Must Draw Out Vets Dividend

Cannot Be Left on Deposit to Accumulate Interest, Is Ruling

Requests from veterans that special dividend funds payable to them on National Service Life Insurance be left on deposit with the government at three percent must be denied, it was stated today by Director Walter Ford of the Veterans Service Center.

"The VA insurance service is beginning to receive letters from veterans, requesting that their special dividend checks be held by the government in order that the funds may accumulate interest at three per cent, but VA regulations prohibit the granting of such requests," Ford said.

However, he added, "regulations do permit a veteran to endorse his special dividend check and tender it to the VA in advance payment of National Service Life Insurance premiums. Or, if the veteran prefers, he can cash his check and tender the money for advance premium payments. In either event, such use of the special dividend funds will be advantageous to the veteran, as insurance premium payments are discounted at three per cent if made in advance. Detailed information concerning the discount may be obtained at any VA office."

Water Firm Asks Rate Change Use of Meters

Seeks to Spread Supply At North End, Prevent Wastage; Not After Actual Charge Increase

In an effort to spread available water supply more equitably among its customers, and to reduce wastage of water, the Manchester Water Company has petitioned the Public Utilities Commission for permission to raise the present rates and to install water meters in the north end of the town which the privately owned company serves. In reply, the P. U. C. has ordered the company to suspend, temporarily, enforcement of proposed new rates pending the holding of a public hearing scheduled for January 9 at 10:30 a. m. in Room 202 of the City Building, Hartford, at which time the company may submit its proposals and the reasonableness of its proposal.

Return is Small
The company asserts it is not striving to effect any rate increase, although its Attorney, Raymond R. Bowler, has indicated that it will within present limits only 3 to 4 per cent. A reasonable rate increase elsewhere figured at 6 to 8 per cent in the case of water companies which have increased rates as proposed are to cover costs of meter installation, and to adjust the rates fairly.

Such Increase Will Be Reduced
Such increase would be made would bring in \$7,400 more as an annual total increase of about 12 per cent in income. The water company figures that use of meters, by checking water usage, might cut water consumption from 30 to 60 per cent. Thus, according to the estimates presented by the company, it would add to its revenues by the change of some 12 per cent, drastically cutting down on water furnished.

With additional water reserves built up by possible savings in meter use, the company might be able to meet the growing needs of its section of the town.

Questioned as to whether or not the future of the company might be in hand with eventual public ownership, Attorney Bowler said he was not prepared to discuss that matter.

Like many water companies, the local firm has been faced with the shortage of supply facilities to meet adequately the increasing demands of its customers. A well has been dug and other reservoir developments have been made, but unless some economy in water can be effected, the company might be unable to meet the growing needs of its section of the town.

According to the experience of the water supply industry, a shift from the flat or fixture method to a meter measurement basis of charging for water service, results in a reduction in water demand of over 50 per cent to 60 per cent. Moreover, the meter measure is a more equitable method of calculating the customer's bill.

Therefore, the Manchester Water Company is desirous of spreading the services of all its customers and proposes to apply the schedule to each of its customers beginning with the date of installation of the meter. The company notes that the Commission has as the "initial test" of each meter the manufacturers test, which will be reported to the Commission.

Deadline Is Set For Job Seekers

Hartford, Dec. 29.—The state personnel director, Glendon A. Scoboria, announced today that Jan. 12 will be the last day for filing application for five open competitive examinations for positions in state service.

They are: Accountant-auditor, \$3,180-\$4,080; optical inspector, \$2,800-\$3,600; physical therapist, \$3,000-\$3,750; research associate, \$2,240-\$3,060; and junior librarian, \$2,700-\$3,420.

The usual Connecticut residence requirement is waived for the junior librarian and physical therapist examinations. Interested persons who have had experience and training in any of these fields could be scheduled as soon as possible so that an early start could be made on this project, providing the Commission's request meets with approval.

Farm, Business Units for A & P

Millions in Protest of Government's Anti-Trust Procedure

Boston, Dec. 29.—Millions of Americans already have spoken officially through big and little organizations in stern protest of the government's anti-trust suit against the Great Atlantic & Pacific Company, a survey disclosed today.

Competitors and friends alike of the 60-year-old food chain have adopted resolutions, written formal letters to President Truman or taken other group action to express their support of A.&P. The resolutions showed there was a growing concern among Americans that the government was moving toward a revision of traditional standards of competition under the guise of acting against monopolies.

This concern was reflected in the action of the American Farm Bureau Federation at its national convention.

