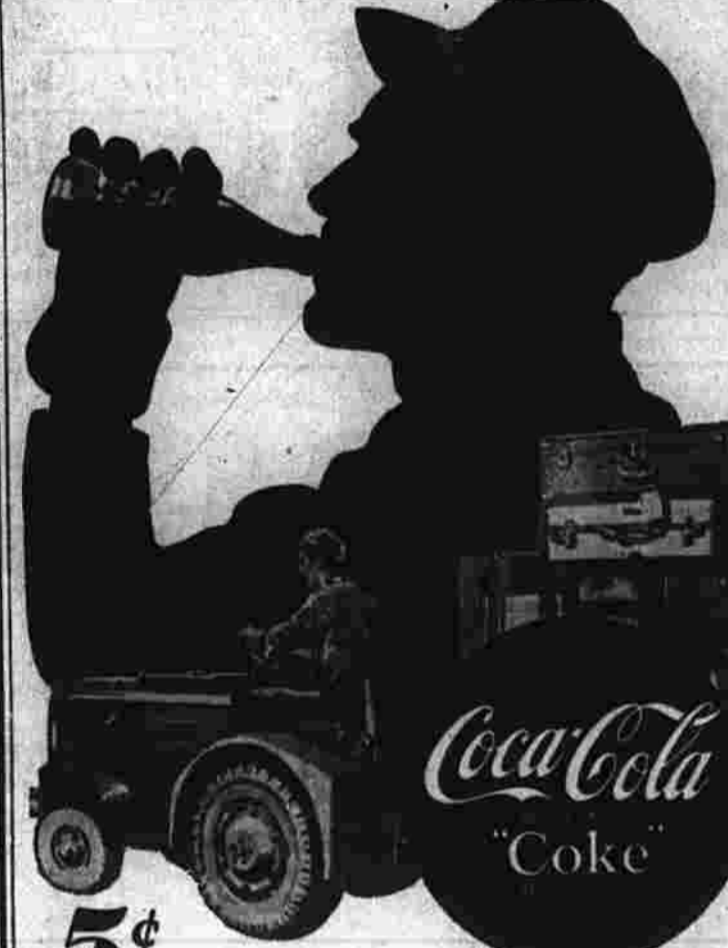
