Launch Polio Drive Today
Contributions Will Go For Local Victims and Other Afflicted

Manchester was in step with the nation today—a half step ahead, really—as it launched its annual campaign to raise funds to combat infantile paralysis. We were a half step ahead because of a first donation of \$21 given by Fred Spelman, one of Manchester's best known citizens, who is still confined to the Memorial hospital. Three other local persons struck during the winter continue to be hospitalized.

"We have never had a specific goal for the March of Dimes in Manchester," Chairman Philip Bayer stated today. "But when the committee learned that \$100,000 was spent on local polio victims in 1949 from Dimes drive funds that sum is our goal."

"Last year our committee grossly contributed \$2,700 to the fund even though in the previous five years there had been no indication of this disease in the town."

During the drive, which extends to January 25, events to attract all segments of the population have been planned. On Thursday of this week, 33 local restaurants, lunch rooms, grills and driveways are contributing the price generally paid for coffee to the polio fund.