Representative Farm Families—Representing the heads of some 1,500,000 farm families, the Federation said in its recent resolution that it is essential to differentiate between "rigorous" competition and "actual" monopoly power.

America's biggest farm group did not specifically mention A.&P. in its resolution, but the resolution dealt with basic points at issue between the government and the food chain.

The Federation said it favored strict enforcement of anti-trust laws but did not agree with "inter-pretations which apparently are being given to these laws in certain recent cases and administrative rulings."

"In this highly controversial field," the resolution continued, "it is important that distinction be made between conditions reflecting the effects of vigorous competitive actions and actual monopoly power. Size and area of activity are not necessarily indications of monopoly."

Margins Reduced—"Regulations should not be used to eliminate the possibility of integrated systems that are efficient and competitive. Such systems have the possibility of bringing about a badly-needed correction in the margins that now exist between the producers and consumers of many items."

On similar grounds, the Federation opposed the government's "administrative interpretations of the Robinson-Patman Act." These interpretations of the act, which limit the use of quantity discounts, "interfere with the results of competition between normal channels of distribution," the resolution said.

Lawsuits, the Federation said, "will support legislation to repeal the Miller-Tydings Act" dealing with retail price maintenance. "The survey of a mounting tide of resolutions showed the American people are worried over what will happen if the government closes A.&P. into little stores and makes it incapable of continuing its policy of buying in heavy volume and retailing at a small profit."

Ranchers and stands supporting AP embraced such organized groups as unions, chambers of commerce, farm bureaus, farmers, poultry raisers, egg producers, fruit growers, canneries, packers, processors, distributors, suppliers, truckers, fishermen and housewives.

Noonan Again Gets Compensation Job

Hartford, Dec. 29.—The re-appointment of Leo J. Noonan for a new five-year term as workmen's compensation commissioner for the First Congressional district has been announced by Gov. Chester Bowles.

Noonan, a resident of West Hartford, has been a member of the commission since 1934 and its chairman since 1938. The commissioners review all claims for workmen's compensation.

The salary of commissioners is \$8,000 a year, and of the chairman, \$9,000.

State Exports Off But Little

Only Small Percentage Below All-Time Peak Commission Reports

Hartford, Dec. 29.—Connecticut's direct exports of manufactured goods last year were only 3.2 per cent less than in the all-time peak export year 1947 while those of the whole United States decreased 17.8 per cent, proportionately five times as much, the State Development Commission reported today.

Reporting the results of its first state-wide survey of exports in its current information letter to distributed to manufacturers and business houses, the Development Commission said it estimated Connecticut's direct manufactured exports last year at \$129,900,000 against \$144,500,000 in 1947.

Commission Chairman Francis S. Murphy, in commenting on the survey, believed to be the first taken by any state, said: "The Development Commission, having operated its program to promote Connecticut's foreign trade for the past five years, is extremely gratified by these statistics showing continued high demand for Connecticut-made products abroad. It was accomplished in the face of extremely adverse world conditions last year."

The commission stated that its estimates of foreign sales were based on questionnaires returned by 651 manufacturers, of whom 482 reported exports in 1947-48. Of the latter, 252 said they also exported in pre-war 1938, and the commission estimated their overseas sales in that year at \$33,200,000.

Attention was emphatically called by the development group in the "Information Letter" to the fact that its estimates include only direct exports and no indirect foreign trade.

"Connecticut is famous for its manufacture of such essential components of final products as ball bearings, brass and steel parts, counting and timing devices, electrical switches and insulated wiring, piano actions and many, many other articles which seldom are final products but which are made up into final products," he stated.

"No one knows how many millions of dollars' worth of these parts are sold to manufacturers throughout the United States and incorporated by them in equipment eventually sold in the foreign market."

Ball bearings were cited as an outstanding example of indirect but immeasurable exports. Connecticut produces no motor vehicles, but makes about one-third of all ball bearings made in the United States.

Other products mentioned included electrical equipment, electrical switches and insulated wiring, piano actions and many, many other articles which seldom are final products but which are made up into final products," he stated.

"Even without the very large amount of indirect exports included in the 'Information Letter,' the size of Connecticut's 1948 foreign sales as reported in this survey is sufficient to show the importance of the overseas market to the State's economic welfare."

The estimator showed that the amount of durable goods exported from Connecticut in the past two years was nearly ten times that of non-durable goods. The great bulk of the state's foreign sales was in machinery (except electrical), iron and steel products, rubber products, chemicals, agricultural equipment and non-ferrous metal products. Exports of these and other durable goods were estimated at \$131,400,000 in 1947 and \$127,000,000 in 1948.
