### Bowles Asks Action To Help Unemployed

#### Urges Republican Leaders to Consider Liberalizing State Compensation Act

Manford, Jan. 12.—Gov. Bowles has again asked Republican legislative leaders to consider liberalizing the unemployment compensation act. He says at least 18,000 Connecticut unemployed workers with their families are being kept from the economic recovery through the economic recovery act, and that the number probably is a lot higher than that. In a letter last night to Rep. George C. Conway, Guilford Republican who is majority leader in the House, the governor asked whether Conway and other Republican leaders would not join with Democratic legislative leaders in recommending to the members of both parties in the Legislature that immediate action be taken to relieve the present emergency.

The Republicans control the House in the Legislature; the Democrats control the Senate. The governor told Conway he would like to call a special session of the Legislature right away, but the Senate is unwilling to state its position and to agree to recommend a definite and constructive course of action to your meeting. It is obvious that a call for a special session would be a fruitless waste of the taxpayers' money.

The governor wants the Legislature to extend the maximum period during which unemployment compensation benefits are paid, from 26 weeks to 34 weeks. He said that these people could not obtain relief until they had used up all their savings and other property. It seems obvious that this is a cruel, unnecessary and intolerable situation," he told Conway.

Only Bowles has power. Before the government had made his letter to Conway public, Republican State Chairman Charles P. Baldwin issued a statement in which he said, as a public case has argued before, that only Governor Bowles has the power to call a special session. "If he chooses to call one, Baldwin said, the Republicans will naturally consider seriously the action presented and would naturally take whatever action is deemed necessary and advisable. Adding that the decision might be that no action was necessary, Baldwin said: "There is no way that I or any other member of the Republican party can tell what the members of the House will decide after studying the situation. There is also no way that we can promise any course of specific action in advance of a session."

The governor proposed a special session to amend the unemployment compensation law in mid-December, but did not call one. Conway, after polling Republican legislators, said the majority did not feel that the situation constituted an emergency. Figures on the number of persons who remained out of work after exhausting their unemployment benefits were lacking, he said. In his letter last night, Governor Bowles told Conway: "It seems to me beside the point to argue that the facts are not as complete as we might wish. There are sufficient facts, in my opinion, to emphasize the need for definite action. On November 25, (State Labor Commissioner) John Egan reported to me that as of October 31, 35,000 men and women had exhausted their unemployment compensation benefits since January 1, 1949. "Unfortunately, the commissioner did not have complete facts on all of these people. He had clear evidence, however, that more
