

99th Birthday Will Be Noted

Dr. Eugene Bouton, Oldest Living Graduate Of Yale University

New Haven, Dec. 5.—Dr. Eugene Bouton, Yale university's oldest living graduate plans to celebrate his 99th birthday tomorrow. The sole survivor of the Yale class of 1874, Dr. Bouton resides in Bloomfield, N. J. He became Yale's oldest living graduate on June 24, 1947, upon the death of Brig. Gen. Charles McCormick Reeve, class of 1870.

Born in 1850, Dr. Bouton prepared for Yale at the Casnovia preparatory in Canastota, N. Y. After receiving his bachelor's degree in 1874 and his master of arts degree from Yale in 1881, Dr. Bouton was awarded the Ph.D. degree from Syracuse university in 1882.

Former head of Seaboard College, Dr. Bouton was superintendent of schools in Bridgeport and in Pittsfield, Mass. He has also been supervising principal of public schools in Glen Ridge, N. J., principal of the New Paltz, N. Y., State Normal and deputy state superintendent of public instruction.

Vets' Bureau Makes Report

355 Persons Requested Assistance Here During Last Month

The November report of the Veterans Service Center released today by Director Walter T. Ford, shows a total of 355 persons requesting assistance on various matters, or that they were in need of such assistance.

Chief subjects handled include insurance, education, medical claims, job training, dental claims, out of state bonus, state bonus, survivors' benefits, GI loan, housing and deceased state bonus.

Many Bonus Applications

In commenting on the figures the director pointed out that a large number of state and federal bonus applications were filed, consisting of deceased as well as regular applications. Connecticut applications are largely more recent, press and radio campaigns conducted by the office of the state treasurer. In an attempt to have eligible next-of-kin file for their pay, the director said that during November he had filed 13 deceased applications for the maximum payment, and believes that there are many more local people who are eligible but have failed to apply because of a need or a lack of knowledge as to their eligibility. In this connection he advised that anyone in question as to his eligibility should contact the Service Center for further information.

As for the out-of-state bonuses, recent state elections have amended the laws considerably in the states of Pennsylvania, Washington and New York. Out-of-state applicants from New York State previously applications were denied because of failure to meet post-war residence requirements. Many now are eligible under amended law. For New York State applicants who are eligible under amended law, they are required to be denied, will be required to mail another application in order to receive payment under the new liberalized law. Eruption Danger Believed Passed

Catania, Sicily, Dec. 5.—(P)—Shepherds and farmhands returned to pastures and fields on the slopes of Mt. Etna today as danger from the ancient volcano's three-day eruption seemed to have passed.

Lava streams which started pouring from newly-opened craters on the 10,758-foot peak Friday flowed to a mall's place. The lava flows were threatening for a time by the lava streams, but scientists said the eruption seemed about over.

Ten Persons Die As Buildings Fall

Disaster Plan Is Given Test

Simulated Emergency For State Proves Success of Program

Hartford, Dec. 5.—(AP)—A simulated "disaster" swept over Connecticut yesterday but by nightfall everything was under control.

In the process, Connecticut's new state-wide emergency-disaster plan was revealed.

The "disaster" was a rampanant flood of the Connecticut river which swept away every bridge between Springfield, Mass., and Saybrook and overtopped the Hartford dike. Dr. C. N. Hugh, dean of the medical school, made this announcement today after analyzing statistics on the home towns of all the students enrolled for an M. D. degree and for advanced work in the medical sciences and in public health.

The survey shows that a total of 430 men and women are studying in the Yale School of Medicine. Of this number, a total of 111, or 25 per cent live in Connecticut cities and towns as their home addresses.

Will Not Shift Weather Ships

Assignment to Permanent Base at New London Not Contemplated

New London, Dec. 5.—(AP)—The assignment of Coast Guard weather vessels to permanent base in this city is not contemplated at this time, Capt. L. H. Baker, acting operations chief at Coast Guard headquarters in Washington, announced today.


Captain Baker said a recent international agreement reduced the number of Coast Guard operated Atlantic weather stations from seven and a half to five and a third, and that vessels released by this reduction either have been decommissioned or transferred west to augment the much smaller weather program in the Pacific ocean area.

A spokesman at the Coast Guard academy explained that the stations are jointly manned by the United States and Canada, the other half, thus explaining the reference to even and a half stations. In the United States man a station a third of the time and two other countries the other two thirds.

Richard J. Hugh, chamber president, said the response to the survey was good, but that most of those answering only had rooms to rent.
