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Must Protest West Europe

Hub of West's Strategy Given by Montgomery During Speech

New York, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The hub of the west's defense strategy, as viewed by Field Marshal Montgomery, must be protected against western Europeans from invasion and not to recede there after.

Montgomery, top military man in the western alliance, said last night that if western Europe is overrun again by invaders, that is the end of the people who live there.

"The point that is fundamental," he said, "is that to promise to resist in due course after a successful invasion from the east is quite useless. The peoples of western Europe must be protected against invasion, and not just told that they will be rescued after it."

The field marshal, who heads the Commanders in Chief committee of the Western European union, spoke before 1,800 persons at a Waldorf-Astoria dinner meeting in New York.

In his address, Montgomery said that the British war hero, who has led the economic recovery program and the defense reorganization of the western Europe.

Another speaker, U. S. Ambassador George F. Marshall, declared the armistice by America of U. S. conflict with the peacekeeping force of the United Nations.

He declared that further progress in economic integration of western Europe is immediately necessary.

"There are several schools of thought as to whether European union or federation with close political ties is essential to lasting peace. Such union may be desirable. It raises, however, a further complex series of problems which cannot be easily or quickly resolved."

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Thomas Changes Not Guilty Plea; Faces Jail Term

Throws Himself on Mercy of Court in Payroll Padding Case Today; Judge Dismisses Charge Against His Former Secretary

Washington, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Rep. J. Parnell Thomas (R., N. J.), today withdrew his plea of not guilty to charges of payroll padding, and threw himself on the mercy of the court.

The 64-year-old legislator changed his plea to one of nolo contendere. That means he does not contest the government's charge.

With this startling development, Judge Alexander M. Holtzoff dismissed a charge against Miss Helen Campbell, former secretary of Thomas, who had been accused of conspiring with Thomas to defraud the government through padding of his pay.

Holtzoff said that if he sentenced Thomas to a pre-war \$10,000 fine, it would be tantamount to a pre-war \$100,000 fine.

Thomas faces a possible maximum sentence of 10 years in jail and \$40,000 in fines.

Thomas was allowed his continued freedom under his present bond of \$10,000.

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Repeats Tale Papers Given Him by Hiss

Chambers Ends Testimony Today; Reports Put in Record Certain Name of Duggan

Washington, Nov. 30.—(AP)—New York, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Two reports entered into the record of the second jury trial of Alger Hiss today contained the name of Laurence Duggan, former State department official who died in a fall from a window of his 16th floor apartment in New York City.

The reports were made by Whitaker Chambers, chief prosecutor against Hiss, to Adolf A. Berle, former assistant secretary of state, and Raymond Murphy, State department security officer.

Chambers finally concluded his testimony after six and one-half days on which he testified that he had often said before the secret State department documents in his possession were given to him by Hiss for transmittal to a pre-war Soviet spy ring.

A paragraph from Murphy's report, entered into the trial record by Assistant U. S. Attorney Thomas J. Duggan, a substantial part of the following: "I have been advised by Chambers on March 20, 1945, in a report on Communist security officer."

In a special category was Noel James Murphy, who was described as a member at large in the Communist party and who was in the underground.

White House Also Will Have Two-Story Basement Late in 1951

Washington, Nov. 30.—(AP)—President and Mrs. Truman are going to Hollywood to see the picture "The Sign of the Cross" when they move back into a safe and modern White House in late 1951.

They have space, too, to store their belongings in a two-story basement when the repair job about to get under way is finally completed.

To be completely renovated inside, has 60 rooms and no basement.

Engineers disclosed today that eight additional rooms will be built on the top or fourth floor, possibly by use by the west.

In the past this floor has been used for making quarters and guests who could not be accommodated in the limited bedroom space on the second floor.

Presidents themselves have been on rare occasions to sleep in the "white" to permit important visitors to occupy their quarters.

Actual work on repairing the bones of presidents will get under way in the next few months.
