

Statistics compiled recently by the Connecticut Blue Cross show that the average daily room rate charged at Manchester Memorial hospital is alightly lower than the average charged by the thirty-four member hospitals in Connecticut. The average daily room rate for all hospital is \$10.49 a day, while that of, Manchester Memorial Hospital is \$2.90, which is fifty-nine cents a day less than the average for all hospitals in Connecticut. The amount of \$9.90 is the "average" daily room charge. Some rates are higher, some lower, depending on the location of bed. This ahows that Manchester Memorial Hospital rates are neither too high nor too low but in line with the bospital's policy of keeping rates at a reasonable figure.

Local hospital authorities say that about fifty per cent of their patients have some form of hospital insurance. With such insurance the public finds it much easier to pay for its hospital services, and the family pocketbook also remains in a healthy condition.
