Would Use Armed Strength to Give Formosa Defense

Hoover and Taft Propose United States Act to Protect Is- land from Chinese Communists; Truman Seen Opposed to Plan

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Two Republican leaders—former President Herbert Hoover and Senator Taft of Ohio—want the U. S. to use armed strength if necessary to protect Formosa from the Chinese Communists. Their strong proposals spotlighted the troubled China situation as lawmakers flocked back to Capitol Hill for the second session of the 81st Congress.

Working on New Strategy
The administration is working on new strategy aimed at checking Communism in the Far East. However, President Truman is reported to be firmly opposed to sending American troops to the defense of Formosa. This does not rule out the possibility of supplying economic aid and advice to the Chinese Nationalist defenders of the island.

Hoover—now the G. O. P.'s elder statesman—said the government should use American Naval power if necessary to save Formosa and lesser islands lying off the coast of Communist-held China.

Suggests Three Point Program
He suggested a three-point program of U. S. military defense of the island, no recognition for the Chinese Communist government, and continued recognition and support for Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist forces now on Formosa.

These moves, he said, would build "a wall against Communism in the Pacific." And he added they would give "at least a continued hope of some time turning China in the paths of freedom again."

Taft told reporters that both U. S. Naval power and Air power should be used to defend Formosa and prevent the spread of Communism in Asia.

Knownland Criticisms Policy
Hoover gave his views in a letter to Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) who released it yesterday with a sharp criticism of the administration's Far East policy. A short time later Taft outlined his position to a news conference.

The Hoover-Taft blasts apparently caught the administration off guard. There was no immediate response from either the

Plane Wrecks Passing Auto

Skids Out of Control, Rips Through Fence; Four in Car Injured

Salt Lake City, Jan. 3.—(AP)—A 21-passenger airliner added out of control after landing at Salt Lake Municipal airport yesterday, ripped through a fence and smashed into an automobile.

Four persons in the car, almost a total wreck, were injured. One woman among the nine passengers and three crew members aboard the Challenger Airlines plane also were hurt.

After the plane hit the automobile, it slid through another fence and tipped over on one wing in a field.

Car Traveling on Highway
The car was traveling on a highway which skirts the airport.

John W. Bishop, 31, driver of the car, was most seriously hurt, suffering hand and leg lacerations. His wife, Mrs. Winifred Bishop, 33, their daughter, Nancy Louise, 13 months, and Mrs. Bishop's sister, Helen Anderson, also were injured.

Mrs. Phyllis Burnett Yocum, 30, Philadelphia, Pa., a registered nurse, was the plane passenger hurt.

All were resting comfortably in a hospital.

Plane Not Badly Damaged
The DC-3 plane, inbound from Denver, landed during a snowstorm. It skidded about 300 yards. It was not badly damaged.

In Denver, Donald Duff, president of Challenger Airlines, which operates in five western states, said:

"We don't like to guess in explaining a thing of this nature. Duff said, 'All I can say now is that the runway was very icy and that the pilot put on his brakes and kept going. No one was badly hurt in the plane.'"

Voting Heavy Outside Cairo

First General Election In Egypt in Five Years Draws Many to Polls

Cairo, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Egypt's first general election in five years began with heavy voting in districts outside this capital today. The early turnout in the capital was light, but the big vote was expected late in the day.

"The voting in this country of fiery political temperament was peaceful throughout the early hours. At least six persons had been killed in pre-election campaign disorders since Dec. 13, and most observers had expected renewed bloodshed despite government efforts to avert it."

(Correspondents in Egypt are under tight censorship, particularly with regard to news of election disorders.)

About 5,000,000 Eligible
About 5,000,000 citizens of the Nile kingdom were eligible to ballot for new members of the Chamber of Deputies. The women have no vote.

The election climaxes a month of bitter campaigning between candidates of opposing parties and strong groups of independents.

(London newspapers speculated that the Egyptian elections might be influenced strongly by recent reports that King Farouk, the country's 29-year-old monarch, had broken up a romance between two of his subjects so that he could marry a beautiful 16-year-old Egyptian commoner.

Lord Beaverbrook's Sunday Express said: "Farouk cannot afford to court further unpopularity. A surge of popular feeling against the king could swing the elections and touch off the revolution that has been boiling for over a year."

Premier Hussein Sirry Pasha urged Egyptians in a last-minute broadcast last night to "behave in a manner fitting Egypt's position in the concert of civilized nations."

No Striking Reforms Urged
By western standards, all of the parties represented in the election would be considered rightists. None of the candidates have advocated any striking social or political reforms. The contest is considered by observers as primarily a contest between political leaders.

First returns are expected at the Ministry of Interior late this evening. A total of 961 candidates are competing for 288 seats in the chamber. Twenty-one seats already have been filled by candidates who had no opposition.

