More Charges Against Lota

Shelton Man Accused of Possessing and Making Untaxed Alcohol

Bridgeport, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Joseph Lota, 40, whose Shelton home in August was the scene of a \$25,000 fire which authorities charge resulted from the explosion of an illicit still, today faced added counts of possessing and manufacturing untaxed alcohol.

Lota was arrested yesterday, said United States Attorney Adrian W. Maher, as a result of a raid last Saturday in Trumbull in which two other men were taken into custody.

The others were identified as Antonio Arnone of Ansonia, and Joseph Lapart of Trumbull, who are held under bonds of \$2,500 each pending arraignment before a United States commissioner.

Lota, free under a bond of \$2,500, is scheduled to appear before U. S. Commissioner Earl W. Smith at New Haven on Wednesday.

Charges of illicit manufacture of alcohol growing out of the Shelton fire, still are pending against Lota in United States court at New Haven.

All three are charged with possessing and manufacturing alcohol on which Federal taxes were unpaid.

Maher declared that the three were linked with a "state-wide illicit alcohol ring."

Two Bosses Fall
Two old-style political bosses, Frank Higgins of New Jersey, and Mayor James M. Curley of Boston, went into eclipse in Tuesday's elections. Hague has been tottering for some time. In fact he was thought to have retired once before, and his entry into the New Jersey state campaign was something in the nature of an attempt to make a comeback.

But Mayor Curley of Boston seemed not unlikely to continue his cherished political life. Boston had apparently welcomed him back from federal prison as if he were a conquering hero instead of a convict. For many years the question has been that of whether or not the people of Boston would ever repudiate Curley, and the fact that they did not repudiate him was the greatest single support of political cynicism in this country.

Now even Curley has been repudiated. It is taken the voters of Boston a long time, but they have finally done it.

Perhaps the end of career for the country's two most conspicuous old-style bosses does not constitute a guarantee against the future development of similar bosses. But we tend to think that it does. We think that the process by which Hague and Curley have been ousted is a general one, based on the progressive disappearance of the political ignorance upon which their machines were founded.

The day is passing, we think when the political boss can survive on personal flamboyance plus petty patronage, but the cost of the steel industry pension too.

American who have to pay these higher prices will need higher incomes. And their need, under eventual rise in the country's whole wage level, so that the higher incomes will force another eventual rise in the country's industrial pension system.

Now, after suggesting that this cycle has run some of its course, let us take a look at the security dollar which was made in the fall of 1949. There has been a little taken out of it. Perhaps it would take higher mathematics to calculate just how much of a bite. But it has become something less than a dollar. What was to be a security dollar has, let us say, become ninety security cents.

Other things, of course, could possibly make it even less. A federal government over-burdened with debt might decide that devaluation would be a good way to pay off that debt. Then the security dollar would divide some more.

Or it could happen that Americans would become so content and so well satisfied with their future guaranteed security that they would lose some of their edge for drive and accomplishment in their present work. In that case, it would take more than wages to produce the things which Americans buy, and prices would have to go up in response to an indirect result of the original granting of the security dollar. And then the real value of that security dollar would be cut again.

These latter things do not have to happen. But the first does, and it means in effect, that the security dollar has been cut in value even before it is received.

There is only one way the value of the security dollar can be guarded, and it is a way which is, in these days, indignantly, ostentatiously and unambiguously, its loyalty to conservative economics. This old and bothersome law says that the only way to distribute a security dollar which is a full security dollar is to increase our production per man-wage-hour enough to create this security dollar as a result of work. The idea that wealth which is to be enjoyed must first be created in such an unchristian way that we
