In Water Rates Case udge LaBelle, Attorney For Group Opposing Increase at North End Says Facts Not Given

Wants "Whole Story"

Commenting further on last night's advertisement. LaBelle said the company's story sought to point out that there had been confusion between the terms "meter charge" and "minimum chayge" under which a single house gets 3,000 gallons of water each quarter.

Said LaBelle, "where is the rest of the story? What happens after the customer has used up his minimum 3,000 gallons of water? What are the rates? Why haven't they been published?"

Published Charges
In answer to the question on rates, LaBelle referred to PUC Docket 8318 in which the Manchester Water company published its proposals as fellows: first 3,000 gallons. It would then be possible, LaBelle said, for the average householder or moderate average householder or moderate water to figure what his

\$6.50 now paid on a quarterly basis seeks."

He asked that north end residents check their findings on the proposed rates. Reduced to cubic feet this would be 1,200 cubic feet, he said. Using his own case as an example Judge LaBelle, a south end resident, said that he used 2,600 cubic feet for the quarter ending November 30. This did not include the use of garden hose, forbidden during the quarter.

He said that if the proposed rates of the Manchester Water company

were applied to his use of 2,600 feet, approximately 19,500 gallons, his bill would have been \$10.58. Thus, if he were a north end water customer, he would have paid \$4.08 above the prevailing \$6.50 quarterly charge, or an increase of 63 per cent. The company has indicated that the quarterly increase for a single family would be only \$1.05.





"If you were to show this record to any experienced trial lawyer in the world, he would tell you that there was not any evidence at all.

"Honestly, I have never in my over forty years' experience seen tried a case that was as absolutely devoid of evidence as this. That is the honest truth. I have never seen one like it."

So here was a case in which the anti-trust lawyers made seriwhich, in the words of the court, they did not have "any evidence at all."
