Columbia Milk Yield Record High Two Cows in the Kaplan Herd Are Giving 420 Glasses Every Day

Columbia, Dec. 29 (Special)—A milk cow holds 49 quarts. Here in Columbia, Morris Kaplan has two grade-Holstein cows who each fill a milk can and then go on to another quart of milk each.

When you consider that the average cow doesn't hold up to 15 quarts per day average, and in quarts is exceptional, you can figure how far ahead of the game Kaplan is.

As a matter of fact, his herd averages 14,380 pounds of milk per year, or double the standard of 7,000 pounds.

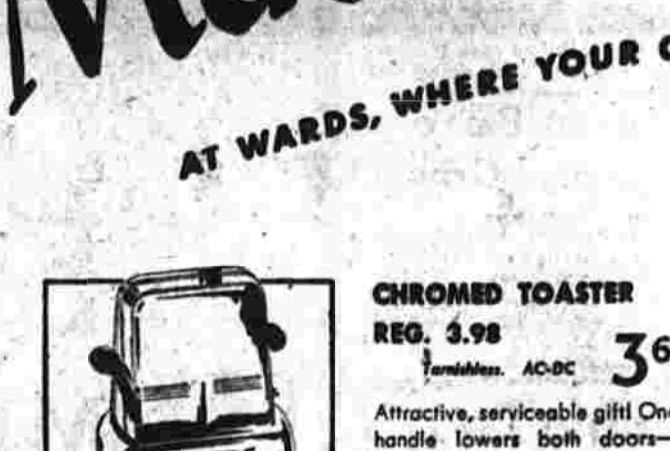

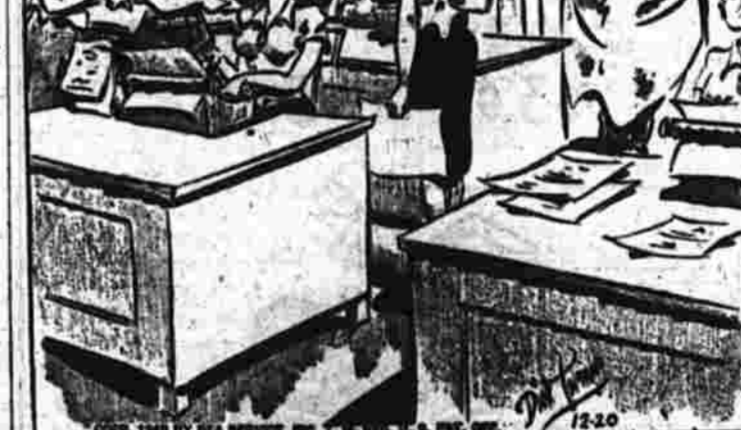

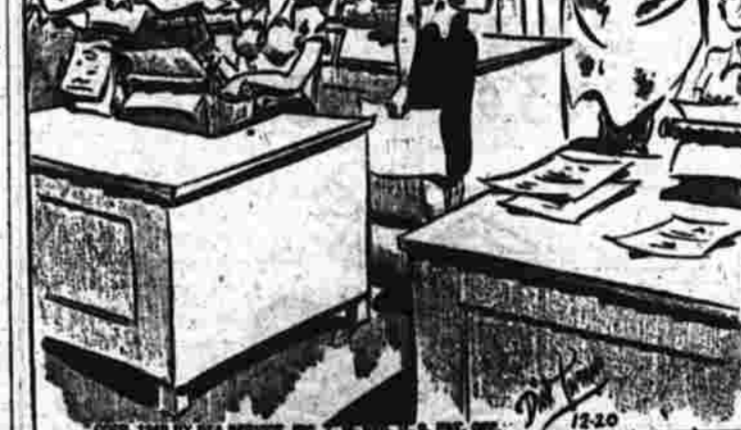
