Once assume the burden of defending the fair Connecticut truth against the glib pervasions of the must inevitably lead to war. Yet, although this is the situation; this country has so far failed to make the world any real and sincere offer of the alternative. We have never yet said that we are willing to disarm down to the rifle if other nations will also do so. We have continually reproached other nations for playing a part in the drift toward war. We have not yet said what we would do to move positively in the direction of peace. Our present platform in the world, which men like Senators McMahon and Tydings are trying to alter, is that we will make the hydrogen bomb period. To stand on that platform alone is to die. Late in the day, but perhaps not too late, Washington is beginning to come to grips with that reality.

**India to Produce Atomic Energy**

New Delhi, India, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru said today India would produce its own atomic energy "in a reasonable time."

Speaking in Parliament, Nehru said the government already had taken steps to process atomic war materials, presumably uranium ore, and plans to have a small atomic pile producing energy within a few years.

He said a factory for producing the raw material probably would be in operation within a year.

The lack of adequately trained personnel, Nehru said, was hampering India's atomic research much more than lack of finances.

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**Good Tydings**

It is a little difficult for citizens who have been urging and thinking these things for many years to realize, but Washington is suddenly becoming conscious of the direction in which the world is heading. It is in a state of soul-searching ferment. For the first time, it is beginning to wonder, not out loud, whether this country has done all it could do and should do in order to create a condition of world peace. For the first time, it is beginning to wonder whether our moral position in the world is as sound as it ought to be. For the first time, it is beginning to address itself to the idea that, if there is to be peace, it can only come from positive leadership on our part, as contrasted to purely negative policies in which we stay in the world but as we find it, concerning ourselves merely with holding our own place and position in that rut.

"This," we thought as we walked out to the barn for our morning chores, "is a very mild March."

Spring's fresh water was glistening on the surface of the pond where some thin ice had formed yesterday. The ground was a little slippery under foot, as it will be when the frost is working its self out. We left the barn door open, as one does on mild spring mornings.

So far, it seemed an ordinary spring rain morning.

Then, suddenly, the barn door slammed to. There are times when the barn door will do this for rather ordinary currents of air. But the sudden, wilfully unleashed power of this particular bang of the door was something that comes only once a spring. This was the sudden whiff from the east of the line storm. As the morning wears on, it doesn't seem too much of a line storm. But an explanation for that is that not even the elements knew it was going to be so quick. It came so quickly. No one knew. Some still think it is February.

Once assume the burden of defending the fair Connecticut truth against the gibbering pervasions of the Technicolor hit, and you are presently have shouldered a life's work.

**Sea Farming Worthy Too**  
 Sooner or later we Americans are going to have to be fair with ourselves in the business of government subsidies.

If, therefore, we are right in paying farm price subsidies in order to prevent those who choose to suffer economic loss through no fault of their own, we will also, some day, have to admit that it would be right to grant the request of the Cape Cod fishermen. All these good industrial American citizens who produce goods want is the same treatment given to their fellow citizens who till the land.

The statistics show that the farmers of the sea suffer from the same economic perils as the farmers of the land. Last year, for instance, the fishermen caught 100,000 more pounds of fish than in the previous year. That was a fine crop. But a fine crop—too fine a crop—was bad news. The price of fish dropped 12 per cent. So, with a bumper crop, the fishermen actually made less money than they made the year before.

Another year of bumper crop would probably ruin them.

After we guarantee the fishermen against economic disaster because of over production, our conscience will hardly permit us to ignore the plight of equally good and deserving fishermen who, for their own, produce too heavily for the market price structure will always be protected and assured against loss.

Sooner or later it will become apparent that any one who pays taxes, by which such things as farm and fish income is guaranteed, should also be entitled to have his own livelihood guaranteed.

And we are not being entirely satirical. If we do continue to hold that our present farm program is good and practical, it is indeed inevitable and logical that other occupations should demand similar protection. And that future logic should perhaps be taken into consideration when we debate the present question of whether or not the farm subsidy program is good and sound.

**Good Tydings**  
 It is a little difficult for citizens who have been urging and thinking these things for many years to realize, but Washington has suddenly become conscious of the direction in which the world is heading. It is in a state of soul-searching. For the first time, it is beginning to wonder, out loud, whether this country has done all it could do and should do in order to create a condition of world peace. For the first time, it is beginning to wonder whether our moral position in the world is as sound as it ought to be. For the first time, it is beginning to address itself to the idea that, if there is to be peace, it can only come from positive leadership on our part, contrasted to purely negative policies in which we stay in the world war as we find it, concerning ourselves merely with holding our own place and position in that war.

Senator Helen McMahon broke the ice. New Senator Milard Tydings has carried the logic of peace a step farther.

Senator Tydings formally introduced in the Senate on Monday a resolution "authorizing and requesting" President Truman to call a world disarmament conference of "the world's" night-mare of fear."

There are two noteworthy things about Senator Tydings' proposal.

One is that it admits the validity of the Russian contention, which has consistently been that atomic and regular disarmament are problems which should be handled together. This is something several United States policy makers, as yet, refused to consider.

The second thing remarkable about Senator Tydings' proposal is that he proposes that disarmament should actually go "down to the rifle." What Senator Tydings has recognized, in other words, is that the only way to control atomic armaments and prevent atomic wars is to prevent wars of any kind.

If all that is done is to put atomic-hydrogen bombs under seal, said Senator Tydings, that will be merely to "control them between wars." The outbreak of any war with conventional arms would immediately set all participants off on the atomic weapons trail again.

"Some will say," said Senator Tydings, "that it is too large an order to try to disarm right down to the rifle. To that, I say that there is just as much possibility of securing total disarmament as there is to secure atomic-hydrogen disarmament and the latter would be helped only in the period between wars."

"The peoples of the whole world want peace—and they are going to want it more and more as the full import of the hydrogen bomb—and its successors—is borne in upon them. When the hydrogen bomb is built it is not the end. We can go on building ever more super-bombs; there is no limit, except the limit of know-how, to the size of bombs that can be built."

"The Russians, like the Americans and everyone else, do not want to live under this horrible fear. Our great leader, the President, has at this moment the opportunity to try to bring real peace to all mankind."

"I am not advocating disarmament by example. I am advocating an agreed disarmament gradually over a period of years with a constant, world-wide inspection."

"Let us taking the universe as a whole and see if we can't get it to disarm."

The reason this is important is this: as things stand now, we are heading toward an armaments race which, if it is not halted, must inevitably lead to war. We have not yet said what we would do to move positively in the direction of peace. Our present platform in the world, which men like Senators McMahon and Tydings are trying to alter, is that we will make the hydrogen bomb period. To stand on that platform alone is to die. Late in the day, but perhaps not too late, Washington is beginning to come to grips with that reality.


