**Formosan Aid Faces Setback**

 The conference is expected to close the House bill.  
 That bill authorizes the Economic Cooperation Administration (ECA) to spend \$60,000,000 by June 30 for capital improvements and raw material imports into Korea. The program would be started by a \$30,000,000 advance from the reconstruction finance corporation.  
**Spending Deadline Extended**  
 The Formosan aid would come out of \$100,000,000 which was left over from funds voted to China last year. It becomes available merely by extending the spending deadline from Feb. 15 to June 30.  
 The House turned thumbs down two weeks ago by a single vote on aid to Korea alone. This measure was beaten by a coalition of those who oppose foreign spending and others who did not like President Truman's Formosa policy.  
 But the one-package bill had no trouble.  
 Administration leaders say ECA may not be able to spend more than \$10,000,000 in Formosa before June 30. But about \$28,000,000 will be available if needed.  
**No Military Help**  
 Neither of the measures includes military help for either Korea or Formosa.

 road picture is that the number of workers laid off now is lower than in past coal strikes. That's because railroads have been converting from steam locomotives to Diesel units as fast as the industry can.  
 Throughout the country some cities have resorted to rationing and there's a prospect that discounts may be ordered. The Indiana Fuel Commission recommended such a procedure for that state but Gov. Henry F. Schricker overruled the recommendation. He hinted a decision may be made within the next few days.  
 The governor, like the rest of the nation and the miners themselves, are waiting to see what happens in Washington. President Truman is expected to seek an injunction next week under the Taft-Hartley act to try to get the miners back in the pits for an 80-day period. However, there's a chance that the operators and the miners might get together on a strike-ending settlement.  
**Little Activity in Coal Fields**  
 For the most part there's little activity in the coal fields. Sporadic reports of violence have come from only two states—Kentucky and West Virginia.  
 Roving pickets were reported to have entered the Rome of Charles Helms, about 40, near Pikeville last night. Frank Kerr, general manager of Eastern Coal company, said the pickets beat Helms, who is chief electrician for the company.  
 Kerr said Helms and five other men were taken to the hospital.

 Search officials treated the report with caution and emphasize that the Watson lake area had been searched repeatedly since the C-54 disappeared Jan. 26.

 There was no comment on the charge from United Mine Workers officials.

**Hartford Agent Accepted Illegal Fee in Sale of House Here**  
 No matter how much a real estate agent sells your house for above the figure you desire, he can keep only his rated commission. Unless there is some special stipulation, the complete income of the sale, minus the fee, goes to the home owner.  
 This was brought out in Hartford Court of Common Pleas yesterday when Judge Walter M. Pickett rendered decision for a local party to recover \$1,200 from a Hartford real estate agent.  
 David and Henrietta Hendry of Manchester brought suit against Agent Albert S. Burke of Hartford in connection with the sale of their house here at 117 Lenox street in the fall of 1948.  
 According to the conditions asserted by the plaintiffs, Burke agreed to let Burke sell their property, the price being set at \$9,000. Ten days later Burke privately made known to a prospective purchaser, Lucien La Pierre, that the house was for sale at \$8,500. 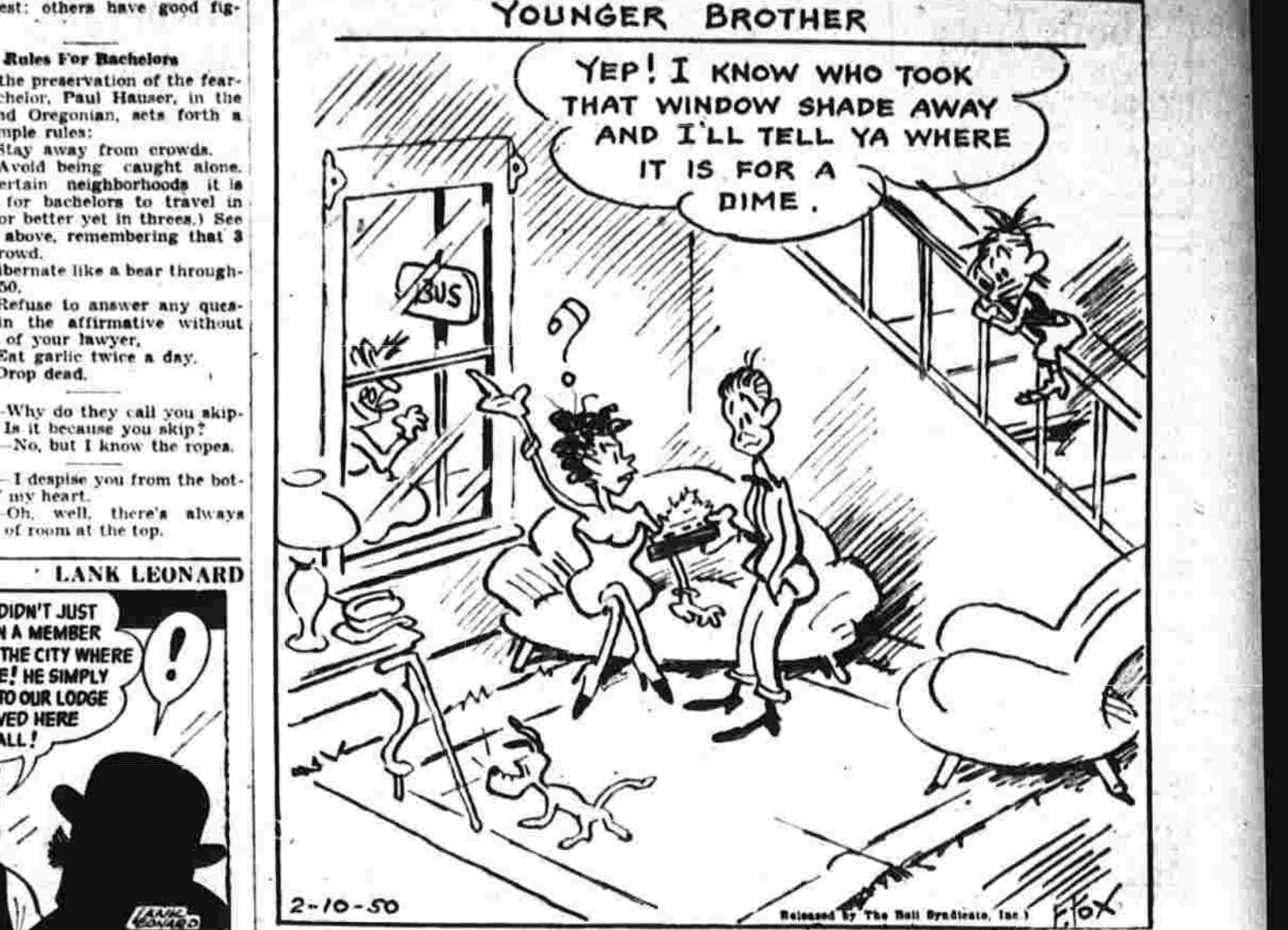
