The diminutive animal handler was attacked Monday by the tiger, Panbu, when she tried to lift a cub from its mother's cage.

Sex Crime Here

Sharp, tragic events have a way of holding up a mirror to ourselves and our institutions. We should not flinch from the mirror.

Out in Buckland Monday evening, a group of Manchester citizens, by instinctive action, revealed their own distrust and indignation of the law. Their distrust and criticism was not of the police officer who held them back from the man-turned-beast whom they had captured. It was of the process of the law and punishment which was to follow the police officer's discharge of his own immediate duty.

What was their implied criticism of the law and its processes? Why did they instinctively move to inflict a justice of their own? Their criticism of the law was that such a sexual pervert could not be punished sufficiently for his crime, and that there was, in the process of the law, no adequate guarantee that he would not be one day free to repeat himself.

They are entitled to that distrust, because the process of the law has not, anywhere, caught up to the problem of the sex offender. Nor will it, we think, until it is clearly established policy that all such offenders shall be removed from society for life.

Time and again, in the news, there comes the story of repeat-offenders who have been in custody, but who have been released, sometimes as "cured," only to turn beast again.

We repeat, it is no wonder, outsize, confronted with the hot fact of a sexual crime, had an instinct to take the law into their own hands, lest the formal process of the law should hang fire.

But this, in turn, was dangerous and reprehensible, no matter how strong and natural the instinct behind it. We citizens of Manchester were not far from an actual act of mob murder. And if, at that moment, we had looked in the mirror, we must have seen, and understood, and perhaps not even have been revolted by, an image of a Southern lynch mob. This was how such things happen. Suppose there had, here in Manchester, also been a racial element involved. What greater and more determined violence then?

We do not, in any case, want to be that image. There should, we think, be a community vote of thanks to Patrolman Edmund F. Dwyer, whose unswerving, courageous performance of his own sworn duty saved us from the passions of a moment.

Finally, this man-turned-beast held a mirror up to the American press and publication field. He had, he himself confessed, got his idea from reading about similar attacks in the newspapers and magazines.

We do not doubt it for an instant. The story of this Manchester attack has gone out to the newspapers of the nation. To a large number of people, already sexually unbalanced, who read it, there will come a suggestion: "That is something I ought to try sometime." Every story of sexual perversion which is carried in the newspapers or discussed in the magazines carries an evil inspiration to dissipated minds everywhere, a follower of the law can detect how some lurid perversion practice first comes into the town, in one case, and then repeats across the nation, as other perverts imitate it.

The problem here is too big for any one newspaper to handle. It is, roughly, a choice between covering and printing the news and not doing so. It is our business to print the news. But eventually,

Indo-China Next?

The next victim of Communism in Asia is French Indo-China. It is doubtful if much can be done about it. If there was anything that might have been done, it is now too late.

French Indo-China began struggling for independence as soon as the struggle in Indo-China. Perhaps because of that fact, France has not proved the intelligent colonial power Holland has proved.

Faced with complete opposition from the French, the independence movement in Indo-China has advanced rapidly. In one sense, the situation in Asia is merely a race. If the west gives independent status to Communist areas, as the Communists are doing, it can keep Communism out of almost any given sector. If the west is not in time with these gifts, the situation becomes ripe for Communist and its glamorous, but basically false, promise of progress and prosperity.

Britain in India, the United States in the Philippines, and the Dutch in Indonesia have been in time with at least the start of the twin gift. The French have been narrowly and obdurately late. Indo-China may be lost before the west even seriously considers whether it can be saved.

At the recent British Commonwealth Conference at Colombo, the Asian nations most directly concerned with the threat of Communism adopted their own policy for repelling it. What they formulated was a ten year program of economic expansion, to benefit those areas where Communism will try to root itself. This is the path of Communism in the Far East consider their best policy. The policy they have originated for themselves lies in what the Secretary of State Acheson says, American policy wants to be and do.

But we cannot lose time in making a new program. The forces of unrest never grant free time to those of stability.
