Chicago, Nov. 18.—Fourteen members of the United Electrical Workers local yesterday were convicted of assault with a deadly weapon during a picket line disturbance.

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\$108,700 Appropriated By South End Fire Dist.

Increase of \$6,000 Over Last Year Is Reported at Annual Meeting of Officers Selected

The annual meeting of the South End Fire District was held last night at Fire Headquarters on Spruce street.

Andrew Abrahm was elected to serve a three-year term as District Commissioner. Other officers elected were: Harry McKinney, first assistant chief; Frank Scherphing, second assistant chief; Thomas Weil, tax collector; Frank Robinson, assistant superintendent of Fire Alarm.

The voters in attendance approved an appropriation of \$108,700 for operations for the next fiscal year. An increase of \$6,000 is noted over last year's budget and is attributed to the rise in cost of water and sewer plus a demand for additional service.

George W. Hunt, the district treasurer, reported a cash balance of \$33,416.61. Included in this amount is an advance of \$10,000 for the purchase of a new truck that will be delivered in the next few days. The price of this piece of equipment has been reduced to \$10,400 because of late delivery.

Report on Maintenance
Thomas McKinney reported on the Operation and Maintenance of the Fire Alarm System for the year. He said that 29 new alarm boxes were replaced with the new Quick Acting Door 5-Pull Type. Other boxes were put out of order during the year because of accidents and were replaced.

Chief Albert Fay reported 103 alarms responded to by the fire department. This was 20 less than reported last year, and 20 more than the fire district. There were 18 box alarms and 165 still alarms.

Yield of property at fire district buildings, contents and automobiles, totaling \$200,000. Insurance on this property amounted to \$100,150 and the total fire loss was \$15,127.

The total current district tax has amounted to \$1,151,127. Collector Thomas Weil reported, and approved, that a new bonded tax for all years is only \$4,618.44. It was estimated that the Grand List will be about \$20 million for the next fiscal year, but the grand list has been increased by nearly \$2 million and the tax rate is expected to stay at two mills when set next May.

The Chinese Communist authorities at Peiping, in a letter they received from Council General O. Edmund Chubb asking Ward's release.

There has been no official information as to what the Molotov Communist reply intends to do with the American diplomat.

State department officials privately conceded that the situation is one which in other circumstances might result in a strong action by the government. But they argue that in this case they have no right to use economic, political or military force—short of some forceful action, the consequences of which could not be foreseen.

Strong Demand Avoided
They have therefore avoided thus far sending the Chinese Communist any demand appearing an ultimatum. They have relied on efforts to persuade the Communists that the detention of Ward is a violation of civilized international behavior and will ultimately prove harmful to the Communist's own interests.

A request for Russian assistance apparently fit into this pattern. Some officials believe it might be effective for two reasons.

First, the Chinese Communists have had themselves tightly to Moscow and the Kremlin has full diplomatic relations with the government; second, Russia is suspected here of having special influence in the housing of Mullan and elsewhere in Manchuria.

Upholders of Mao's Power
The State department said yesterday in fact, that it is uncertain whether the Chinese Communist chief, Mao Tse-Tung, has full freedom of action that area of China.

It stopped short of saying publicly that restrictions on his freedom might be exercised by the Russians.

British and French representatives in China are reported to be working on the Ward case but it is doubtful whether they have much more influence than Americans on the scene. It is true that they have not been as badly treated as the Americans have in many instances.

Trouble With Nationalists
The State department is also having some trouble with the Chinese Nationalists. It has protested to the Nationalist government against the endangering of American lives by the shelling of an American ship by a Chinese warship Monday.