Four Charges Face Maragon

Indicted for Perjury by Federal Grand Jury; Lies Told to Probers

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—John Maragon, one-time mystery man who used to flit about Washington flashing a White House pass, was indicted today on four charges of perjury—lying while under oath to tell the truth.

A Federal grand jury charged that he lied to Senate investigators about the sources of his income and other details of his financial affairs and employment.

Maragon, 54-year-old Greek-American from Kansas City, was hauled before the senators last summer. They were investigating "five per centers"—men who seek government business for others for a fee.

They heard testimony that Maragon had "pressured" government departments for favors and had boasted of his close relationship with Maj. Gen. Harry Vaughan, President Truman's military aide.

Transcript Submitted
When they got Maragon's own story in a secret session, the senators sent a transcript of his testimony to the grand jury.

Recluse Shot In Manhunt

Crippled Man Is Killed In Exchange of Shots With Arkansas posse

Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Two more casualties have occurred in Arkansas' great manhunt for fugitive convicts. The search seemingly cooled today after one of the fabled meekly surrendered.

A crippled recluse, described by neighbors as eccentric, was wounded fatally last night in an exchange of shots with members of a posse in a North Little Rock suburb. A state official, working with the officers, was wounded.

Captured Without Resistance
This happened several hours after 26-year-old Odus Eaton of Silwell, Okla.—barefoot, disheveled and hungry—was captured without resistance at nearby Scott, Ark. He was returned to Tucker Prison farm and placed in the death house for safe-keeping.

It was from Tucker that Eaton and three companions broke out early Saturday, killing a trusty guard as they fled and touching off one of the state's greatest manhunts.

It was not known whether the three convicts still at large were together or had separated; whether they had eluded the posse and bloodhounds or had taken refuge, waiting for a chance to break through the cordon of officers.

Lee Burgess, 61, who lived alone in a small house was wounded fatally and Deputy State Fire Marshal Walter L. McLaughy, about 40, was wounded in last night's shooting.

Officers Blame House
Members of the posse said that as they approached Burgess' house, someone opened fire, and McLaughy fell. Officers riddled the house with bullets, and Burgess was found badly wounded. He died shortly after arrival at a hospital.

Authorities had not yet given an official statement, but a member of the posse reported that before he died Burgess murmured that "people out here have been mean to me."

Congress in Session To Resume Battling On 'Fair Deal' Hopes

New Weapons To Be Tested In Mock War

800,000 Men Fighting Gigantic Land-Sea-Air Battle in Caribbean Will Use New Tactics

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 3.—(AP)—The 800,000 men fighting a gigantic land-sea-air mock war in the Caribbean late this winter will use weapons and tactics newly evolved since World War II.

The armed forces made public today some of the details of "Exercise Portex," the joint war games of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps during February and March.

The joint chiefs of staff at Washington had designated Admiral W. H. P. Blandy, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet, to command the exercise. However, since then the Navy has announced Blandy will retire about Feb. 1. His successor, vice Admiral W. M. Fechteler, therefore will be the theater commander.

Fechteler will move up to four-star rank when he becomes Atlantic fleet chief.

Most Expect Sub Attacks
The latest developments in undersea warfare will undergo tests at the very outset of the war games. An "invasion" by troops aboard transports, with convoy of warships, must expect submarine as well as air attacks as it heads out from this port.

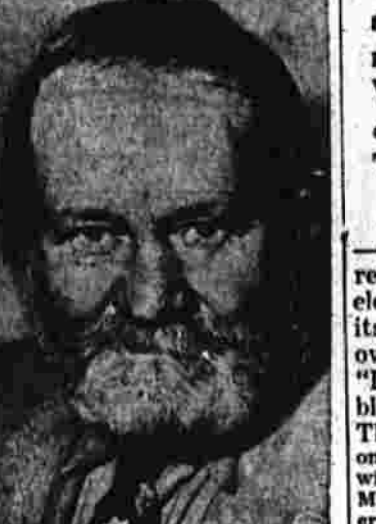
The Navy high command has given first priority to submarine warfare, both offensive and defensive, and in Exercise Portex will have opportunity to test both its new secret equipment and tactics.

More than 150 ships of all types—carriers, a battleship, cruisers, destroyers, submarines, transports and amphibious landing vessels—have been assigned to the war games. Some amphibious ships are being borrowed from the Pacific fleet for the maneuvers.

Will Be Invasion Force
The Army's 3rd Infantry division from Fort Benning, Ga., augmented with attached units including a battalion combat team of the famous 82nd Airborne division

Nation's Miners Return To Work in Force To- day After Holiday

Pittsburgh, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Unexplained work stoppages kept at least 7,000 Illinois coal miners out of the pits today but most of the nation's 450,000 miners picked up their tools amid rumors of an impending nation-wide strike. A large number of Illinois mines which are not covered by new contracts with the United Mine Workers were forced to close. UMW President John L. Lewis, visiting his ailing mother in Springfield, Ill., declined to comment on the work stoppages.

Pittsburgh, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The nation's coal miners went back to work in force today after a long holiday week-end, dispelling rumors a new walkout was coming in the miners' struggle for a 1950 contract.

Crew Is Not Delaying Ship

Flying Arrow Captain Denies He Will Ask Men to Sail Vessel

Hong Kong, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Capt. David Jones, master of the Isbrandtsen line freighter Flying Arrow, said in an interview today he had not delayed departure of the ship for Red-held Shanghai in order to ask the crew if they would sail it there.

Jones said he heard a voice of America broadcast saying he had delayed the ship's departure two days to permit consultation with crewmen.

"I have not and will not delay the ship's departure," he said. "The ship's articles call for the crew to sail the ship to any port in the world that the master may direct. On this basis it would not be necessary to ask the crew to sail the vessel."

No Refusal of Duty
Jones, a resident of Chicago, said no crewman or officer has refused in any way to carry out his orders and their duty. He said he expects no delay in the ship's scheduled departure with a cargo for the Communist port on Jan. 5. Previous delay in the departure, he said, was caused by the year-end three-day holiday and rain which slowed the loading of cargo.

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Assembly Today Almost Formality; Real Kick- Off for Second Ses- sion Will Come Tom- orrow When Truman Will Tell Lawmak- ers What He Expects Them to Accomplish

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Congress, with one eye already cocked to next fall's elections, convened today for its second round of battling over President Truman's "Fair Deal." Today's assembly was mostly a formality.

The real kick-off for the second session of the 81st Congress will come tomorrow, that is when Mr. Truman will tell the lawmakers what he expects from them.

Truman to Deliver Message
Beginning about 1 P. M. (e.s.t.), the president will deliver his state of the union address to the joint Senate-House session. A major radio and television network will carry the speech.

At a White House meeting which ended shortly before Congress met, Mr. Truman gave his congressional high commands an advance look at the message. They also went over his economic message, which he will send to the Capitol Friday, and his budget message, due Monday.

Express Enthusiasm
Emerging from the 3 1/2 hour and 55 minute conference, the Democratic leaders expressed enthusiasm over the president's plans. Speaker Rayburn of Texas told reporters:

"It looks like the country is in pretty good shape—I never saw it in better shape."

Others who sat in on the conference were Vice President Barkley, Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, House Democratic Leader McCormack (Mass.),

Talk About Taxes
Among rank-and-file legislators, most of the talk was about taxes. Some—particularly the Republicans—were saying a lot, too, about cutting expenditures.

Republican House Leader Martin (Mass.), announced creation of a special G.O.P. committee to keep tabs on the president's "Fair Deal" program.

Martin gave it the name of the "Price Tag committee" and said its job would be just what its name implied—to put price tags on administration spending proposals which "have reached a

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The State department disclosed today that the Chinese Nationalists have submitted a detailed new plea for American military and other aid to help save Formosa. Ambassador Wellington Koo asked on December 23 for military, political, and economic aid.

Koo also urged the Economic Cooperation Administration to release funds for China which were from last May when the Communists took Shanghai.

Holiday Death Toll Tops 400

Sharp Drop Compared To Christmas Period, National Survey Shows

The nation's New Year's holiday violent death toll passed the 400 mark but represented a sharp drop compared to the Christmas week-end total of 580.

The 401 killed in all types of violent accidents was less than the traffic deaths over the Christmas holiday. The survey covered a period from 6 p. m. last Friday to midnight Monday.

Traffic Big Killer
But traffic, as usual during a major holiday, was the big killer. There were 253 persons killed in 7,000 accidents over the long week-end. That was 77 below the 330 predicted by the National Safety Council. In the two-day 1949 New Year's holiday there were 309 violent accidental deaths, including 207 traffic fatalities.

The council's prediction followed the heavy toll on the highways the previous week, 413 traffic fatalities. The New Year's traffic fatalities compared to the council's figures of an average of 85 traffic deaths per 24 hours in the first 11 months of 1949. Wet and foggy weather over much of the country was believed to have been an important factor in keeping down the highway toll.

55 Persons Victims in Fires
Fires killed 55 persons, including 7 who perished in a blaze which destroyed a farm house near Houston, Tex. There were 95 other persons killed in miscellaneous accidents, including falls, scaldings, asphyxiation, hunting accidents, and other causes.

Listed under the miscellaneous deaths were three Indians who died after drinking alcoholic anti-freeze at a New Year's party at Warm Springs, Ore., Indian reservation.
